LEGACY was formed to improve communication between the many facets of the square dance activity (dancers, callers, cuers, suppliers, publishers, etc.). Biennial meetings are held with invitations sent to various square dance leaders. Presently the approximately 250 members represent thirty-six states and three foreign countries. Some of LEGACY's objectives are:

- Provide guidance & tools to make club leadership easier.
- Improve the social aspects of square dancing.
- Develop programs to improve recruitment & retention of dancers.
- Motivate leaders to learn, share and demonstrate the standards of conduct and behavior most beneficial to enjoyment of square dancing and related activities.

WHAT IS A HEART ATTACK?

A heart attack is the death of a portion of heart muscle that may result in disability or death, depending on how much of the heart is damaged. It occurs when an obstruction in one of the coronary arteries prevents the blood from supplying oxygen to the heart muscle. Heart attack symptoms may include chest pain, nausea and shortness of breath. The risk of heart attack can be reduced by treating high blood pressure, avoiding cigarette smoking, observing a low cholesterol diet and maintaining normal body weight.

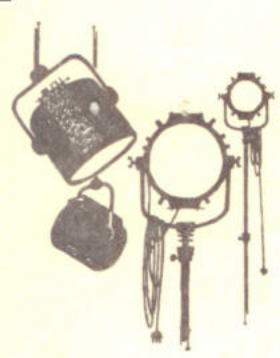


WHAT IS HYPERTENSION?

Hypertension is the medical term for high blood pressure. It occurs when the pressure the heart needs to pump blood is higher than normal. People who have untreated hypertension are more likely to suffer from heart disease and stroke. High blood pressure can be detected with regular blood pressure checks. 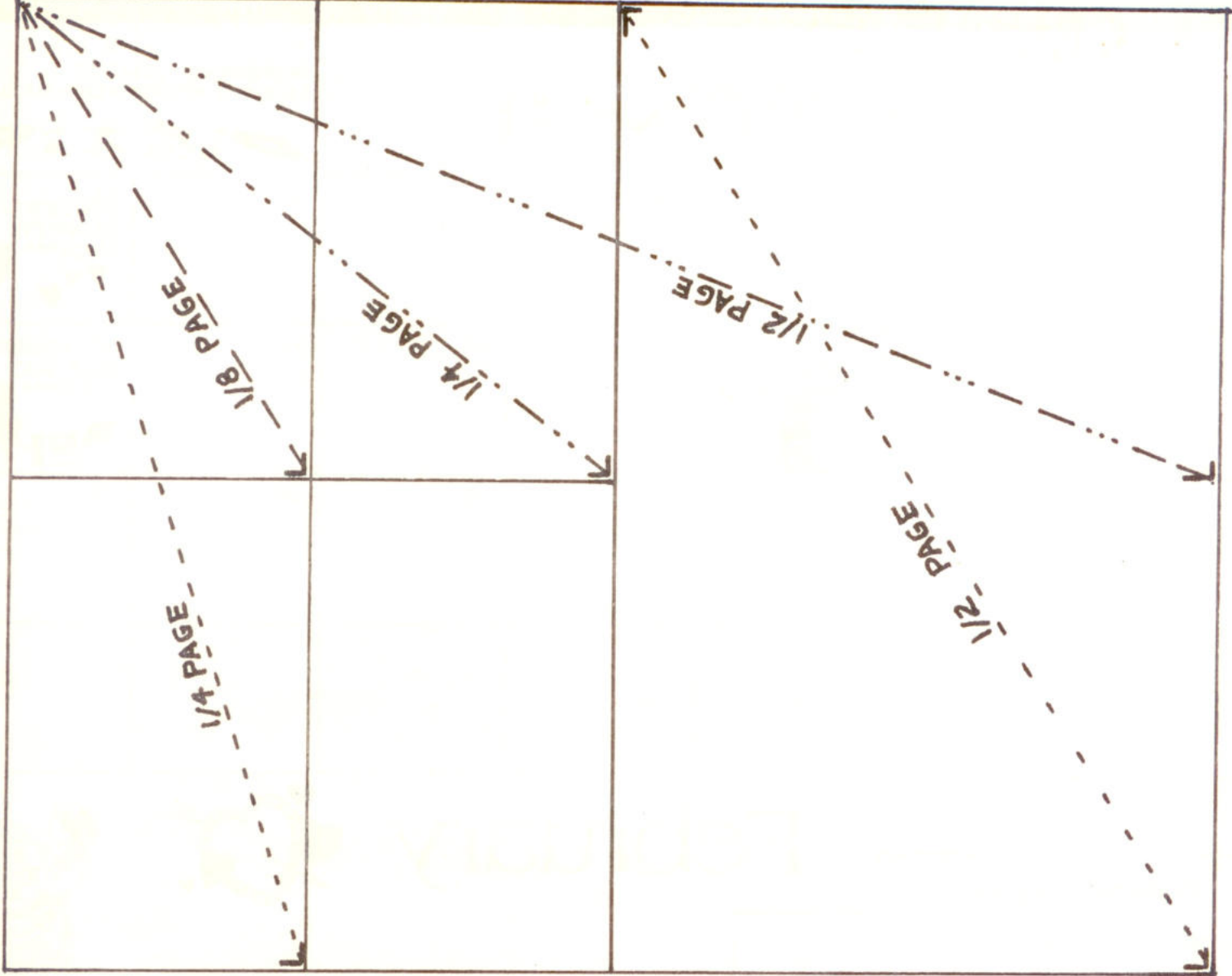

ADVERTISING CHANGING - SOON

In a companion article in this issue it was explained that soon the Grapevine will be published in Booklet Form and the reasons for the change.

