It's been another busy weekend! Friday night I was at Strawberry Square for Gary Brown's last night of calling there.



VISITING MICHIGAN – THE I-94 CORRIDOR

Interstate 94 (I-94) is the main expressway running between Chicago and Detroit. Along this route are the cities of Kalamazoo, Battle Creek, Jackson and Ann Arbor. Halfway between Chicago and Detroit is the city of Kalamazoo. Located just south of the Kalamazoo/Battle Creek International Airport is Air Zoo of Kalamazoo, a truly unique aviation museum. Some of the displays in the museum include Magic Planet, Guadalcanal Memorial Museum, Michigan Aviation Hall of Fame, Michigan Space Science Center, the world's largest hand-painted indoor mural, and more than 50 rare and historic aircraft. Also on the grounds are various amusement park-style rides and attractions. For more information on the Air Zoo, visit the website at www.airzoo.org. Just north of the city of Kalamazoo is the village of Hickory Corners, the home of the Gilmore Car Museum. The museum offers a world-class collection of over 200 vintage cars. Also located on the 90 acres are restored historic barns and period buildings. The Museum's interpretive center is a 1930's era Shell Gas Station. The National Miniatures Museum is also located on the grounds. It contains one of the most impressive collections of scale miniatures in the country. For more information on the Gilmore Car Museum, visit the website at www.GilmoreCarMuseum.org or call 269-671-5089. Fort Custer National Cemetery is a 770-acre federal cemetery. The cemetery is located at 15501 Dickman Rd., Augusta. The entrance is lined with 152 American Flags and each of the 50 state flags. The cemetery is the burial site of several World War II German Prisoners of War and an unknown Civil War soldier.

For more information on the cemetery, go to www.puremichigan.org and type "Fort Custer National Cemetery" in the search box. Binder Park Zoo is located just outside Battle Creek. The zoo is on 433 acres of natural forest and wetlands. The zoo has approximately 600 specimens of over 140 species, including one of the largest giraffe herds in the country. There are 32 rare and exotic animal exhibits plus 19 domestic animal exhibits. For more information on Binder Park Zoo, visit the website at www.binderparkzoo.org. If you like NASCAR, then Michigan International Speedway (M.I.S.) is for you. Located southeast of Jackson, near the town of Brooklyn, M.I.S. is a 2-mile oval track with 18 degree banking and 73-foot wide sweeping turns. The M.I.S. has a 12,000-seat grandstand. There are races scheduled on June 17 (RainEater Wiper Blades 200 ARCA Racing Series-NASCAR Sprint Cup Series), June 18 (NASCAR Nationwide Series 250), and June 19 (HELUVA GOOD! Sour Cream Dips 400-NASCAR Sprint Cup Series). Come to the convention early and enjoy a day at the races! For more information on MIS, visit the website at www.mispeedway.com. The Cascade Falls of Jackson is a man-made waterfall with six immense fountains, three reflecting pools and sixteen falls, eleven of which are illuminated with multicolored electric lights. The display is 500 feet long, 64 feet wide and 60 feet deep. Enjoy a variety of music, and, if your timing is right, fireworks are shown several times a year. For more information on Cascade Falls, visit the website at www.visitjacksonmi.com/cascade-falls. Located in the historic Kerrytown District of Ann Arbor is The Sunday Artisan Market. The open-air market offers a variety of wares, including glass, textiles and fiber arts, wood, ceramics, jewelry, painting, drawing, photography, basketry, metalwork and more. Hart Plaza is located on the Detroit River between the Ren Center and Cobo Hall. Stay for a couple days after the convention, and join the **700,000** people on the plaza enjoying the fireworks on Monday, June 27. Find your viewing spot early, as people start arriving at the plaza around 2:00 p.m. While in Detroit, tour the 60-room, English Cotswold-style estate of the

