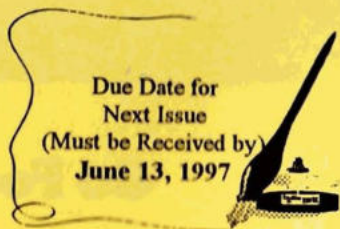

The Winter meeting of NWFSRDA was held in Panama City on January 18, 1997. Highlights are listed below:

- Current bank balance is \$5,235.03. Generally the budget looks good for the first quarter.
- Gary Ping, editor of the Panhandle Press, thanked everyone who submitted articles for the Jan-Mar edition and asked for more articles for the upcoming issues. Revenues were \$248.50 and expenditures were \$236.22. Hopefully ad and flyer income will cover expenses.
- The Vaccari's will attend the mid-year meeting of USDA. Joe and Joy will give us a report at the May 31 meeting of the Association.
- Julian Rosdick reported the 1997 Round-Up is set for October 24-25 in DeFuniak Springs. Need help with decorations. Call Julian (904) 837-1241.
- Audit for 1994-1996 period was completed. Audit results were satisfactory.
- Julian Rosdick was approved as Chairman of By-laws review committee and Tony and Patti Gee were approved as Chairpersons of the Award and Selection Committee for 1997 Dancer of the Year.

There are 9000 people already registered for the 46th National. We hope that you have signed up to attend the convention to help Northwest Florida exceed its goal of 100 people at the 46th in June. If you have not yet registered, please do so ASAP. Call Fred & Shirley for information (904) 934-0574. The "Magic Night of Harmony" on Wednesday night (\$8 per person) promises to be a really good show. The SEW & SAVE book can be used by both the beginner and experienced sewer, the crafter and the non-sewer. A real bargain for

only \$3! Get one for yourself and your non-dancing friends. The Convention Program book (\$3 before 4/30 and \$5 after) makes a great memento of the convention. Also, plan to attend some of the many seminars and panel discussions that will be presented on Thursday, Friday, and Saturday. They will be informative and offer a chance to learn while you take a break from dancing. There will be no seminars or panel discussions during the Fashion Show (entitled "To Kiss A Frog") so that we can all attend that fun event.

If you desire to submit a recommendation to change the By-laws please submit, in writing, your proposal to Julian Rosdick not later than May 1, 1997. If you feel a change is needed in this area, now is your chance to be heard.

Our own Pensacola Special Steppers, a handicapable club and Florida's Ambassadors of Square Dancing since 1987, held their 18th Anniversary Dance on February 1, 1997. Ragon Hall's Seaside Square Dance Club furnished the hall for this dance. Many thanks for this nice gesture. Two handicapable clubs from Alabama helped to make up the eight plus squares in attendance. The Special Steppers will perform at the 46th National. Don't miss their performance. 

FAN THE BOAT

STARTING

FORMATION: Facing Lines

DEFINITION: Ends walk forward around the outside, passing 3 people and face in (i.e. your part of Load the Boat), Centers Single Circle to a Wave, and Fan the Top.

TIMING: 10 beats

ENDING FORMATION: 1/4 Tag

DANCE

EXAMPLES: Heads Square Thru, Slide Thru, Right and Left Thru, FAN THE BOAT, Centers Recycle, Square Thru 3/4, Allemande Left.

Heads Lead Right, Circle to a Line, FAN THE BOAT, Ping Pong Circulate, Extend, Recycle, Allemande Left.

Heads Star Thru, Pass Thru, Slide Thru, FAN THE BOAT, Centers Swing Thru, Extend, Centers Trade, Ladies Run, Tum Thru, Courtesy Tum, Touch 1/4, Coordinate, 1/2 Tag, Single Hinge, Right & Left Grand.

Heads Pass Thru, Separate Around One to a Line, FAN THE BOAT, Extend, Swing Thru, Ladies Run, Star Thru, Trade By, Square Thru 3/4, Allemande Left.

Heads Lead Right, Veer Left, Bend the Line, FAN THE BOAT, Extend, Explode the Wave, Wheel and Deal, Square Thru 3/4, Allemande Left.

SINGING CALL: Heads 1/2 Square Thru, Slide Thru, FAN THE BOAT, Centers Recycle, Pass Thru, Swing Thru, Swing Thru, Swing Corner Promenade.

