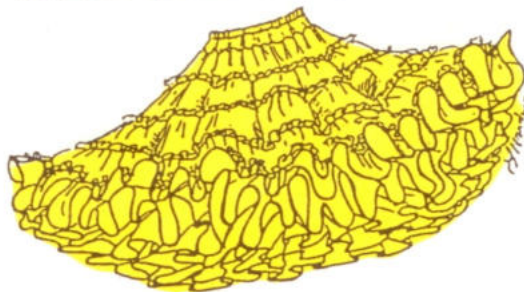

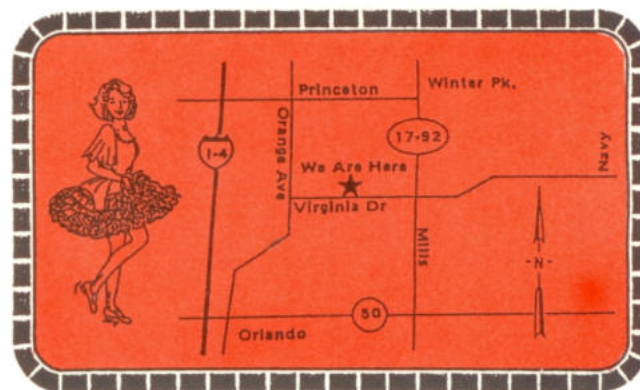

It is up to us. If we want our Spring graduates to be a vital, permanent part of the square dance program, then we need to live up to our promises.

Let's remember that the new dancer, like all of us, is looking for a friendly, relaxing experience - a place to forget daily cares and troubles. Let's make sure that the Class of 1987 finds a real "touch of class" in square dancing for many years! It is up to us.

LEADER PROFILE

GEORGE DESCHAMBEAU

George Deschambeau - pilot, engineer, consultant, lecturer, square dancer, husband, father and grandfather - thought he had done it all. That's what he thought! **Then**, Jack Lasry handed him a record and a mike and said, "It's your turn to call." George replied, "You gotta be kidding."

The president of the Florida Callers Association this year is an energetic Central Florida caller (who didn't start out to be (one) with an equally talented caller/wife - and they both serve as editor of a square dance magazine.

George and Rita moved to Orlando, Florida in the mid-sixties. A few years later, they joined a Danny Robinson square dance class and became members of the Whirl & Twirl Club. After dancing for a few years, George happened to attend a callers school in 1975 conducted by Singin' Sam Mitchell and Jack Lasry.

George recalls he went to the school with the idea of just monitoring the activities...he didn't even bring any records. On the very first day, Lasry handed him a record and a microphone...and very politely informed George that no one **just observed** in the school.

Long before that "non-observing" day in 1975, George had met and conquered a number of challenges. As a young man from Illinois, he served his country as a pilot in World War II. At war's end, he completed his education as an industrial engineer and went into industry. In 1954, he left industrial work and found a new challenge in the health care field. Using some flair and imagination, George applied industrial engineering principles to the health care field and became a vital part of hospital management.

George formed a co-operative hospital management consulting organization in 1960 which served over 100 hospitals in the Chicago area. His organization, one of the first of its kind in the country, gave George national recognition and for the next several years, he traveled the lecture circuit. It was a call to establish and manage a similar organization in Florida that brought the Deschambeaus to Orlando.

Today with records and mike firmly in hand, George and Rita are equal partners in all aspects of the caller's art. To say they are active in the field of square dancing is an understatement. They promote and book dance dates as a team and have served numerous posts in caller associations (local and state) as officers and committee workers. For the past six and a half years, they have held the post of publisher/editor of Florida's official square dance magazine, Bow & Swing.

In addition, they maintain a busy calling and teaching schedule at four Central Florida clubs - Orlando Singles, Trail Blazers, Big Potato Squares and Circle Weavers. An avid believer in keeping the fun in square dancing, the Deschambeaus as president of Florida's state caller association represent the best of today's leadership in the square dance field.

The Deschambeaus reside in Longwood, have one son who lives in Nashville, Tennessee, and count among their finest treasurers - three grandchildren. Recently, while Rita was out juggling a half dozen jobs and trying to keep them all in the air at the same time, we managed to slow George down to a pleasant trot for the following interview. Here are his comments.

In your view, what is square dancing's biggest, most immediate problem?