Edsel and Eleanor Ford House. The estate features magnificent architecture, beautiful lakefront grounds and gardens, a collection of fine and decorative arts and much more. Lunch is available in The Tea Room. Public tours are available Tuesday – Saturday, 10:00 a.m. – 4:00 p.m. and Sunday, Noon – 4:00 p.m. Visit the website at <u>www.fordhouse.org</u>. **Mariners' Church** is a designated National Historic Site. The 160-year-old church has beautiful stained glass windows, a 4100 pipes organ, 2 organists and a professional choir. "The Maritime Sailors' Cathedral" is mentioned in the Gordon Lightfoot song "The Wreck of the Edmond Fitzgerald" as its bell rang 29 times, once for each life lost in the freighter's sinking. It is the riverfront and civic center's oldest structure. Sunday services are held at 8:30 a.m. and 11:00 a.m. with the full choir performing at the 11:00 service. The church is located just west of the Ren Center and Windsor Tunnel Entrance. For more information on the Mariners' Church, check the website at <u>www.marinerschurchofdetroit.org</u>.

MACKINAC ISLAND TOUR

The 60th National Square Dance Convention will be held in Detroit, Michigan. Michigan is one of seven states that have the Great Lakes on its borders. Michigan's magnificent coastland gives its reputation as a Water Wonderland State. The Tours Committee simply had to include several tours that provide visiting square dancers a chance to enjoy a memorable tour of one of its renowned vacation attractions-one of them being Mackinac Island.

The Mackinac Island State Park is located off the northern tip of Michigan's Lower Peninsula. Visitors reach the island by a twenty-minute ferry ride from the mainland. The island culture is one that embellishes an early American history of fur trading and fortress life. One can feel the slow pace of the past as you walk the small town streets and appreciate the island's natural surroundings.

Motor vehicles are not allowed on the island. Mackinac Island transportation is strictly horse drawn carriages and bicycles with either single or double seats. It is a natural theme park of early America when the island was essentially an early military fort protecting the coast land from the British during the War of 1812. The quaint shops, its historical military fort, small cottages, and sweet confectionaries offering eating delights, such as pastry, fudge, ice cream, and taffy goodies, are fun experiences. It is a vacation spot that encourages you to relax and enjoy the scenery with family, its citizens demonstrating the island's historical 19th century Americana. The beautiful Grand Hotel is easily seen when the ferry brings visitors into the Island Ferry dock.

Being at the top of the Lower Peninsula of Michigan, it can be a little nippy in the summer evenings, so bring a light jacket or sweater with you. Sleeping at one of the fine hotels should be outstanding, especially when the fresh air wakes you up to a picturesque sunrise just before breakfast. An added plus to taking this tour is getting to see the beautiful, 5-mile long Mackinac Bridge. Illuminated at night, it provides a gorgeous setting for a snapshot. It will be unforgettable.

TORONTO-NIAGARA TOUR



Detroit shares the Detroit River with its Canadian neighbors of Windsor, Ontario. Detroiters have a heartfelt connection with its Canadian neighbors. The Tour Committee felt that an overnight tour to the great city of Toronto would excite any square dancer who seeks a little international adventure. Toronto, Ontario is known as the "New York" of Canada. Its metropolitan flamboyance is well known. Toronto has its unique flair of city life and culture that will dazzle anyone interested in experiencing Canada for the first time. The guided tour will take you to downtown Toronto to see the CN tower and a ferry to Toronto Island. The tour travels

through a vast parade of ethnic communities in their neighborhood locations. Dinner and a theater play are also planned for that evening. **Don't forget to bring your passport.**

One cannot go to Toronto without stopping at Niagara Falls, located an hour away along the Lake Ontario coastline. This bonus side tour to the famous Niagara Falls encompasses not only a view of the water cascades but also a bonus of shops, botanical centers, historical sites, and a few wineries. This whole overnight trip is truly a winner.

FRANKENMUTH & CHRISTMAS WONDERLAND

This one-day tour takes you to Frankenmuth, Michigan, a year-round, Christmas village. On this full-day tour, you will enjoy the Bavarian hospitality of food, culture and festivities. The day includes a visit to Bronner's Christmas Wonderland, a chicken lunch at Zehnders, and visits to the Leelanau Winery and Frankenmuth Brewery. This Christmas Wonderland trip is priced at \$76 per person.

HALF-DAY TOURS IN AND AROUND DETROIT OFFERED DURING CONVENTION TIME

Art and History Detroit Style (\$40): The newly renovated Detroit Institute of Arts is heralded throughout the world as one of the premier venues in the cultural world – Renoir, Van Gogh, Picasso! The Detroit Historical Museum captures the history of Detroit as the American Auto Capitol.

