Did you know that the West Coast Square and Round Dancers Association has established a scholarship fund? The committee has done a lot of work to put together the requirements to qualify for a scholarship, and are planning to award one \$1,000 scholarship a year. The requirements are:

 Applicant must live within the West Coast Square & Round Dance Association boundaries.

- Applicant must be a West Coast member and a square dancer, and promote square dancing at the college level.
- Applicant must submit proof of acceptance to an accredited college or university.
- Scholarship money will be paid to the college for tuition.
- Applicant will receive the scholarship for a period of 1 year only. Must re-apply each year.
- o Application must be returned to the committee within 30 days of receipt of form.

How will the money be raised for these scholarships? A benefit dance will be held each year with all proceeds going towards this fund. The first Scholarship Benefit Dance will be Sunday, January 3, 2010 at Strawberry Square Dance Center in Plant City. Sam Dunn and Allen Snell will be calling and Charlie Lovelace will be cueing. Early rounds will be at 1:00 p.m. and squares will be from 2:00 – 4:00 p.m.

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If They Want to Make It Hip, They Shouldn't Call It Square Dancing.

Fighting 'Hay Bale' Stigma to Lure the Young; Do-Si-Do to U2, Michael Jackson, Tag Team

PORTLAND, Ore. -- Every other week, Paul Silveria gathers his friends, many of them tattooed habitués of the punk scene here, in warehouses or large houses and cranks up loud protest music.

Then, the 28-year-old steps forward, do-si-dos his partner, and begins to square-dance.

"Square-dancing here isn't really what people imagine it to be," Mr. Silveria says of the hybrid rock and square-dance moves he does. "It turns into a hoedown mosh pit."

In the 1950s and 1960s, square-dancing was big with young and old folks alike. Today, youthful dancers and "callers" like Mr. Silveria are increasingly rare. If this quintessentially American art form can't lure new blood, many aficionados fear, it could be heading toward its last dance.

To attract young people, square-dancing organizations are making efforts to modernize. To the standard repertoire of Dolly Parton and Johnny Cash, some callers have added Michael Jackson, U2 and hip-hop. To keep younger pupils hooked, instructors use collectible plastic badges that denote dancing milestones. Moves include flourishes such as dancing with a beanbag on your head.

The push has some purists grumbling that the true square-dancing tradition -- which arrived from France during colonial times and thrived as a social activity in rural areas -- is being ruined. In particular, older dancers complain that young people are too loud and don't respect traditional clothing or music.

Some square-dance organizers are trying to modernize these gatherings in an effort to attract more young people.

Despite the complaints, leaders stress that they must update or die. "It's scary," says Doug Schafer, 60, an active member of the Bonnie Lads and Lassies square-dancing club in Tacoma, Wash. His group has 69 active members, only 13 under the age of 35. In a survey conducted by the United Square Dancers of America, only 36% of dancers were under the age of 60 in 2005. Fewer than 1% were between 19 and 29.

Nationally, the number of square-dancers has declined to 300,000 from more than one million estimated square-dancers in the late 1970s, says Len Houle, president of the USDA. Responding to the grim numbers, a related group voted in June to spend \$22,000 revamping its Web site to feature video and younger dancers.

Attracting the young isn't easy, even in the Pacific Northwest, a bastion of square-dancing all the way back to the covered-wagon days. Organizers must battle a perception among young people that square-dancing is uncool.

For decades, children endured square-dancing taught by indifferent teachers in gym class. Many adults still grimace at the thought of another do-si-do, resurrecting memories of stepping on toes and listening to outdated music.

"We're trying to prove we're not square," says Ray Gallagher, chairman of the Pacific Northwest Teen Square Dance Festival. Fighting "the hay-bale and hillbilly stigma" can be tough.

Mr. Gallagher's annual festival is the largest of its kind left in the country and is credited with anchoring a robust young dancer community in the Northwest. In its heyday in the 1960s and 1970s, the springtime event drew 1,500 dancers from the Northwest. Now, Mr. Gallagher says he'll be lucky to attract 500 competitors. They come from all over the country, because so many other youth square-dance festivals have died.

