CALLERLAB Viewpoints

Team Dancing – Teamwork – The Future

When I'm teaching new dancers, I stress that they are a team of eight as they dance in their squares. They help each other as they dance, and if one or two dancers in the square "draw a blank" for just a moment, the other six or seven dancers can help in a cooperative way to insure the success of the square.

At some point in our dancing and calling, each of us will eventually have a decrease in concentration and need a little guidance to be successful. No matter how good or proficient we are, none of us achieves total perfection. We are human, and as they say, "To err is human".

So as necessary as our teamwork is in each tip we dance, teamwork is an absolute necessity in our new dancer programs, in our clubs, and in our associations.

Our successful new dancer programs don't just happen by accident. It takes planning and it takes teamwork! We need people to accept the donations, and help those attending sign in when they arrive. We need people to actively act as greeters and as hosts before the class starts, during the entire evening, and as dancers go out the door. These hosts and hostesses should be chosen and/or assigned; but in reality, all club members should be actively greeting new dancers, encouraging them, dancing with them, and sharing in the fun. Most importantly our club dancers should be getting to know the new dancers on a personal basis because it's the social part of our activity that keeps most of us coming back year after year.

At every club dance, association events, state and national convention, or week-end festival, it's a team effort to make it go smoothly. Those running the event act as hosts by greeting and welcoming the dancers as they come in. Decorations, serving refreshments, setting up chairs and tables, and cleaning up after the event are all things that are better accomplished by a team of people rather than just a couple individuals. If issues come up that need resolving, the team of leaders in charge of the event are there to handle them right along with the regular duties they all perform during the event.

I strongly believe that we have one more level of teamwork to achieve. We're almost there, but in my opinion, we haven't totally succeeded. It's the teamwork of all of our national organizations.

We are at a point with our favorite recreation, that we can no longer afford to clash in our efforts to promote and preserve our dance. We must have all of our national organizations working together as a team to succeed and grow again. We need to support each other at every level of involvement because in reality, we all have the same goal of sharing the joy of this dance with more people.

Society and life in general has changed immensely in the years since our dance activity enjoyed its peak in terms of numbers. If you read the history books, the same was true at the turn of the last century until Henry Ford's book came out in the 1920's and dancing took off and grew again. There were many changes in society back then that contributed to a decreased number of dance participants, and the same thing has happened with all the changes in the last thirty years.

It's so easy to waste precious time and point fingers at each other, or say that one or two things have caused a decrease in our numbers. Yet intellectually, we all have come to realize that there are many factors that have not only affected the clubs in our dance activity, they have had no impact on the numbers in most service clubs, church groups, and other hobby and recreational organizations.

On the positive side, I truly believe that we are now at a point where a growing number of people will want and need more social contact with others. Our activity is the perfect recreation to offer that needed contact and so much more.

We have the benefit of exercise, mental stimulation, social interaction, and all the physical and emotional benefits that laughing and moving to music have to offer. Throughout the history of mankind, dancing has been associated with the celebration of life, and it's that very thing that makes our dance activity the perfect primary or secondary recreation for people in modern society.

So this is where teamwork and the future are tied together. If we are to succeed in promoting and preserving our dance for our kids, grandchildren, and future generations to enjoy, all leaders, clubs, local associations and national organizations need to support each other and leave the finger pointing, laying blame, and petty personal issues behind.

Now I know that human nature, personal egos, and conflict are probably genetically wired into us. I recently saw a preview for an upcoming movie about babies in various parts of the world. What struck me like a large hammer was that these little babies, without any training, began to fight with each other over a rock, a toy, or even personal space. It's part of our nature.

My deepest hope is that we leaders can use our educated minds to get past these preprogrammed selfish urges to battle with each other, sweat the small stuff, and find a way to realize that we are all on the same team. By understanding this part of our human nature, agreeing to disagree at times, accepting the vote of the majority even though it's not our won,

and continuing to stay involved because our love the activity is our main driving force, we can make more progress together.