Motown Museum and Detroit City Tour (\$43): This guided tour includes the business, sport, historical and cultural centers of the city. Architectural history, urban parks, museums, theater districts, universities and unique neighborhoods will be featured. A stop and visit at the Motown "Hitsville" Museum will be a true highlight of the tour.

Ford Field Tour (\$31): The tour of the Detroit Lions Arena of NFL football includes a walking tour through the locker room, the tunnel onto the playing field, and the stadium suites. Ford Field hosted Super Bowl XL and the 2009 NCAA Men's Basketball Final Four. It is truly an architectural innovation to enjoy.

Ford Rouge Factory (\$40): This tour is a five-part experience that includes the triumphs and setbacks surrounding the plant. A 360-degree theater will enlighten its audience to an up-close sensory experience as to how the F-150 is assembled. The tour will also include a guided walk through designated and safe areas.

Henry Ford Museum/Greenfield Village (\$63): The famous Henry Ford Museum chronicles the American automotive history. See the Rosa Parks Bus and JF Kennedy's Presidential Limousine. Greenfield Village hosts a time travel of our great nation starting with how settlers lived and takes you to the landmark inventions leading to many modern day conveniences.

Windsor Canada/Canadian Club Tour (\$45): A passport is required on this guided bus tour of Windsor, Ontario - the city across the river facing Detroit. The tour features the Dieppe Gardens, Odette Sculpture Park, Coventry Gardens and downtown touring. The tour also includes a stop at the Canadian Club Brand Center, home of Canadian Club Whiskey.

Shopping at the Somerset Collection (\$28): The Somerset Collection is an epicenter for luxury retail in Michigan. It features stores such as Neiman Marcus, Nordstrom, Saks Fifth Avenue, Tiffany and Company, and Burberry. The center has a glass-enclosed moving walkway that links Somerset North and Somerset South. "A shopper will love this tour!"

Chrysler Museum Tour (\$45): The Walter P. Chrysler Museum contains production and concept vehicles showcasing its automotive heritage. Visitors will experience 63 restored vehicles including muscle cars of the 50's and 60's, and its Technical Center. A 123-seat theater will feature the history of the life and times of Walter P. Chrysler. A box lunch will be included.

Detroit's Historical and Breath-Taking Theaters

Detroit has the nation's second largest theatre district in the country following New York City.

The **Fox Theatre** is a 1928 <u>movie palace</u> and performing arts center located at 2211 Woodward Avenue in <u>downtown Detroit, Michigan</u>. It was listed on the <u>National Register of Historic Places</u> in 1985 and was designated a <u>National Historic Landmark</u> in 1989. Located within the <u>Detroit</u> <u>Theater District</u>, the Fox has 5,048 seats. It is the largest surviving movie palace of the opulent 1920s and features a top-notch entertainment schedule. The beautiful Fox Theater was fully restored in 1988. For tickets go to <u>www.foxtheatredetroit.com/Tickets</u>

The **Fisher Theatre** opened as a movie and vaudeville house on November 11, 1928. It featured Mexican-Indian art, banana trees, a goldfish pond and wandering macaws that audience members fed by hand. Remodeled as a live theatre in 1961, the Fisher is now adorned with marble, Indian rosewood and walnut paneling, and crystal and bronze decorative work. The original 3,500 seats were scaled down to 2,089 to ensure an intimate atmosphere and optimal sightline. Over the last 40 years, the Fisher Theatre has been a favorite venue of many of Broadway's brightest stars, like Mary Martin, Carol Channing, Joel Grey, Bernadette Peters and Lynn Redgrave. It has hosted the world premieres of "Hello Dolly," "Fiddler on the Roof", "Sweet Charity," and "Golden Boy." For ticket information, go to www.fishertheatre.ticketsnow.com