Convention Tours**

The City of Orlando Tour

The City of Orlando tour is a half-day tour of our host city for the 46th National Square Dance Convention. It will be offered twice each day Monday, June 23, through Friday, June 27, and Saturday morning. The tour is an entertaining and informative history lesson about the city known as the "Tourist Capital of the World". Orlando is a young community, first settled in the early 1840s. The first residents were Army volunteers who remained after the Seminole Wars. Orlando has 91 beautiful lakes located within its city limits. We'll visit some of the lakes and show you some of the more beautiful homes, both new and old. You'll see various architectural styles including Spanish, British, New England, Mid-Western, German, Scottish and Mission style.

On our way around town we'll pass various sports venues such as the Citrus Bowl, the Orlando O-rena, and Tinker Stadium where you'll hear the intriguing story of Orlando's own Joe Tinker. There are a number of sports stars living in our area. Perhaps, if we're lucky, we'll catch a glimpse of golfers Arnold Palmer, Gary Player, Nick Faldo or Tiger Woods, or Orlando Magic team members Penny Hardaway, Dennis Scott, Horace Grant, Nick Anderson and more.

We plan to stop by Church Street Station in Orlando's historic downtown entertainment complex featuring Rosie O'Grady's Good-Time Emporium and the Cheyenne Saloon & Opera House. You'll have time to shop, sneak off for a bit to eat, or join in on an old fashioned sing-along with Rosie O'Grady's Banjo Man.

On the way back to the Orange County Convention Center, we'll tell you a bit more about the community. There is so much to tell, we

can't quite decide what to omit or what to leave in, but rest assured, you'll hear many interesting facts about this wonderful area we call home.

The Harry P. Leu Gardens Tour

Our half-day tours of the Harry P. Leu Gardens begin Monday afternoon and continue twice daily Tuesday through Friday, ending Saturday morning. These beautiful gardens encompass nearly 50 acres of botanical collections. The flowers, shrubs and trees were collected from around the world. They feature over 2,000 camellia trees and an orchid conservatory filled with many tropical blooms.

The Rose Garden is one of the most popular areas of the Gardens, and is often used for weddings or other special events. This formal garden displays over 1,000 roses designed in the traditional European style and is the largest formal rose garden in Florida. It also features a central fountain surrounded by four gazebos on the corners.

The white garden is made up of shade-loving plants, including those with white blooms or green and white variegated foliage.

Near the palm and bamboo garden is a 50 foot floral clock made of imported plants from Scotland and installed in 1975.

The Harry P. Leu House Museum is a restored 19th century farmhouse named to the National Register of Historic Places in 1995.

You'll enjoy a leisurely stroll along meandering paths shaded by ancient oaks, forests of camellia and giant camphors.

Tour World Famous Gatorland

What would a vacation in Florida be without a visit to Gatorland? This 4-hour tour begins Monday morning and runs twice daily through Friday. The last Gatorland tour is scheduled for Saturday morning.

At last count there were nearly 5,000 alligators and crocodiles

and are some of the largest in the world, ranging in size from 6' to 14' in length and can weigh a half a ton. Alligators, close relatives of the dinosaurs, have prowled the swamps for over 20 million years.

We plan to arrive in time to watch the feeding of these bone-crushing, meat-eating alligators and crocodiles. But don't worry, the gators don't like square dancers. They prefer bowlers! If you're a bit squeamish, you can view the inhabitants from a three-story observation tower, far above the multi-toothed monsters.

In 1960 the alligator was listed as an endangered species. It now has recovered to the point that its population exceeds 1 million and can be found in all parts of the state of Florida. World famous Gatorland has been featured in many newspapers, magazines, TV shows and motion pictures.

St. Augustine- Founded When the World Was Still Flat

When this seaside fortress was founded in 1566, most of the world's academics believed the earth was FLAT! Sure Columbus sold his story to the Queen, but society for the most part thought he'd gone over the edge—or soon would. Pedro Menendez de Aviles didn't buy the FLAT idea. Instead, he was busy laying claim to a breathtaking stretch of beachfront property in the New World, soon to boom with activity. St. Augustine's architecture, cobblestone streets and mighty fortresses still reflect an age of discovery. Eventually the whole world (be)came (a)round. We hope you will come round, too.