Baleigh Marquardt, 15, describes herself as a "closet square-dancer." Concerned her high-school friends will make fun of her, she says that only a handful know about her weekly trips to the Maplewood Grange in Aurora, Ore., to practice dancing with the Canby Cloverleaves. In lieu of full prairie skirts worn over lace-trimmed petticoats, Ms. Marquardt opts for "toned-down prom dresses," without open backs.

A few miles north, at Kinton Grange in Beaverton, Ore., dancers sweat and spin, their footsteps thundering on the wood floor. Older dancers welcome half a dozen young dancers on the floor. One girl sports pink-tipped hair, black leather bracelets and a blue prairie skirt. Another boy uses a class ring to cinch his neck scarf.

During one dance, a white-bearded man wearing a pink neck kerchief twirls a 10th-grader so fast that she pleads, "I'm dizzy!" During breaks, younger dancers remove cellphones from belt holsters and begin text-messaging.

Among those twirling and texting is 20-year-old Amanda Roberts. Ms. Roberts recently was elected to the board of the Tualatin Valley Council of Square Dance Clubs. She is the youngest member by a few decades.

Since joining, she has begun a recruitment drive to find young dancers. She made a Facebook page for the Toe Draggers, the club she belongs to in Beaverton. She posts square-dancing fliers on high-school and college campuses, and joins online discussion groups to tell youths where they can find dance lessons. For all that, she's only recruited two people for lessons. Young people "think it's all Western. They have the wrong impression," Ms. Roberts says.

Sometimes it just takes the right incentives to convince people under a certain age to attend square dances. Charmaine Slaven, 29, helped launch a "Dare to Be Square" event in the Northwest two years ago to train new callers and musicians. This year's event sold out all 160 spots. Ms. Slaven's formula for success: cheap cover charges, no lessons required, and kegs of beer.

Teens used to have their own clubs, but because of the dwindling sizes of many organizations, many teen groups have combined with traditional clubs in recent years.

This creates some tensions. Christy Knierim, a 19-year-old dancer in Corvallis, Ore., says she and other youth were relegated by elders to the back corner of the dance floor. Elders worried about confusion when younger dancers switched male and female dancing roles. There were also concerns of "goofing off," she says. In time, the two groups have unified.

Other older dancers embrace the new culture. Down the road at the Oak Grove Community Club, George Hermann, a 62-year-old caller for the Oaky Doaks of Oak Grove, Ore., put on a backwards cap and shades and began rapping to "Whoop! (Square it is)," a square-dance version of Tag Team's 1993 hip-hop hit "Whoomp! (There it is)."

To a thumping backbeat, Mr. Hermann delivers his lines at a rapper's pace into a microphone: "Swing that lady round and round" and "do an allemande left."

Michael Kious, Mr. Hermann's grandson, was mortified as a young boy when he first heard his grandfather rap in front of an audience. But now, the 21-year-old Mr. Kious, a dancer himself, says his grandpa's rap is a favorite.

Mr. Kious met his wife, Lisa, square-dancing. Although they have encountered a handful of other young dancing couples online, the newlyweds realize they're a rare breed.

They say they enjoy dancing with older folks but acknowledge a generational divide. Younger dancers' faster pace, additional hip bumps and extra claps can cause some collisions with elders, many coping with knee replacements or arthritis.

"Sometimes we have to warn older dancers that they're in a younger square," Mrs. Kious says. "It can get crazy."

National Executive Committee

Just what is the National Executive Committee?

The National Executive Committee (NEC) brings you the National Square Dance Convention with all of its elements!

Each year beginning on Wednesday before the fourth Thursday, of June finds a square dance organization supported by its city presenting the most exciting square dance program in the World! National Square Dance Convention is the only convention in the world that brings all

forms of square, round, contra, clogging, country western, line and similar forms of dance together in one convention.

The NEC who owns the National Square Dance Convention and licenses a square dance organization and its partner city to bring dancers from around the world to this exciting event each year. National Square Dance Convention serves to provide dancer education with seminars and exhibitions.

The National Square Dance Convention provides leadership training and demonstrations. The National Executive Committee guides and advises the local volunteer organization utilizing the prior convention experience of its members.

Who is the NEC?