Music Hall is the unique and perfect venue for the celebration of who we are and who we can become. Since Matilda Dodge Wilson opened Music Hall's doors in 1928, this intimate downtown venue has been a significant player in Detroit's performing arts sector. As the last remaining legitimate stage theatre, Music Hall is the only Detroit venue built for the primary purpose of presenting live performances. Music Hall has been home to the Detroit Symphony Orchestra, Michigan Opera Theatre, one of the nation's first Cinerama screens, and a wide variety of quality performances that embody the diverse cultures of the world. The resilience and pride of this Detroit theater hall is in its lineage and history of hosting performing legends like Lucille Ball, Ray Charles and Jack Benny on its stage. As a prominent variety house, Music Hall provides accessible music, theatre, dance, and other performance programming and education to a diverse audience. This 1,701 seat theatre provides an opportunity for rising stars, as well as a home for classic icons. Music Hall is truly a cultural resource for the city of Detroit. Masonic Temple Theatre



Detroit Opera House

Appearing on the Michigan Historical Register and the National Register, **The Masonic** is one of the largest and finest theatrical houses in the country. Since its opening in 1926 by the Masonic fraternity, the Masonic Temple Theatre has hosted virtually all forms of live entertainment, including plays, musicals, variety shows, classical music and opera, rock-n-roll and dance. The Masonic Temple Theater in Detroit hosts major headliners in 125 to 175 performances each year. For more information, check out their website at <u>www.themasonic.com</u> or call (313) 832-7100.

Located at the corners of Broadway and Madison at Grand Circus Park, the **Detroit Opera House** was originally opened January 12, 1922, as the Capitol Theater. At the time of its gala premiere, the 4,250-seat theater claimed to be the fifth largest in the world. The theater was the first in a series of palatial vaudeville and moving picture houses built in the Grand Circus Park area in the 1920s. The building was constructed with superb acoustics and in the style of the grand European opera houses. This opulent, magnificent Detroit Opera House has offered sleek theater productions from the Big Apple including "Dance Theatre Harlem" and "A Streetcar Named Desire". In 1902, the 20th Century Club, a group of cultural, socially prominent women, built a Missionstyle building to house their club. The building, now the **Century Theatre**, was built of red brick trimmed with white sandstone. The first floor originally housed a dining room, while the second floor featured a 400-seat auditorium. In 1928, the 20th Century Club contracted the building of a second theater. This Spanish Revival-style building theatre, known then as the Little Theatre, was completed. With the disbanding of the 20th Century Club in 1933, the Little Theatre however, suffered through several name changes and purposes including being a movie theater and then back to live theater. In 1967, the theatre was named **The Gem**. In 1990, the building was completely restored and reopened in 1991. Protected from demolition during urban renewal for Comerica Park, the newest home of the Detroit Tigers, The Gem Theatre and Century Theatre were moved five-blocks on wheels to their new location at 333 Madison Avenue on October 16, 1997. Today, the historic Gem & Century Theatres are two of Detroit's most intimate and charming venues. They proudly boast record breaking history as six of their shows are in the top ten longest running shows in Michigan: "Menopause, the Musical," "Escanaba in Da Moonlight," "The All Night Strut," "Shear Madness," "Forbidden Broadway," and "Forever Plaid." CONVENTION HOTELS FOR THE 60TH NSDC

The headquarters hotel for the 60th National Square Dance Convention is the 72-story **Detroit Marriott Renaissance Center**. It is a beautiful 4-star hotel on the Detroit River. Whether your room overlooks the river, the city, or the Ontario shore, the views from all the rooms are magnificent. The rooms are sleek and stylish and you will be impressed with the amenities and the décor. The beds are super comfortable with luxurious "Revive" beds. Rooms feature flat screen TV, plug in technology, individual climate control, AM/FM alarm clock radio, two-line telephones with voicemail, data ports and message light, cable TV and in-room pay movies, high-speed internet access and in-room safe, coffee maker, hair dryer, iron and ironing board. Also available are valet services and guest laundry. You do not need to leave the hotel to reach the People Mover as the station is on the 2nd level of the hotel.