A survey of five area printers revealed that the cost for 500 Flyers ranged from low of \$12.95 to a high of \$20.10. When you add the Grapevine insertion charge of \$10.00 the total charge for 500 copies is now from \$22.95 to \$30.10. A full page Grapevine Ad is \$20.00 which results in a savings to you of \$2.95 to \$10.10. Remember these costs are based on 500 copies. Grapevine subscriptions now exceed 530 and continue to increase with the influx of new dancers.

Each time that we have assembled the Grapevine we have run short of some advertiser's flyers. On at least one occasion we ran short of three different flyers. By placing the full page ad in the Grapevine you will be assured that your ad will reach EVERY subscriber and you will not be burdened with the cost of purchasing additional flyers as Grapevine subscriptions climb. We realize that change is usually difficult to accept but we sincerely believe that the new Format will result in considerable yearly savings to our advertisers that formally utilized flyers.

Heart Healthy Recipe

NIBBLES

- | | |
|---|----------------------------------|
| 5 cups dry cereal (such as oat circles, wheat squares, rice squares, puffed corn cereals) | 1/3 cup margarine |
| 2 cups pretzel sticks, broken in half | 4 teaspoons Worcestershire sauce |
| 1 cup peanuts or other nuts | 1 teaspoon celery flakes |
| | 1 teaspoon onion powder |
| | 1/2 teaspoon garlic powder |

Combine dry cereals to make 5 cups, and add broken pretzel sticks. In a saucepan, melt margarine and combine with Worcestershire sauce and seasonings. Toss with the cereals and add peanuts. Place in a shallow roasting pan. Bake at 275°F for 1 hour, stirring every 10 minutes.

Yield: about 8 cups Approx. cal/serv.: 1 cup = 320
1 tablespoon = 20

NOTE: To lower salt intake, use unsalted peanuts and pretzels.

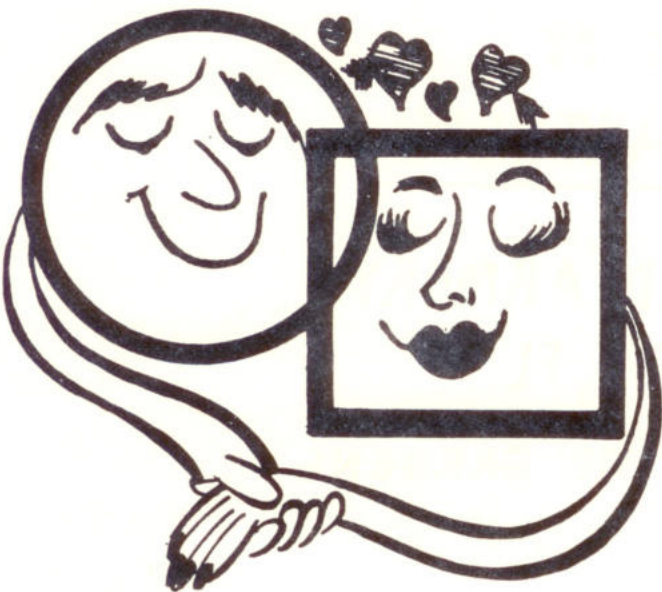

The history of the GV goes back many years and while we do not have previous copies of the GV, we do know that the GV has ranged from one sheet to 23 sheets of paper.

Most of the printing was done on a mimeograph machine. This equipment is in need of overhaul and a new one costs about \$2300. The past several issues of the GV have been printed by offset equipment. This process produces better quality and allows us the flexibility of pictures, reducing print copy, paste up art work, and last minute changes. However, it is more expensive.

The new process, in book form, will allow even greater flexibility. There will be fewer pages (because of reduction) and less weight to carry to the post office.

The booklet will be easier for our subscribers to handle and store. Therefore they will tend to keep back copies for review of information. Hopefully, we will have this new format designed for the April-May issue. Our biggest problem will be the inserts (flyer). There is an article on this problem elsewhere in this issue.

We hope you will enjoy this change in your GV and remember, your comments and suggestions are always welcome and useful.

Letters to the Editor

Dear Editor,

I have a sad story to tell—but it's important that I share it with as many people as I can.

I work as a Building Mechanic at the Atlanta Data Center. During my off time I work as a Paramedic in Gwinnett County.