The National Executive Committee (NEC) serves as Directors of the National Square Dance Convention®. Each member is a past General Chairman of a National Square Dance Convention®. Only past General Chairman may serve as NEC members.

Each NEC member is assigned a geographical area of the US to which they serve as advisors available to provide information about the National Square Dance Convention®. A square dance organization within this area may contact the NEC member for information about how to bid for a national convention.

Each NEC member may also be assigned a phase of convention area operations to assist in planning, preparing, administering and follow-up with each convention.

When a square dance organization chooses to bid for a future convention, four NEC advisors are assigned to them to assist in the bid preparation and its presentation and continue as advisors to that organization when a bid is awarded until the completion of the convention.

GENERAL INFORMATION OF THE NATIONAL EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

A square dance was held at Riverside, California in 1952. They called it a National Square Dance Convention. It was a great success and plans were made to do it again in another part of the country. The dancers in charge of these first conventions met together and agreed on plans and guidelines for more Conventions. Thus the National Executive Committee (NEC) was formed.

Each Director is first a General Chairman of a National Square Dance Convention®. Being a General Chairman is the only way to becoming a Director of the National Executive Committee for the National Square Dance Convention®. This National Executive Committee selects the future Convention sites from among those meeting the requirements and submitting a bid. Criteria for selection are broad and based on dancers needs and desires.

A Pre-Convention meeting is held approximately 15 months prior to Convention. It is conducted by the Convention for their in-depth study, with the National Executive Committee observing and advising. Each member of the National Executive Committee is appointed as Advisor to a particular phase activity: Education, Program, Registration, Services, Other.

The National Executive Committee meets at least twice a year, spending a week each time at Pre-Convention and Convention. They are also responsible for publishing the National Squares magazine, which benefits the upcoming National Square Dance Conventions®.

Each Director is charged with a geographical area, and a bid inquiry from their area receives a prompt and informative response.

The assigned Director selects other Directors to a total of three/four to instruct the bidding square dance organization and the supporting convention bureau on procedures and requirements.

Prior to their first visit, they will forward all necessary forms and details for submitting a bid.

The bidding city is required to pay travel expenses and furnish hotel/motel accommodations for this and a minimum of one other visit. Should any additional visits be needed, prior to presenting the bid, the bidding city requirements remain the same as outlined for the first two visits.

The NEC President and NEC Advisors must approve any additional visit(s). These Directors serve as Advisors during the bid process and to the successful bidders in all phases of the Convention until the Convention is completed and a Final Report is submitted.

There are no paid employees and no salaries. All time is gratuitous on the part of the Directors.

A percentage fee, from Convention Registrations only, is paid to the National Executive Committee to offset expenses.

No fees are collected from Vendor Booth rentals or other items.

Authorized National Executive Committee expenses include:

- 1. Equipment
- 2. Clerical and promotional expense
- 3. Postage
- 4. Telephone
- 5. Statistical reports
- 6. Special awards and plaques at conventions
- 7. Certain expenses of the National Executive Committee for the Pre-Convention meeting or any specially called meeting.

The Directors pay their own Registration fee, Program Book, etc., travel, and expenses when attending National Square Dance Convention®.

The hosting city is required to furnish hotel rooms to all members of the National Executive Committee for their stay at both Pre-Convention meeting and the National Square Dance Convention®

A special luncheon on Friday of the Pre-Convention meeting is hosted by the local Convention and Visitors Bureau (CVB) for the VIPs of the city so they may learn about National Square Dance Conventions® and how their departments' involvement is critical.

Cost of the meals for the National Executive Committee and city officials is the responsibility of the hosting city.

Director Members of the National Executive Committee are added approximately 90 days prior to their Convention and serve continuously on the committee until they retire, decease, miss two consecutive Conventions, or are removed from the Committee.

They are all active square dancers and are available for discussion with any square dancer.

They may become Member Emeritus upon retirement. They are never replaced.

Convention Attire

As a result of an NEC members solicitations for comments regarding the request to relax the Dress Code at a National Square Dance Convention, the following letter was received.

Thank you for all of your hard work. I am sure that you never thought that you would have to come up with a set of rules to tell adults what is appropriate to wear to a National Square Dance Convention. The following are some of my thoughts on the subject. I realize that there are many people and many points of view thank you for letting me express mine.