Length of training. For those fortunate enough to have a hall available for sessions of 2 or 2½ hours per night for class, then the time span we are now living with is tolerable. But for those who run similar number of nights with only 1 or 1½ hours of class - then its cram, cram, cram. We have folks today who can not stay with us for the required 39 or 40 weeks. They have to be out of class in less than 30 weeks...they can not graduate and those callers who do graduate those folks are turning loose a maverick who really doesn't fit into the square dance world.

We tend to talk about what is wrong with square dancing.

We must be doing something right. If so, what is it?

I think we are giving them the basic ingredients of the thing called fun. The dancers clown around alot...they say, "Are we having fun yet?" ... (even have a button reading that) ... but when they begin to dance they also begin to forget the day's trials and tribulations. We're doing something there that is generating relaxation and fun. That is the bottom line.

As a club caller (who teaches and calls), what do you find is the biggest complaint from the dancers?

Well, one is there are too many figures. In the same breath, they will come to the caller and say, "Hey, we just danced the 'diddlywhap' at another dance last night. Why don't you do it?" In most cases, I stick to my guns and say, "That's nice, when you dance there next time, ask the caller to do it again." They tend to frown at me a little, but I just don't do that. I will try something that comes from Callerlab because I don't want to vote on it if I don't know how it dances.

Some callers call square dances and prompt easy rounds.

Is this a good idea or should the teaching of rounds be left to professional cuers?

We teach our dancers line dances and a few easy rounds. Whether we teach them the Callerlab 'Round of the Month' or go into further depth is questionable and can only be addressed by each individual caller. My feeling is - I think round dancing enhances square dancing, and after the first easy rounds, Rita and I like to have one of the round dance cuers come in and introduce rounds to them properly.

There is a concern about the gap that exists between mainstream and plus dancing. Do you feel this problem is overstated?

My personal feeling is that unless the dancer has ample opportunity to spend a full year in class (with training in basics, mainstream and plus) ... when he is turned loose on the square dance world, he is going to have the biggest disappointment of his life. I've seen this in just this past year. The graduate dancer should, ideally, dance at the mainstream program taking the **time** to become a competent, confident mainstream dancer ... then move on to plus. Most of our beginner programs today are sponsored by plus clubs. When they graduate they are given club badges and invited to dance their first tip with the club -- and then they are asked to go out and learn to dance 'plus' somewhere else.

If you were able to advise new dancers on the best way to ensure their enjoyment of square dancing to its fullest, what would you tell them?

By all means, find a mainstream club.

As a caller and teacher, what gives you the most enjoyment - calling or teaching?

I guess because I have been a teacher all my life, both on the lecture circuit and at the university level, my enjoyment has been teaching adults. I like to see people come in with those blank expressions - and go out with knowing ones. I have a lot of fun teaching.

CALLERLAB HOTLINE:

NEW LEARN TO DANCE PROGRAM READY!

Red Bates, Chairman of the Special Committee established to review the Mainstream and Plus Programs to develop a 25-Week Learn to Dance Program, is pleased to announce the completion of the committee's work. It has been a monumental task involving many iterations of ideas back and forth within the USA and Canada. The results reflect the surveys and thinking of many leaders and are offered to those callers and clubs who wish to try an experimental program. This program is designed for those areas and clubs who have requested a 25-Week Learn to Dance Program using the most popular calls from the Mainstream and Plus Programs.

This program was developed over a period of time subsequent to a resolution made at the 1986 Baltimore Convention of Callerlab. The listing of calls reflects the same numbering

scheme used on the existing Mainstream Program and all Plus calls which are included are identified with a (*Plus*) following the call.

Calls from the Mainstream or Plus lists which are not included in this 25-Week Program should be taught through workshops following the formal instruction period. This program is designed as a "feeder" program for Plus clubs. Individual modifications to suit local conditions are anticipated. **No** effort should be made to pressure anyone into teaching with this experimental program unless the sponsoring organization makes that decision.

Generally speaking, only standard and the more common formations and arrangements are recommended. If one tries to use all allowable formations and arrangements for each call, this program **CANNOT** be completed in 25 weeks.

Square & Round Dancing

The Square Dance Activity is made up of many facets of dancing. Callerlab recognizes this fact and encourages its members to become conversant with areas other than just square dance calling. The callers have a responsibility to provide a pleasurable program for the dancers. Quite frequently, to provide variety, Round Dancing is included in this program.

While some square dance callers do not include rounds in their program, Callerlab's official position is that squares and rounds go together. They are part of the same family tree. Callerlab has an active Round Dance Committee which selects a "Round of the Quarter" for suggested use by its members. It was at Callerlab's request that Roundalab developed a manual for callers who wish to introduce rounds into their square dance program.