St. Augustine is unquestionably the oldest, continuously occupied European settlement in what is now the United States. Forty-two years before English colonists established Jamestown and 55 years before the Pilgrims landed at Plymouth Rock, the Spanish founded St. Augustine, securing Spain's claim to Florida. Although the US took possession in 1821, the Spanish influence remained strong contributing to Florida's distinctive historical character. Now

(1
fully restored, the city of St. Augustine and the old fort, Castillo de San Marcos, vividly bring to life this Spanish heritage of early Florida.

Many visitors enter Florida with an eye toward the attractions and beautiful vistas and fail to realize they are entering the oldest-first-land of our nation. Pause for a few hours and enter the restored areas of the nation's oldest city - St. Augustine. The 46th NSDC feels it is important enough to offer the dancers a special tour with knowledgeable guides so you may enjoy a part of your American heritage in fascinating St. Augustine, Florida.

Soak Up Some Florida Culture

Tired of the same old routine? Is your idea of culture and refinement a cheeseburger and a football game? Got the urge to see some of the finer things in life? You're in luck!!!

When you come to the National Convention in Orlando don't miss the tour of the Charles Hosmer Morse Museum of American Art. The Morse Museum is distinguished for its collection of the works of Louis Comfort Tiffany. Unlike any other Tiffany collection in the world, these treasures include many windows that Tiffany designed himself.

In the main gallery is the tall, opulent stained-glass windows that are part of the Tiffany collection's claim to fame. A 40-foot tower section, the entry foyer, houses the massive 9-foot high Tiffany chandelier, dubbed an electrolier by its creator. Light filters through more than 150 pieces of emerald-green glass.

This is one tour that will delight art lovers. Many of the items have never been on display before. This tour begins Tuesday morning, June 24 and continues twice daily through Saturday morning, June 28.

Sewing Hints

Here are some sewing tips from the 1996 NSDC Sew Great Across The Lone Star State book.

- The hem on a circular skirt will never be lopsided if you pin the waistband across a hanger in a straight line. Let hang for five days before hemming. If the fabric is washable, dip skirt in water; hang up wet (don't wring). Let it drip dry and then hem.
- Helpful Hint: To maintain bright vibrant colors, first soak overnight in very strong vinegar or salt water. This will help set color fastness. Always wash in cold water and never dry in a dryer.
- To keep serger thread from unraveling, cover the cone with a tubular section cut from old pantyhose.
- Double gathering feet on your serger make it easy to gather and apply ruffles to the garment at the same time.
- It takes no more fabric to cut a bias ruffle and the benefits are increased fullness (due to bias edges) and more exciting results when using plaids and stripes.
- Cutting out your pattern accurately is a must. If the shoulder and center back seams are cut even 1/4" larger, 1 inch has been added to the neckline and the collar will not fit the garment you are making.
- Stitch In The Ditch - Stitch on the right side of the garment in the well formed by the seam. Use to secure facing and eliminate the need to slip stitch the inner edge of a waistband.
- If you have a long length of trim or lace to sew on a square dance dress, wind the trim or lace on a cardboard tube (paper towel roll); thread yarn or other soft material through the tube and hang it around your neck. The trim/lace will feed freely and directly into the machine. Also any leftovers will be ready for storage.
- Sew sequins on skirts or petticoat 1/8" from lower edge. Won't snag hose or men's pants.
- Use drapery shirring tape and adjust gathers. Makes evenly spaced gathers.

TIPS FOR BETTER DANCING

1. HOW TO AVOID BREAKING DOWN

- A. Keep the set small. Touching hands immediately after each call is one way to accomplish this. Large sets break down much more often than small ones.
- B. Always have your set lined up with the walls. Often a set will become slightly offset from being lined up with the walls; now a Cast Off or other turning motion may cause some people to become disoriented. If the caller has the square Promenade and has the heads or sides Wheel Around it is quite likely the set will not be lined up with the walls. Solution: Take it upon yourself to make slight adjustments on the next two or three calls to get the set aligned with the walls. One person can cause the entire set to adjust, so you be this person.

2. IF YOU BECOME COMPLETELY LOST

- A. Do not turn around. This will make it difficult for someone behind you to help you recover. It is much easier to guide someone into place by guiding them from the back.
- B. Turn your head in all directions to see where you should go. If someone says turn around or you see that you should turn around, then do it. Otherwise, retain your facing direction and let someone guide you into place.
- C. Do not wander around. Stay put until someone either guides you into place or directs you to go to a certain position. Do not be surprised to receive this help--expect to receive it and be ready to respond to it quickly.