Can anyone really prove that denim blue jeans and a knit T-shirt are cooler than a prairie skirt and a peasant blouse? Or prove that a snug knit T-shirt is cooler than a loose woven cotton men's shirt? Show the numbers.

The hottest part of a ladies ensemble is the panty hose. There has never been anything written that says you will be checked for panty hose at the door.

Neil Diamond's "Forever in Blue Jeans" was a great song but I have out grown that attitude along with the jeans that I wore that year.

If you want to get a lot of women back into skirts just take a picture of them from the back after they have danced a tip. Those knit T-shirts ride up over the hips and back sides and accentuate the positive. They cling to and outline the love handles.

The decorative pockets on blue jean backs call attention to something better left unnoticed. Have a photographer, seated on the side lines, take pictures at eye level of the backs of ladies in jeans and this whole debate will be over.

Don't leave out the guys. Tummies are not shown to their advantage when active dancing causes the T-shirt to pull out in the front. As the belt buckle goes down and the arms go up there is a gap that should not be seen. This gap can occur in back, resulting in crack exposure if the man bends forward. T-shirts also show hairy sweaty armpits. Do you really want to swing with a damp gorilla?

At a convention we are going to be on show. There will be people watching us. There will be newspaper and TV photographers. Do you want to be seen in jeans and a T-shirt on the national news? When "Square Dancing" is mentioned to most people their first thought is our fancy flying skirts. Let's not disappoint them.

It's too much trouble and stress to get changed and go to a dance. Why should we stop with jeans and T-shirts? Let's not get changed at all! Pajamas and night gowns. What! You don't sleep in any thing? That won't bother us, just come in the nude.

You dress to honor the people that you are with. If you show up to a dance in the same clothes that you wore to mow the lawn what does that say about the value you place on the people and the activity. Why bother with going to the dance at all?

Karate students would not think of entering a dojo without being in the proper attire. This is out of respect for their teacher, respect for their heritage and respect for themselves. Basket

ball, football, soccer, and other sports all have their uniforms. Just as "suiting up" for a game gets you ready for the competition, "dressing up" for a square dance puts you in a party mood.

There will be a lot of problems if casual dress becomes the norm for all square and round dances. Club names are going to have to change.

- 'Shirts & Skirts' will become 'Tanks & Tube Tops'
- 'Boots & Slippers' will become 'Sneakers & Flip Flops'
- 'Ruffles & Rivets' will be shortened to 'Rivets'
- 'Denim & Lace' will be shortened to 'Cut Offs'
- Club outfits will be matching T shirts and old jeans
- Calls will have to change. How is a sight caller going to get couples back together if he can't tell the guys from the gals.
- Uni-sex haircuts and uni-sex outfits will result in uni-sex dancing. "Swing someone and promenade somewhere."
- Why bother to "Swing and twirl your pretty girl" if there is no skirt to swirl. Swirling skirts and fancy shirts decorate the hall and show that it is a place for square dancing.

If everyone is in jeans and T-shirts you might as well hang out at the local bar. If you dress like a square dancer, you feel like a square dancer. If you feel like a square dancer you are a square dancer.

Have you ever looked down on a square or round dancer from a balcony? The sight of the spinning skirts and colorfut shirts as they follow the caller form a kaleidoscope of color. As the dancers weave through the maneuvers the patterns form and re-form. It would not be the same if it was a bunch of people in jeans and T-shirts.

Square dance clothes are for the fun of it. Get wild and wear the colors and prints that you would never wear anyplace else.

Too much lace – never!
Inappropriate color – says who?
Plaid and flowers on the same dress – delightful!

Some people claim that they can not afford a special set of clothes for dancing. Outfits do not have to be expensive. They are certainly cheaper than a lot of those jeans and T-shirts. A prairie skirt and a blouse can be worn anywhere. The man's shirt does not have to be a fancy embellished western style, any long sleeve shirt will do. A closet full of dance clothes is not necessary. Those who have a dozen color coordinated outfits choose to dress that way for the fun of it.

The Dress Code should be very short and basic:

Men – Long sleeve shirts and long pants Women – Skirts any length