The Ren. Center is a city in itself, with 70 different shops which circle the Ren. Center on levels A, One, and Two. Stores include gift shops, restaurants, ice cream shop, a theatre, drug store, post office, beauty/barber shop, florist, bank and food court. The food court on level A offers a quick meal from any of several fast food restaurants at reasonable prices with room to seat over 1,100 people. The Ren. Center also offers many restaurants—from casual to fine dining, featuring a variety of cuisines and prices. Just outside the doors of the Ren. Center is the beautiful Riverwalk along the Detroit River. If you prefer to walk, the Cobo Hall is a few short blocks from the hotel. One of the neat features is a display of all the new GM vehicles on level A, which can also be viewed from the level above. If you want more exercise, there is a state-of-the-art exercise room or you can take a leisurely or brisk walk on the circular walkways. www.gmrencen.com

The Holiday Inn Express has changed its name to **Downtown Detroit Inn and Suites**. It is a beautifully remodeled and renovated 3-star hotel. It is less than a block to the People Mover and only 4 blocks from the Cobo Hall. The hotel offers a complimentary, deluxe, hot continental breakfast (the special cinnamon rolls are fabulous) and also has a restaurant and bar. All rooms include a microwave and refrigerator and the suites have fully equipped kitchenettes. The indoor swimming pool and state of the art fitness center make for a place to relax or exercise and complimentary high-speed internet keeps you in touch. The only hotel that allows pets is the Downtown Detroit Inn and Suites. The pets need to be under 25 lbs. and transported in a pet cage (kennel). There is a \$25 non-refundable deposit for the stay. The newest 4-star hotel in town is the beautiful **Greektown Casino Hotel** and it is located in the heart of Greektown's Historic and Entertainment District. The contemporary-designed guest rooms are luxurious with beautiful views. The hotel boasts several restaurants, as well as, an international buffet with multicultural culinary creations from around the globe. The food is terrific! Attached to the hotel is a casino where you can spend a few bucks or just watch others spend their money. There are some adjoining rooms, but smoking rooms are no longer available. Cobo Hall is about 1.2 miles away, but the People Mover is on site; you can catch it by walking through the casino. Free parking is available in the attached garage. Check them out at www.greektowncasinohotel.com

The Courtyard by Marriott has been designated the "Caller/Cuer Hotel". It is across the street from the Ren. Center and also has direct access to the People Mover. The spacious, recently redecorated rooms have king or double queen beds and all the amenities you would expect from a 4-star hotel. The hotel offers an exercise room, an indoor pool, whirlpool, and tennis courts. Services include a restaurant, open daily for breakfast lunch and dinner, and a bar for light snacks, lunch and dinner. There are also several shops in the building. The Courtyard is

connected to the Ren. Center by a skywalk so you can take advantage of its shops and eateries. Visit their website at <u>www.detroitdowntowncourtyard.com</u>

The Shorecrest Hotel is a small, family-owned hotel a few blocks away from the Ren, Center, three blocks from the People Mover and eight blocks from Cobo Hall. The attached restaurant serves "the best breakfast in town", according to the front desk. Wireless internet service is available in the Guest Lobby. There are some adjoining rooms and a parking lot on site. Their website is: www.shorecrestmi.com

All hotels are within walking distance of Cobo Hall and most have a station for the People Mover on site or are a short walking distance to the People Mover. **Each person registered for the convention will be given a complimentary pass for the People Mover to make getting around town and to the dance quick and easy.** We know that you will be impressed with the beauty of the accommodations, the friendliness and helpfulness of the hotel staffs, and the number of things to do and see in downtown Detroit. This is a beautiful city and you will want to take advantage of the sights and the activities available. We have found ourselves enjoying this lovely city as we visited the hotels, used the People Mover, and walked around the downtown area.

Be assured, there is ample parking available in the downtown area.

The Downtown Detroit Inn and Suites has valet parking for their guests. The cost is \$18.00 per day, per car, with in and out privileges.

The Courtyard by Marriott has valet parking for their guests. The cost is \$20.00 per day, per car, with in and out privileges.

The Marriott Ren. Center has valet parking for their guests. The cost is \$25.00 per day, per car, with in and out privileges.

