

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Square Dance Trivia

So, who was the first to record a square dance? Thomas Edison recorded Benjamin Lovett calling square dances. This was at the request of Henry Ford. Mr. Ford wanted the recordings to be used in school programs across the United States.

This little trivia fact was in our club's monthly newsletter for February. I thought that it was interesting.

THE HISTORY OF SQUARE DANCING

Square dancing has been our "official national folk dance" since President Regan signed an act of Congress in 1982. Most Americans however would likely never be caught dead square dancing. "Too embarrassing," they might say. Such is generally true of folk customs – they are not popular. Thus, it remains a dance that few have really tried, particularly as adults. But dedicated square dancers just ignore the negative quips and enthusiastically continue with their Do-si-doe's, Spin Chain the Gears, and Ferris Wheels.

The origins of square dancing are complex and extensive. The square dance is uniquely American. Early in this century, as America urbanized, square dancing nearly died out. The dance got left behind and was almost forgotten. Henry Ford had a major impact in its revival. He extolled the virtues of square dancing in an attempt to foster a dance form that would counteract what he considered to be the evils of jazz. In 1923 Henry Ford engaged the full-time services of square dance caller Benjamin Lovett. Ford brought Lovett to Dearborn, Michigan, where he remained for twenty-six years. At Ford's expense dancing instructors were invited to Dearborn to receive instruction. Ford sponsored a dance program for the Dearborn public schools, and soon Mr. Ford was sponsoring square dance programs in many other schools. Square dancing was also brought to numerous college and university campuses at Mr. Ford's expense. Ford sponsored a Sunday radio program that was broadcast nationwide. Over the radio Lovett would call dances that had been printed in the newspaper the previous week. Lovett maintained a "staff" of twelve to fourteen callers, all maintained by Mr. Ford's generosity. Eventually Henry Ford had a new, large dance hall constructed at Greenfield Village to contain the increase numbers of dancers. Ford's good friend Thomas Edison began to produce 78 RPM square dance records under his Edison label. Old fashioned square dancing became the rage.

Folk dancing also received a major boots in the 1920's when the New York City public schools, the first major school system to do so, made folk dancing a required activity. But Lloyd "Pappy" Shaw should receive primary credit for square dancing's modern revival. Shaw was superintendent of the Cheyenne Mountain High School in Colorado during the 1930's. Shaw shared his enthusiasm with his students and offered summer classes for dancers, callers, and

national folk dance leaders. Returning to their respective homes and communities, the square dance revival began. Shaw's enthusiasm could be contained in Colorado. In 19038, he organized a student demonstration team which performed exhibition dances in Los Angeles, Boston, New York and New Orleans. Thus, a lively group of high school students were largely response bile for the reintroduction of square dancing to the American public!

Originally, square dances had a caller in each square, instead of s single caller for the entire hall. This was the only way to hear the calls over the music if the group was very large. Improved public address systems, record players, microphones, and special square dance recordings have allowed for larger, better organized dances. Square dancing expanded rapidly after 1939. The dance especially expanded in the decade following W.W.II. Many American GIs had been introduced to square dancing at USO cantina. After the war ended, large numbers of them returned to square dancing in pursuit of a wholesome recreational activity. With "Pappy" Shaw I Colorado, and the impact of the returning GIs focusing on California, these two states led the development and evolution of modern square dancing.

Today, there are thousands of square dance clubs located in nearly every community of America. Dancers keep in touch and learn of current happenings through a multitude of newsletters and directories. More recently, square dancing has benefited from transportation improvements. Better highways and more dependable automobiles allow dancers to travel easily between communities. Visiting other clubs has become a major aspect. Square dancing is an excellent example of an authentic American folk custom. Its rural origins are vague, and its development and diffusion are difficult to trace. Like all folk customs, it is not popular, even among Americans, yet those who enjoy it are enthusiastic in their participation. At bottom, it remains a solid and enduring piece of American folk tradition. As dancers themselves are fond of saying, "Square dancing is friendship set to music."

Some History of Square Dancing

America has always had music and dance to remind us of history. Take a look at history. We danced when Lindbergh did his trans-Atlantic flight (Lindy-hop which later became known as the Jitterbug), American Bandstand/The Dick Clark Show was a weekly show featuring dance. By 1960 Chubby Checker made the Twist the most popular dance in the world. If you take a

look at dancing, you see we dance when we are dating, at weddings, at the harvest of the crops, at the end of a war, theatrical productions, religious holidays, and special occasions. It will take lots of teamwork to reawaken the public's interest in square dancing. Music and dancing should be a part of everyone's life.

Henry Ford and Benjamin Lovett

Henry Ford (1863-1947), who once worked for the Edison Illuminating Company (1901), in 1903 started the Ford Motor Company. Henry Ford and his wife Clara Brant loved to dance. Henry Ford began his search for someone to teach square dancing. In 1923, Mr. Ford purchased the Wayside Inn because of its beautiful ballroom. Shortly after purchasing the Wayside Inn, Mr. Ford found Benjamin Lovett (1876-1952) and his wife Charlotte L. Cooke. Henry Ford felt Benjamin Lovettt be the perfect teacher of "old fashion" dances, and in 1924 Benjamin Lovett began teaching classes for Mr. Ford, something that lasted over 20 years.

Mr. Ford decided he wanted a place to dance near is home, so in 1937 Lovett Hall was built as part of a building at the Edison Institute. The floor was made of Burmese teakwood with a spring board floor designed specifically for dancing, along with English Colonial furnishings and chandeliers. Square dancing, along with quadrilles, two-steps, waltzes, and other old fashion dances, became a part of life for Ford employees and school children across the United States. Ford and Lovett believed square dancing taught social training, courtesy, good citizenship, along with rhythm. They felt it should be a part of every school's teaching of physical education.