Texas is a Camper's Bonanza

How do you like your camping? Do you bring along the TV, and shower to clean up after a stroll around the countryside? Or do you prefer throwing the tent and lantern, and maybe a cook stove, in the trunk of the car? Whatever you like to do, Texas is ready for you. The scenery varies from the swamps and forest of the East to the rocks, cactus and spring fed pools and rivers of central Texas to the mesas, or slender table-topped mountains of the North-central part of the state. giant hurricane of 1900, they built a seawall and raised the whole town about sixteen feet. Perhaps you are interested in the Alamo, in San Antonio. We had folks from all over come to help us in our war for independence.

Some of the more famous, and infamous, places to visit are: did you every hear of Luckenbach, Texas (where everyone wants to go); Terlingua (home of the world's greatest chili cook-off); or Beaumont (home of the "Spindletop" museum). The biggest single attraction of North Texas (around the Dallas, Fort Worth area) is the place where J.R. Ewing is the orneriest ranch boss around. Southfork Ranch is near Plano.

The Texas Rangers are another part of Texas history that you can visit at the Texas Ranger Hall of Fame in Waco. They were really a special breed of people.

Judge Roy Bean's place is all fixed up and waiting for you to visit it in Langtry. That's

sixty miles west of Del Rio. You can not spend the night but you will see the place where the judge proclaimed himself, "Law West of the Pecos."

There are caves and lakes (bring the fishing rod) to visit, and museums, and some of our great vacation spots, such as New Braunfels or San Marcos.

Reams of great camping spots are described in the "Texas Public Campgrounds," brochure, obtained from the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation, P.O. Box 5064, Austin, Texas 78763. There is also a "Texas Travel Handbook," obtained from the same people at 11th and Brazos Streets, Austin, Texas 78701. KOA Campgrounds has a special Texas brochure. "Houston recreational and camping facilities" are outlined in a brochure by that name, obtained from the Greater Houston Convention and Visitors Council, 3300 Main Street, Houston, 77002-9396.

MAKING THE ROUNDS

Why do we round dance? Where do we round dance and when?

Questions of this nature pop up from time to time - and the answers are obvious. We round dance because it's great fun and we dance whenever and wherever we get the chance. You see, round dancing is directly tied to the roots and traditions of the American Folk Dance scene. In the early years of America, an evening offered dancers many delights like contras, circle dances, waltzes, polkas, two-steps and schottisches to name just a few. Since today's round dances include many of the above-mentioned dance forms, it is really no surprise that round dances are considered part and parcel in contemporary square dance programs.

This fact seemed evident to us when we went through square dance class some 19 years ago. Our instructor included some easy rounds and mixers along with the square dance basics. And many of the "angels" who had been dancing for a number of years considered themselves square and **round** dancers. From the beginning, "square dancing" - for us - embodied **all** forms of the American Folk Dance. Over the years, we have endorsed that thought.

We have danced (rounds and squares) at the last 13 national square dance conventions and with many square dance clubs in many states. Granted, not all clubs offered round dancing - but after talking with those club officers and/or callers, we discovered it was because there was a lack of cuers/teachers not the lack of interest for round dancing.

Callers have told us one major reason they encourage rounds between dance tips is to take up the slack for

those energetic dancers desiring an additional outlet. For other dancers, it offers a well-earned rest period before the next square dance tip starts. Some callers tell us they program just so many tips a night regardless of whether there is round dancing or not.

The fact is round dancing does not detract from a square dance program nor does it take dance time away from square dancers. Callers have the option of re-setting the needle on a record two to three times for their patter call - include the singing call and an average tip runs between 10 to 12 minutes. Break time varies from club to club, but usually lasts from 5 to 10 minutes. Rounds for round dancing average 2 minutes 15 seconds and never over 3 minutes. Round dances almost always fit the break period to a "T". It is our belief that round dancing and square dancing always complement each other. The two, after all, have shared the good times together down through the years - it is our hope that the future holds more of the same.

On the Florida Scene - Punta Gorda will host the Spring Festival of Rounds on March 13-15. Leaders featured are Tom & Jan Kannapel of Louisville, Kentucky. Headquarters will be Howard Johnson Hotel located just a short walk from the hall. Don't miss this event. Also, don't forget the Florida Sunshine Festival on February 5-7, in Lakeland. Round dance sessions with Lovelaces, Blackfords and Jenkins. These leaders always offer a fine dance program. Be there.