Miller Parking is a 24-hour, above-ground garage located at Atwater & Renaissance Drive W. There are 1,250 spaces available. Cost is \$1.50 first 1/2 hour, \$5.00 1/2-2 hours, \$10.00 2-5 hours, \$15.00 5-10 hours, \$20.00 10-24 hours. In and out privileges are available for guests of the **Marriott Ren. Port Atwater is a 24-hour, above-ground garage located at Beaubien and St. Antoine. It has 1,100 spaces available. **There is a covered walkway to the Ren. Beaubien Place is a 24-hour, above-ground garage located at Atwater & St. Antoine. It has 1,150 spaces available. Cost is \$3.00 per hour with a maximum of \$12.00 per day on weekdays and \$5.00 flat weekend rate. There are no in and out privileges available at this site. Ph: 313-568-5676

Millender Center Parking is a 24-hour, underground garage located under the Millender Center at 331 E. Larner at the corner of Randolph & Congress. There are 1,850 spaces available. Cost is \$2.00 every 15 minutes with a maximum daily rate of \$15.00 on weekdays and a flat rate of \$10.00 on weekends. There are no in and out privileges available at this site. Ph: 313-568-5676

Cobo Hall has roof deck parking (entrance at Congress and First). Hours are events only. Daily maximum rate is \$10.00. There are 1,000 spaces available. Cobo Hall garage parking (entrance at Washington Blvd. and E. Jefferson), hours are 6 a.m. – 11 p.m. Monday thru Friday, as needed Saturday and Sunday. There are 500 spaces available.

We recommend if you are staying in the downtown area that you park at one of the 24-hour parking facilities and use the free People Mover for getting back and forth to the convention center, as well as, other places throughout downtown Detroit.

EXHIBITIONS AT THE 60TH NSDC

Need a break from dancing? Sit back and watch our exhibition groups perform their amazing routines. The following groups are currently scheduled to perform at the 60th NSDC.

The Maycroft Square Tappers are from Muskegon, Michigan and have been performing their unique blend of square dancing and round dancing, set to a tap step for more than 50 years. This youth group is comprised of children from ages 2 through 18 years old and is one of the youngest exhibition groups in the country. They dance to a variety of music including country, rock-n-roll, folk and hip-hop.

The California Heritage Dancers will not only entertain us, but give us a history lesson in square dancing. Their demonstrations, performed in period costumes, will take us from the beginning of square dancing here in the United States in the 1700's to the modern times.

The Capital Squares are from the District of Columbia, Maryland, Virginia and West Virginia. In addition to dancing in the traditional four couple squares, they will be performing intricate patterns and movements in "hexagon squares", "octagon squares", and other formations.

Denim and Lace is a youth group from Lamar, Colorado. Members of the group are from the ages of 5 through 18. All sets consist of four boys and four girls in the same grade level. The average number of dancers enrolled in Denim and Lace each year is about 400. The junior and senior sets attend the National Square Dance Convention each year for exhibition dancing.

Lamar Dudes and Dames are also from Lamar, Colorado. The group not only consists of youth dancers, but also Alumni and other adult dancers. The Convention youth dancers and senior cloggers are high school age; the alumni dancers range in age from early 20's to early 50's.

Hunterdon Stars and Mercer Arc Angels Handicapable Groups are from Flemington, NJ and Ewing, NJ respectively. Both clubs have attended many National Square Dance Conventions. The members range in age from 25 to 74. Each member brings their own unique talents and enthusiasm to the group.

Smokey Mountain Twirlers will be coming to our convention from Sevierville, TN. Their routines consist of old square dance calls no longer taught in today's dance programs. Most of the calls use a Grand Square movement and have all eight dancers in motion at the same time.

On a personal note, I'm from the Lake Michigan side of the state and had never been to Detroit until I started working on the Publicity Committee for the 60th NSDC. I was totally amazed the first time I visited Detroit! It is a clean, vibrant, cultured, beautiful and friendly city. The tile work at each of the People Mover stations is beautiful. Each station has its own unique tile design so be sure you take notice when riding the People Mover. Detroit is graced by some elegant old buildings as well as stunning new buildings. The cityscape is truly breathtaking. Sign up in the Pure Detroit Store within the Ren. Center (Renaissance Center) for a tour of this truly unique building. The tour includes a ride up to the 72nd floor in their glass elevator, which offers a birds-eye view of Detroit and Windsor. If you prefer your sightseeing from the ground level, stroll along the Riverwalk. The view of both Detroit and Windsor is beautiful. Be sure to take full advantage of all that Detroit has to offer by joining us on one of our many tours. Wherever your interest lies, we have a tour that will cover it. The Detroit Riverwalk



Across the river to the south, you will be looking at Windsor, Ontario, Canada. This is the only place in the United States that you can look south into Canada. Detroit is still working on the Riverwalk and it is not going to be finished for a few more years. It will eventually extend from Joe Louis Arena to Belle Isle, a total of 7 miles.