On October 30, I was working on Gwinnett Ambulance #53 which serves the Buford area as well as Northeast Gwinnett County. It was a relatively quiet day with only one call all shift. At 11 p.m. my partner and I decided it was time to hit the hay. As usual, the phone rang around 2:30 a.m. "On the air for Code Z (emergency call). Within two minutes my partner and I were dressed and answering the radio. "225 Rail Road Ave., Signal 67 possible MI Code 2 (person down, possible heart attack, emergency run).

Running lights and siren to the scene we find Rail Road Avenue. Rail Road Avenue is 4½ miles long. We start looking for #225. To our surprise, there are no numbers on either the mailboxes or houses. We travel the length and back with no luck. Several minutes have already passed.

In a heart attack, the brain is without adequate oxygen. From zero to four minutes, the brain suffers relatively no damage. Between four and 10 minutes, brain damage begins. After 10 minutes, brain death.

We radioed dispatch to have the caller step out and flag us down. Several more minutes and we locate an hysterical wife. Fourteen minutes have elapsed from dispatch to arrival. We work 15 minutes on the patient. Nothing. Code 2 to the hospital, CPR (Cardio Pulmonary Resuscitation) in progress. The doctors work feverishly. Nothing. The man dies.

A man's life could possibly have been saved that night if the family, or anyone else, had bothered to put up some visible means of identifying their house, such as large numbers on the door or reflective numbers on the mailbox.

How expensive is it to go down to your local neighborhood hardware store and purchase some numbers that you can see from the road, day or night? It cost one man his life.

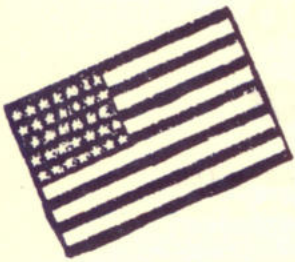

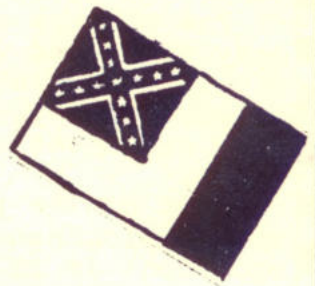

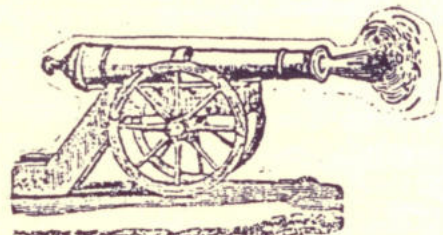

We believe that a Caller should make students aware of the related Round Dance activity. The use of Mixers, Line Dances, etc., will go a long way in teaching his students that dancing is "Movement of the Body to the cadence of music". In doing so he conveys his own feelings and sets the pattern of what their attitudes will be. On the other side of the coin, avid Round Dancers and Round Dance Leaders should be word and example encourage one and all to participate in both activities, while encouraging others to try Round Dancing. In the many years that we have remained active in both Round and Square Dancing, we have noticed that when attention is ISOLATED (SQUARES, ROUNDS, CLOGGING, ADVANCED, CONTRA; LEVELS:) it is only a matter of time until new statistics are added to an ever growing list of dropouts. We believe, Round Dancing will improve Square Dancing...Provide a perfect timer between Square Dance tips... provide a balance of group fun and personal satisfaction...decrease the number of dropouts...present greater variety...improve self image... and draw a dancing couple closer together. There is an old saying, "A Couple who dance well together live well together".

The procedures for establishing a ROUNDALAB Classic List were adopted by the ROUNDALAB membership at the fourth annual meeting in 1980. For this first year, the Classic List Committee, under the chairmanship of Roberta & Bruce Bird, compiled a listing using every known and available Classic List. Ballots were then mailed to all ROUNDALAB members who were asked to vote for ten easy level dances (up to 125 on the Fleck Point System), fifteen intermediate dances (126-250), and ten advanced dances (251 and higher) that they currently danced in their area. Stressed was the fact that members were to vote only for those dances they were using regularly and frequently.

The results of this balloting were discussed at the recently concluded fifth annual ROUNDALAB convention in San Antonio, TX. It was learned that there were insufficient advanced dances that met the initial criteria for an advanced list to be published at this time. The membership also decided that the judgement of ROUNDALAB members would be used, along with the Fleck Point System, to determine the level assigned to a dance within the lists. The first ROUNDALAB Classic List reflects these modifications.

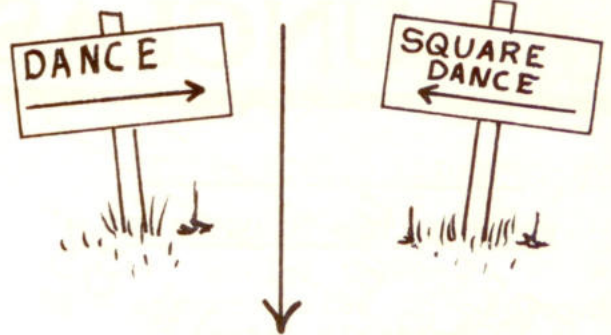

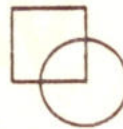