All organizations are fulfilling a need in this activity, and I truly believe we are all spokes in the same wheel. If we support each other, attend and promote each other's events, and put more effort into working together as in the ARTS (Alliance of Round, Traditional, and Square Dance), we can succeed.

There are successful clubs, associations, and events happening in many parts of the world. There are dance leaders, callers, and cuers enjoying increased numbers because they have found a way to make it work for them in their area. Let's share these success stories, be receptive to learn from those that are enjoying this increase, try new ways, and succeed together.

We need a long-range master plan with progress points, measurable goals, grants, and continuing fund-raising activities for marketing and promotion just like other recreations. We also need to get our "team act" together and allow our activity to evolve so that different forms of our product can reach and be available to more people in our current and future modern society. We need to accept and be more tolerant of all different groups and their form of our dance, even though it's not the group or the part of our activity we personally participate in or can even relate to.

When we all get to the point where we really understand the value of working together, supporting each other, and become a team together, I truly believe we can succeed beyond our wildest dreams. Our dance can be that good and that much fun!

What Else Can I Do To Support The Lesson Class?

The several thoughts/suggestions below are not listed in any order of importance. You are encouraged to take these and adapt them to your local class/club programs.

- 1) Greet each new dancer when they arrive like you are really glad to see them.
- 2) Use lots of encouraging word[s] like "You're doing well". Notice what's right.
- 3) Class coordinator keep individual list of missed calls if a new dancer is absent give it to them when they return
- 4) Offer 'pre-class' sessions for those who miss a week and/or are struggling with a call(2)
- 5) Provide a permanent name tag early in the season. Make them feel like they belong.
- 6) Offer the opportunity to buy, or give, the booklet with call definitions.
- 7) Provide a listing of websites with information

- 8) Provide a list of calls weekly or a complete list
- 9) Use other types of handouts. Styling tips, 10 Square dance commandments, positive quotes.
- 10) The same angel for new dancers all year.
- 11) Split couples with their permission maybe only on a night by night if they are struggling.
- 12) Be quick to fill squares where needed.
- 13) Enthusiastic caller/teacher.
- 14) Put dance in the class not close order drill. Treat every class as a dance.
- 15) Mix and talk with the new dancers during breaks. Be observant for loaners. Listen to comments.
- 16) Social time during breaks. Beverage/snacks
- 17) Sociability will keep them coming back.
- 18) Discourage formation of cliques.
- 19) Discourage 'pat' squares.
- 20) Include 'new dancers' in club non dance activities.
- 21) "Party Night" No teaching, just reinforcing and dancing.
- 22) Develop friendships. Ask about their families, jobs.
- 23) Offer to pick them up and take them to class.
- 24) Include them in after class/dance social coffee/pizza time.
- 25) Take them to and dance with them at student dancers.
- 26) Let them know you make mistakes too.
- 27) Let them know we were all students at one time.
- 28) Direct all questions to the caller/teacher.
- 29) Do not try to be a second teacher when the caller/teacher is instructing.
- 30) Do not push/pull, instead point, gently guide, be where you should be. Help should be subtle.
- 31) Have patience. Is your attitude showing?
- 32) Never walk out of a square.
- 33) Invite the new dancers to a club dance.
- 34) Include the new dancers in a club dance.
- 35) Do not tell the new dancers early on how many lessons are involved, but do not lie if asked
- 36) Sell the benefits low impact aerobics, mind stimulus, fellowship.
- 37) Keep sessions relaxed, fun, non threatening.
- 38) Give the new dancers the opportunity to see optional dress styles.
- 39) Free first night, maybe one or two more.
- 40) Be positive attitude.
- 41) If a new dancer misses, follow up with a phone call.
- 42) All members angel as often as possible. You are the club in the eyes of the new dancer.
- 43) Club has the responsibility to win them over. The caller/teacher to teach the calls.
- 44) Let them request singing call music. Use sing along music.
- 45) Use up tempo cheery music.