Starting at Joe Louis Arena, the home of the Detroit Red Wings and walking east, you will come to Cobo Center, the home of the nation's largest auto show each January. This is also where the 60th NSDC[®] will be dancing. As you approach Cobo, you see a large overhang which will be used for our tour and campsite buses. We can park up to 10 buses under this canopy at one time if needed. It keeps everyone out of the sun and rain while boarding and unloading. We have a large area inside Cobo to sit and wait for the buses to arrive.

Next to Cobo Center is Hart Plaza. This is a very large park for a variety of activities. It has an amphitheater as well as some memorials inside the park. One of the memorials visible from the Riverwalk is the Underground Railroad. This dates back to before the Civil War as the black slaves came to Detroit and then over into Canada to gain their freedom. At this time, the Riverwalk turns away from the Detroit River for a short while, as construction of the Detroit River Passenger Dock is ongoing. This dock will be used for cruise ships on the Great Lakes in

the coming years. It is due to be completed in 2011, but not in time for our convention. As you make this left turn, you walk directly in front of the Police Precinct. You now have to walk past the Passenger Dock and up to the Renaissance Center, home of General Motors Corp. It houses the Marriott, our headquarters hotel for the convention. Turn right back onto the Riverwalk, and see a fountain built into the concrete. It is not unusual to see children, as well as adults, playing in this fountain.

Continue walking past the Ren Center, a couple of parking garages, and open parking lots on the Riverwalk. After the parking lots, you come upon the latest construction along the Riverwalk, a new state park. The wetlands have just been added to this area, complete with a stream as well as tall grasses that were native to this area many years ago. This area was formerly home to many concrete companies. After going through the state park, you will see the Centennial Lighthouse, the lighthouse used for our National Convention logo. A picture was taken by Nancy Friedlander and developed into our logo by Nancy. At the end of the Riverwalk, at this time, is a small carousel for people to ride. It also has a world map engraved into the concrete. It is not unusual to see people picnicking, fishing or just walking along the Riverwalk, as it is one of the most beautiful natural areas of Detroit.

Driving to Cobo Center

Detroit has four major freeways that lead into Downtown Detroit and drop you off by the Cobo Center. Both the Chrysler Freeway (I-375) from the north and the Lodge Freeway (M-10) from the south end on Jefferson Ave. In fact, as you arrive from the south, you travel through a tunnel under Cobo Center.

If you are staying at the Marriott at the Renaissance Center or the Courtyard by Marriott, just drive down Jefferson Ave. They are located on each side of this street. Here are the directions to help you find Cobo Center.

Traveling from the North via I-75:

- 1. Take I-375 south.
- 2. Exit at Westbound Jefferson Ave.
- 3. Proceed down Jefferson Ave. to Cobo Center, straight ahead.
- 4. Stay to the right to avoid going back onto the freeway.

A. To park in the Cobo Center Garage:

- 1. Cross Washington Blvd.
- 2. Drive into the parking garage.

B. To park on the Cobo Center Roof:

- 1. Turn right onto Washington Blvd.
- 2. Drive two blocks.
 - 3. Then turn left on Congress.
 - 4. Stay right to avoid going onto the freeway.
 - 5. Pass Second St.
 - 6. Turn left into Cobo Roof Parking.

Traveling from the South via I-75:

- 1. Exit at M-10 (Lodge Freeway) south.
- 2. Follow the signs to Civic/Cobo Center.

A. To park in the Cobo Center Garage:

- 1. Exit left at Larned St.
- 2. At the stop light, turn right on to Washington Blvd.
- 3. Turn right into garage entrance.

B. To park on the Cobo Center Roof:

- 1. Exit at Howard St.
- 2. Drive straight ahead to the third stop light.
- 3. Turn left on Fort St. and drive one block.
- 4. Turn right on Third St.
- 5. The road will curve to the left. Turn right into Cobo Roof Parking.

Traveling from the West via I-96:

- 1. Exit at M-10 (Lodge Freeway) south and follow the signs to Civic/Cobo Center.
- 2. Use the directions above for South via I-75.