Around 1928, Boards of Education all over the United States endorsed their square dancing program. Almost half the public schools in America began teaching square dancing and other old fashion dancing. Not only was this great exercise, but Ford and Lovett felt square dancing corrected the missing fun and teamwork that one-on-one dance lacked. Ford and Lovett felt that having square dancing in schools would help train children in manners, courtesy, and social training, a quality Henry Ford wanted to see excel in people.

Ford and Lovett also brought square dancing to the handicapped (blind, deaf, those with artificial legs, etc.). They felt the dancing had great balancing exercises, and taught rhythm, manners, poise, and grace, along with giving self-confidence, overcoming timidity, and appreciation of good music.

In 1944, Henry Ford decided he wanted a radio show that would have dances and discussion of the dancers. "the Early American Dance Music" radio programs was a half-hour show that ran about a year and a half, twice on Saturday night, and featured Benjamin Lovett and others calling squares with the music being played by the Henry Ford Old Fashion Orchestra.

In the book "Henry Ford and Benjamin B. Lovett" by Eva O'Neal Twork, the following appears: "Mr. Ford and Mr. Lovett regarded the dance as another means of expressing ideas and thoughts. I good Morning the following appears: Some have regarded the dance as a part of human speech. From the dance of atoms, through the mating of certain [sic] birds and animals, up to the trivial dances of the various nations, the expression of emotions and ideas in rhythmic movements of the body bears all the indications of a deep natural instinct. No aspect of human interest has escaped interpretation in the dance. From time immemorial marriage has been celebrated by dancing. The coming of spring has inspired several forms of dancing. The war dances of the Indians as well known. Religious dances are found throughout the world. Joy, of course, has been the most moving source of dancing. The lamb skips, the dog leaps, the pleased child dances in ecstasy..."

"...Mr. Ford was a true believer in the benefits and power of music and old-fashioned dancing. In starting the old-fashioned dancing program, he, along with Mr. Lovett, saved a part of the American heritage for the present generation and those to follow.

"To know his crusade to bring back old fashioned dancing had been so successful and enduring would please Mr. Ford. He, however, never believed the old-fashioned dances had ever left. When someone commented about his bringing back the old dances, he said, "They've always been here."

"...The Early American dancers of today owe Mr. Ford and Mr. and Mrs. Lovett a great sense of gratitude. It is because of their unique partnership, the Lovetts' talent and diligence, and Mr. Ford's great interest in old-fashioned dancing that many people still merrily swing to an allemande left and an allemande right. Early American dancing is not a relic from a crowded attic of nostalgia, but is still a part of the recreational scene. While watching a recent Henry Ford Musical Historical Concert, an Early American dance program, at beautiful Lovett Hall and seeing the joyful, rhythmical dancers, it was evident old-time dancing is very much alive. You need not be concerned about old-fashioned dancing being asleep, Mr. Ford and Mr. Lovett. It is still "good morning" with the Early America dances."

Our National Dance and State Dance

On January 25, 1982 the 97th Congress unanimously passed a Joint Resolution designating square dancing as the national fold dance of the United States and on June 1, 1982 President Regan signed it. This Resolution was a temporary action which would expire in two years. To make the national recognition permanent the Congress requested that the proponents return to the States for individual state endorsement and when two-thirds of the states complied, reconsideration by Congress would be automatic.

President Ronald Reagan made square dancing the National Folk Dance 1981-1983.

February 05, 2003 Bill # H.R.-645 was referred to the House Committee on the Judiciary. As of December 2009 there doesn't appear to be a bill H.R. 645 regarding dancing.

Secrets of Advanced Dancing – Part 2

Last month this column noted that there are 5 Secrets to Advanced Dancing that are vital for success, and that callers often fail to emphasize these to their dancers. The first 2 were discussed, namely: (1) understanding D.B.D. by asking yourself "WHAT IS THE TRUE DEFINITION OF A CALL?" and (2) going back and re-learning the Mainstream and Plus calls D.B.D. by learning the TRUE DEFINITION. Now to continue.

SECRET #3: BE ABLE TO SAY – N – WORDS – THE CALL DEFINITIONS

Why is this important? Because if you hear a call from a formation with which you are not familiar, you can slowly say the words of the definition and move your feet at the same time. This will get you through it.

Calles will always give you extra time in unusual situations, so you will have plenty of time to do this. In addition, if you have a temporary mental block on the total picture of a call, saying the words will enable you to move through it.

I am aware of a few people who are successful in Advanced who cannot say the call definitions. THEY ARE THE EXCEPTION! Do not assume you are one of these people – you probably are not.

SECRET #4: YOU MUST BE ABLE TO ACHIEVE PRECISE POSITIONS.

Put another way: YOU CAN NOT BE A "FLOATER." When you move to a position, you to occupy it PERFECTLY – you cannot be 10 or 20 degrees of your facing direction.

Dancers can get away with sloppy dancing a standard Mainstream and Plus open dances, but not at Advanced. Let's qualify that: Yes, people can get away with sloppy dancing at Advanced if the entire floor is sloppy, but then the caller will call a watered-down dance so that people will survive.

Unfortunately, some people only experience watered-down Advanced. So when they do go to a good Advanced dance they have a bad experience and consequently blame the caller, the dancers, the atmosphere – they blame everyone except themselves.

If you are a "floater," you will never be a good Advance dancer. In addition, people will not enjoy dancing with you, because they always have to "fix you" to the proper position.

Regrettably, "floaters" never seem to realize they are "floaters." They think nothing of being adjusted into position time and again. Because, people are polite, they do not say anything, so the "floaters" think everything is fine. This is a team activity, and how people can be oblivious to the fact that they are constantly hurting the team is beyond my comprehension.