- 46) Be careful of your body language.
- 47) Make caller/teacher aware of problems you see.
- 48) Use humor where and when possible. Keep it fun. Promote laughter.
- 49) Lots of communication between the caller/teacher and the class coordinator/officers.
- 50) Practice proper styling/Be on time.
- 51) Learn the new dancers' names.
- 52) Think of each class/dance as the last on you will ever attend. How do you want to be remembered?
- 53) Teach square recovery.
- 54) Smile wear a happy face. Is your attitude showing?
- 55) Sacrifice teach schedule to keep frustration to a minimum.
- 56) Treat them as individuals make them feel important.
- 57) Occupations may affect how they learn.
- 58) The more important a person is in their private life their learning frustrations may be more visible.
- 59) Dancers never make mistakes they get creative.
- 60) Let the new dancers have fun at your expense.
- 61) Olympic, finish.
- 62) Have a Plan Work the Plan!

Point of Order

Are You A Giver Or A Taker? By Charlie Norman, Pointe Claire, Quebec American Squaredance April 1987

It will soon be that time when square dance clubs are looking for people to serve on club executive committees. I would like to share some thoughts on the subject with you.

My wife and I have been square dancing for over seven years during which time we served four years on the club executive committee (including as president), and now work on various smaller committees. The time spent has been fulfilling, rewarding and yes, at times frustrating, but I would strongly recommend that anyone given the opportunity should readily do so.

Do you know how hard it is to find good people to serve in positions of importance which affect the future of your club? True, there are those dancers with legitimate reasons for being unable to serve, but on the other hand there are those who just don't want to get involved.

Maybe you've been asked to serve and are hesitating, having some doubts if you could handle the job. We are all unsure about new things; it's part of our nature. Remember, when making up your mind, that there are always other people to help you. Those who have held the same position in the past are a storehouse of information, and your fellow executive committee members are there to help you. There are more plusses than minuses in serving on a committee. The positions are not demanding. In turn, you get to know more people, make new friends, and help out an activity from which you derive so much enjoyment. Don't cheat yourself. Do it and have some fun.

I've learned to classify people into "givers" and "takers." Takers turn down all requests to serve their clubs, no matter how small the job. Then come to a dance, enjoy themselves, and leave with no thought of the effort it takes to put on a dance. These people are the first to complain if something is not to their liking. Can you imagine the state the club would in if all the members were "takers?"

Perhaps you really can't serve on an executive committee and don't have the time for other small committee work. You can still be a "giver" and help the club in many ways.

- 1. Offer to take the place of those always at the "sign-in" desk so they can dance.
- 2. Help put out tables and chairs at refreshment time. There is always a need for willing hands. Or offer your services in setting out food and cleaning up.
- 3. Stay behind after a dance and help put away chairs and tables, and take down decorations.
- 4. Offer to Photostat flyers or other club notices, if you in a position to do so.

5. Host a visiting caller or cuer if you have a spare bedroom.

I am sure you can think of many other small ways to help out in the day to day activities of the club. Just keep your eyes and ears open – you'll see them.

It's important that all dancers take turns serving the club. We can really take advantage of the "givers" who are always willing to work. Many of us take it for granted we can get these people to serve, but is it really fair? Why no let "givers" retire for a while? Let them come to a dance "just to dance", to forget the club and square dance problems. You can bet in no time, they'll be back to work again for the club with renewed vigor.

Do you know the highest instance of dropouts in the activity? It's people who have served as club presidents. Do you know why? I think it's simple lack of gratitude for all their hard work. I say it's about time clubs starting paying tribute to those "givers" in their midst — dedicated people who devote much time and effort so that we dancers can have a good time. It doesn't have to be anything fancy, just some recognition.

M<y wife and I worked hard during our years presidents, it being the twenty-fifth anniversary year, and planned special events as well as coordinating a reunion weekend. At the end of the club year, we were called up on the stage and thanked and Jennifer was given a bouquet of flowers. That meant a great deal to us.

Why not try "giving?" You and your club will be better for it.