Traveling from the West via I-94:

- 1. Exit on to I-96 south.
- 2. Exit at M-10 (Lodge Freeway) south and follow the signs to Civic/Cobo Center.
- 3. Use the directions above for South via I-75.

Traveling from the Northwest via M-10:

- 1. Follow the signs to Civic/Cobo Center.
- 2. Use the directions above for South via I-75.

Cobo Center - Just the Basics

Strolling around Cobo Center can be a little confusing, so here are the "basics!"

Cobo Center has four areas representing the three local counties and the City of Detroit. If you are coming from the west on the People Mover, you enter Cobo Center in the "Detroit" area. Straight ahead are the areas: "Macomb," "Oakland," and finally "Wayne." Most of the dancing and meetings will be in the "Oakland" and "Wayne" areas. The People Mover drops the riders on Level 3 of the Cobo Center. Above this level is "Roof Parking," which you can access by elevator. Using a series of 26 escalators and elevators, dancers can travel to Level 2, Level 1, Level O (the basement), and the "Parking Garage" below Level 0.

Let's say you want to go the Wednesday Night Show, "Motown on Review," which is located in room W1-52. The "W1" means that this room is located in the "Wayne" area on "Level 1." The room numbers run in order, so just look for room "52." The only level that <u>does not</u> use this numbering system is the basement, Level 0. On Level 0, you will find the Michigan Hall, whose

rooms are lettered Michigan 48 (M-48), Michigan 49 (M-49), and Michigan 50 (M-50). If you are departing on a tour, you will also meet on this level in the Edgewater Room to pick up the tours. If you stroll along the Detroit Riverwalk to Cobo Center, you will enter the Cobo Center at **Level 0**.

The **Registration Desk** is located on **Level 1 in the lobby of Cobo Center's Main Entrance, known as the "Wayne Atrium**." If you are walking to Cobo Center down Jefferson Ave. from the Marriott Renaissance Center on a beautiful, Michigan summer day, you will enter Cobo Center at the Washington Blvd. Main Entrance.

Well, there you have it! You now know the "basics" to traverse Cobo Center

IS THERE ANY FOOD IN DETROIT?

Stop at **Greektown**, **Bricktown**, and the Theater District at the **Broadway** and **Grand Circus Park Stations**. What's the People Mover you ask? It is an elevated train that will transport you around downtown Detroit. There are 13 different stops along the People Mover. Roger Chapman

One of the Florida Square Dance community's and Florida Callers Association's finest callers, Roger Chapman, passed away March 3, 2011.

Roger and Mary Jane began dancing in 1959 with Sam Prescott and started calling in his hometown of Winter Haven. Roger taught new beginners each year and his home clubs "Sunshine Swingers" and "Susie Q's" were flourishing clubs during the peak of square dancing due to his devotion to the square dance activity. Roger was in demand throughout the Southeast and in constant demand to call for many clubs around the state. He traveled to Brazil and Hawaii with dancers and called during their travels.

Roger was a member of the Florida Callers Association for over 45 years and when he retired from calling due to health, he became a Lifetime Member of FCA. He was a member of the American Callers Association and was a tireless leader for the square dance activity for more than 45 years.

Roger and Mary Jane, along with six other Florida callers and partners started "The Florida Sunshine Festival" which ran from 1974 – 2004. It became one of the premier festivals in the country. Roger was on staff of many festivals and enjoyed the "Fontana Fun Fest" where lasting memories were formed with the dancers and callers from around the country, who worked on staff with Roger. He recorded numerous records for "Blue Star" recording company. Roger enjoyed calling all levels, especially making sure the dancers were having a great time at all levels.

In addition to being one of the finest callers in our activity, he was a master wood carver and if you have one of his hand-carved bolos you are among one of the lucky ones. He won many awards for his carvings from around the state and was an instructor for the Winter Haven Recreation Dept. Roger played football for the "Gators" after receiving a Football scholarship out of high school. He owned Chapman Tile Co. for 50 years until retirement.

Roger's pride and joy was his family; married 58 years to Mary Jane, they have 2 daughters, Debbie and Denise and 1 son, Tiger, 4 grandchildren & 3 great grandchildren.

We have been blessed to have wonderful memories of our times together and how much he loved the square dance activity will live forever to those of us who knew and loved him.
