All dues from clubs that wish to be or stay members of the Association were due July 15th and will become delinquent as of August 15th. So, please, get those dues paid up.

The meeting was held July 13th at the Robt. Meyer Hotel with ten clubs out of twenty represented. The Swinging Swampers of Folkston, Georgia with Dick Barker as caller have applied for membership in the Association and were accepted.

Virgil Green reported that news from the clubs for the Bow & Swing has been reaching him slowly and very sparingly. This is a good way of getting your special dances listed in the news columns of the Bow & Swing.

Harvey Chambers reported that the Fall Roundup is all set now and Caller Marshall Flippo has given his confirmation on the date. This will again be the week-end of the Florida-Georgia football game but it should give the square dancing football fans a place to go after the big game. June 13, 1969

TAXABLE STATUS OF CHARGES MADE BY SQUARE DANCE CLUBS.

Dues - paid by persons for membership in square dancing clubs which provide no recreational or other facilities for its members, are exempt.

Admission - Any charge made by any such club for admission to any event conducted or sponsored by the club is taxable.

Donations - Voluntary donations by guests or members are tax exempt.

Instructions - Charges for instructions in dancing classes or work shops are tax exempt.

Now you know? This is a monthly collection to be paid to the state.

Sept. 14 will be the next meeting of the association and Nov. 2 the following meeting. Elections will be held at the November meeting and a list of the candidates will be published in the September issue of the Grapevine.

More license plate square dance tags will be purchased as the first batch was sold out. Meeting was adjourned.

SQUARE DANCING IN NEW ZEALAND

30 Dunarnan Street
Dallington
Christchurch 6,
New Zealand
July 14, 1969

Dear Ray and Margaret,

A few words about square dancing in New Zealand. The Whirlaway Club was established in Christchurch in 1954 by a self taught caller, Ken Hunt. There were about 15 people in the club, and I was a raw recruit. Ken's calling was the old time, "Lady round the Lady, Gent follow through" kind of square dancing backed up by about sixty old 78 RPM records, and amongst this collection were eight of Les Gotchers first hashes.

After about a year Ken was killed in a motor accident and I inherited the club and have sort of run it ever since.

I didn't attempt any calling as I was far too selfconscious for that, so I ran a record club until 1964. There were 2½ sets of reasonably competent square dancers at this time.

Scotty Riley must have arrived in New Zealand about 1964 and we enjoyed his company greatly. Scotty obtained about fifty modern 45 rpm records for us through "Bows" of Jacksonville and there provided us with our first new material in ten years.

Late in 1965 a Canadian Caller arrived in New Zealand. His name was Art Shepherd and this was, at first, a marvelous event for New Zealand for he is a very good trained caller with a splendid voice. He set about organising square dancing in New Zealand. I took a calling course with him in February 1967 and since then have been calling.

Art Shepherd has practically organised us out of business with high pressure advertising, and sheer ability, coupled with the fact that I was going through the teething stage of learning to call. About half of my regular dancers went over to support him, leaving me with a set and a half of loyal dancers.

I then concentrated on forming learner classes and this is where I learned all about the difficulties and problems of becoming a caller. I still run a club night with my set and a half on Wednesdays and I seem to be very busy on one night stands nowadays. This is something I can do real well.

I have two regular groups going on alternate Saturdays, both are groups of farmer workers, one is at a place called Scargille, 53 miles north of Christchurch and the other is at Havavata, 38 miles West of Christchurch. Both average about six sets.

One of the problems we had to overcome was

the fact that the dancers bring their families along too. This has been solved with the assistance of an old friend of mine, Eric Bastian. Eric, who is over 65, has been in square dancing longer than anyone else I know, and he takes all the children 12 years and under in another room where he teaches them simple dances.

The one night stands are for Church youth groups, Country Western Clubs, Lodge groups and so on. I seem to average about one of these a week.