Looking at the National Scene - Reaction to Roundalab's first Teacher Seminar/Clinic in Indiana was so positive last year that Roundalab will con-

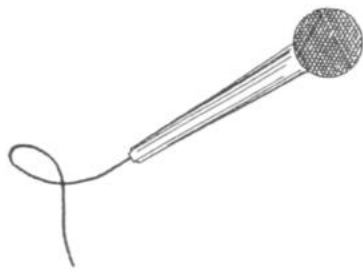
tinue to utilize the Wednesday between the conclusion of its annual meeting and the beginning of the 36th National Square Dance Convention in Houston to hold its second annual Teachers Seminar/Clinic at Stouffers Greenway Plaza Hotel in Houston. While this seminar/clinic is primarily for round dance teachers, any person interested in round dancing is welcome to attend. Advance registration will be necessary.

There will be three one hour sessions during the morning and three in the afternoon with a different topic and subject matter at each session. Luncheon, which is included in the admission, will be served around noon. The format will be a seminar/clinic presentation with audience participation followed by a question and answer period. Handouts will be provided.

THE CALLER REPORT

All aboard for 1987! Although a new calendar year is beginning, we find ourselves in the middle of a square dance season. Classes are well underway and club dance programs are enjoying crowds filled with happy dancers and our friends from the North who visit each year. Yes, sir, 1987 appears to be off to a grand start.

But at the point of this "new beginning", maybe we should stop for just a moment and evaluate what we callers are doing in our classes. Possibly we have become too involved in teaching that new dancer **execution** of figures rather than presenting the entire picture of square dancing.

Nationally recognized callers and square dance leaders have been talking about this lately, but I think it bears repeating. We callers do get so wrapped up in teaching execution of figures that we sometimes forget to inform the new dancer about the history of the dance. That aspect can certainly whet the appetite of that new dancer to do some reading on the subject and to

become more enthusiastic about the new activity he or she has found.

At many dances I attend, both as a caller or a dancer, I see dancers of years of experience walking through the figures with a normal stride as if they were going to the drugstore instead of square dancing. Are we callers emphasizing the shuffle step enough in our classes? If the new dancer, or the experienced one for that matter, can make a habit of using the shuffle step, it is easier to keep time with the music. It is easier to keep squares from wallowing out all over the floor and makes the dance that much more enjoyable.

Keeping time with the music is much easier for the dancer using the shuffle step and more attention should be directed toward stressing that point to new dancers.

Giving the new dancer ample opportunity to accumulate floor time is one of the goals of CFCA's Class Level Dance Series. The Winter Quarter dance program for beginners will certainly add to their floor time as well as

offer a chance for them to enjoy meeting and dancing with new friends. See our ad in this issue on the Winter Dance Schedule. Many of you might want to make the Recycle Dance on January 17 at the Winter Garden Auditorium. No, you can not "recycle" your partner but is a great chance to sell some of your tenderly cared for dance outfits that you no longer wear and to find some excellent bargains on new and slightly used apparel. The dance and recycle shop is an afternoon affair.

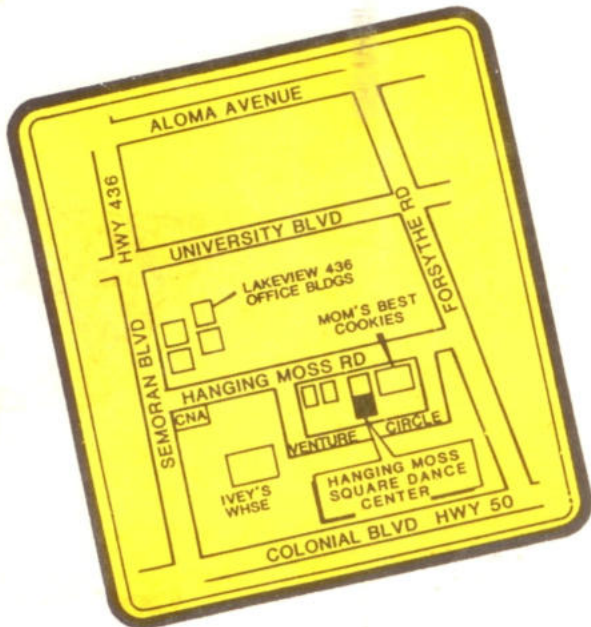