3. IF YOUR SQUARE BREAKS DOWN, GET INTO FACING LINES. Do this by squaring your set and then have the HEAD COUPLE slide to the right to form normal facing lines of four (each boy with a girl on his right.) Now listen to the caller and watch the other squares. Often the caller will get the squares back to facing lines several times before finally getting to a Left Allemande. When he or she does get the floor to facing lines, your square can now pick up the next call and you are dancing again. You may not finish with your original partner or corner, but you are dancing and this is the name of the game.

This will not work every time, as sometimes the caller does not bring people back to facing lines before a Left Allemande, but it works enough to be worth doing. In fact, many callers will intentionally bring people back to facing lines in order to pick up those who have broken down early. If you do not accept his opportunity to resume dancing, you may have a LONG stand until the next Left Allemande.



LEGACY TO CONDUCT SEMINARS

LEGACY, the International Assembly of Trustees of the Square Dance Activity, in conjunction with the National Executive Committee of the National Square Dance Convention, will again conduct a series of six one-hour educational/leadership seminars in Orlando, Florida, in June 1997. The LEGACY Education Committee tries very hard not to duplicate, but to complement, the education sessions planned by the 46th NSDC Education Committee.

The selected Seminar topics are:

Planning a Mini-LEGACY--Jim and Janet Rothrock of Topeka, Kansas, and Doc and Peg Tirrell of Lower Waterford, Vermont, will lead this seminar as they examine, explain and discuss the major ingredients of a Mini-LEGACY. Leaders across the nation should attend this seminar to learn how to conduct an educational program for their own organizations. Subjects covered will include: the definition and purpose of a Mini-LEGACY; how to plan and conduct a Mini-LEGACY; guidelines for chairpersons, moderators and panelists; pre- and post-publicity and promotion; Mini-LEGACY topics; handouts and flyers; sources of information; administrative functions and the final wrap-up report.

Leaders Creating an Ideal Club Atmosphere--Al and Vera Schreiner, Oconomowoc, Wisconsin, Jack Brightwell, Huntsville, Alabama, and Richard and Linda Peterson, Greenbelt, Maryland, will present this seminar and discuss the items that make a typical club a "no-fun" club. They will lead a discussion of the components of an ideal club, to include the dance facility, club banner and bulletin board, display tables, club officers and members, caller and cuer, leadership training, classes, visitations, club specials, participation in area/state/national conventions, after parties, recognition of visitors and appropriate individuals, club members dancing with guests, taw, singles, and club fun activities.

Computer Applications in the Square Dance Activity--Ken and

Helena Robinson, Neshanic Station, New Jersey, and Jim and Barbara Connelly, Lower Waterford, Vermont, will discuss the use of computers by clubs and associations as applicable to the square dance activity. They will cover topics such as mailing lists, club newsletters, publications, club announcements, fliers, club records, graphics, dances, administration and financial activities, meeting agendas and minutes, club archives, and calendars.

Square Dance Attire--The New Versus The Olde Look--Rhea Brightwell and Peggy Segraves, both of Huntsville, Alabama, will discuss trends in square dance attire, pros/cons of square dance attire, the need for new guidelines, current "approved square dance attire," and will seek recommendations and comments from the attendees.

The Future of Square Dancing--Stan Burdick of Silver Bay, New York, and Jim and Jody Temple, Salina, Kansas, will try to unravel the past and the future for the square dance activity. They will discuss where we have been, where we are now, where we are going and how we will get there. They will also discuss leadership responsibilities as we try to regroup and apply positive actions to promote and perpetuate the square dance activity. Comments and recommendations will be solicited from the attendees.

Club Insurance and Incorporation--Lorraine Backus, Pine Bluff, Arkansas, and Jim Segraves, Huntsville, Alabama, will lead this very important seminar with a discussion of the types of insurance, purpose of insurance, how insurance is obtained for the club, its officers, members and callers. The need, purpose and procedures for incorporation of a typical club or organization will be discussed during this session.

These six seminars are offered to the new and time-honored club leaders and have been developed by leaders of the square dance activity representing many years of experience in leadership positions. These seminars are packed with information for our dancers across the nation. You will not want to miss any of the six LEGACY seminars.