The Friendly Frolics Banner arrived in Christchurch during 1967 per Scotty Riley, and it was handed to the club committee ladies for them to put on the Whirlaway Emblem. It then went to Dunedin, 200 miles South of Christchurch to the Wagon Wheel Club. This club, which like ourselves is a record club, has about 50 members and at that time was the only other square dance club in New Zealand, although about this same time some of the members broke away and formed a small group called, "The Hands across the Sea Square Dance Club". They corresponded directly with Les Gotcher and obtained his records and this is all they dance to.

When the Banner arrived back in Christchurch two new clubs promoted by Art Shepherd had come into being. The Banks Avenue Twirlers and the Cathedral Squares. Scotty danced at all these clubs and asked Eric Bastian, who was club President for the Banks Avenue Twirlers, if he could arrange for these club Emblems to be added to the Banner.

Eric Bastian traced the Badge outline on a piece of thin rice paper, mounted this into a 35 mm slide frame and projected the image to the size to suit the Banner. The outline was then penciled onto a sheet of cardboard. This was then cutout to give a pattern which was in turn used as pattern to cut out white foam plastic letters with a razor blade. These were then sewn onto the Banner.

The Banner was taken around and displayed at various out of town one night stands, where it aroused considerable comment and interest.

I myself, did not see the Banner when it finally left New Zealand, because I no longer had anything to do with Art Shepherd or his groups and since then the Banks Avenue Twirlers have changed membership to such an extent that very few of the original members still go.

I often wondered if the Banner ever got home and obviously it did and I'm delighted to hear it.

Square Dancing never did really get going in New Zealand, probably because there were no trained callers, and secondly, the enormous difficulties of obtaining dance records. The government never would grant an import license or funds to obtain them. We had to rely on the goodheartedness of American

visitors and tourists.

I have entertained many couples of American tourists, and by explaining our difficulties in the way of obtaining records (which has really amounted to begging anyhow) we have managed to keep going by these people when they have returned to the U. S. sending us a few records. I have received many used records from Bill Gracey and Dave Taylor. Bob Osgood gave me four records when he visited us. Another visitor, Mr. Len Allen and his wife of Detroit, Mich. supported me with tremendously generous gifts of new records just at the time when I was starting to call and was desperate for material. In fact I would say it was the Allens support at this time that enabled me to become a caller. I could never had made it otherwise.

The situation is still the same really. I have to buy black market U. S. dollars at an exorbitant figure, and mail them out to someone in the U.S. in the hope that they will treat me honestly and send me some records back. I have to break our laws in doing this, but it's the only way to keep a little bit of American Culture going in New Zealand.

The other Caller (previously mentioned) has an enormous advantage over me by the fact that he has money in Canada that enables him to buy his records easily without having to break the law. However, in spite of this difficulty we still push on regardless and when the spring arrives, and people start to get away from their Tele sets I will be starting new classes. I have a 70 watt transistor amplifier, a variable speed turntable, two (fine speaker) columns, a four track tape and a 40(watt) watt standby amplifier wo I'm well set up for gear.

Reading through the square dance paper you sent me was an eyeopener. All those clubs, all those callers, all those regular dancers. In Christchurch right now I suppose we'd be lucky if we could round up 200 capable square dancers.

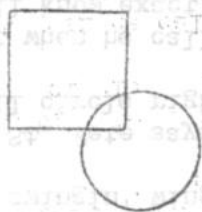

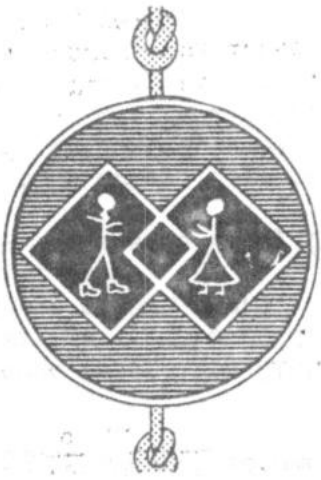
