

From the Editor...



Thirteen squares of dancers packed the Whirl & Twirl Square Dance Hall in Orlando on Saturday February, 28th, for the 2016 Florida State Convention benefit dance. Dave Muller called and Susan Snider cued. We in the West Coast Association area have been enjoying Dave's calling for a while now, but many of the dancers had never danced to Dave and everyone was pleased with his calling. A charter bus of 50 or 60 dancers from the Jacksonville area came down just for the dance. It was great to have them there.

We had four squares at the Beginner's Ball at Strawberry Square this afternoon and that was mostly new dancers. Roland Blanchette, Ron Reardon, Bob Stern, Bob Ormsbee, Ted Hughes, Mike Gormley, and Richard Spaulding called and Sandra Burke cued. These Beginner Balls are not just for new dancers. We need to have a lot more experienced dancers attend these dances and dance with the new people. We need enough experienced dancers so there are only two new couples in a square. This holds true with new dancer classes. The new dancers are always dancing with each other, they don't learn as well. I heard someone say over the weekend that we only three experienced couples to help at the classes; NOT TRUE! We need a lot of experienced dancers so we can split the beginners up and they aren't dancing together. Many times when there are experienced dancers at the class, they sit back and wait until all the students have filled the squares and they get up and fill in the empty spots. The experienced dancers should get up right away and get into a square so the beginners are split up. If we are going to get new dancers, there needs to be a lot more support from the experienced dancers. If you have noticed, the clubs that have been folding have not been having classes. We need classes to get new dancers in our clubs!

Charles Marvin Myers (1932 - 2015)

Charles Marvin "Chuck" Myers 1932-2015

Charles Marvin "Chuck" Myers, 83, of Pensacola, FL passed away on Friday, February 27, 2015. Chuck was born in Topeka, KS and graduated from Washburn Rural High School in 1950. He then enlisted in the <u>United States</u> <u>Marine Corp</u>. While on a trip to Myrtle Beach, SC over July 4th, 1953, he met Barbara Fisher. The two were married Christmas Eve, 1953. After an injury prevented him from participating in the Korean War, he was honorably discharged and started working for the United States Civil Service at the Topeka Air Force Depot as a CP-1.

In 1955, the couple welcomed a son, Clyde Joseph. When the Topeka depot was closed in 1958, he was transferred to Brookley Air Force Base in Mobile, AL. While in Alabama, he learned all the great fishing spots. The couple was quick to point out that they would stop to buy shrimp for bait; and whatever they didn't use, they would take home and eat.

In 1961, the couple was transferred again; this time to Wright-Patterson Air Force Base in Dayton, OH. When they left Mobile, the temperature was 67 degrees and upon arriving in Dayton, the temperature was -7 below zero. The famous quote here was, "Don't unpack Barbara Ann, we are going back to Mobile".

In 1963, the couple welcomed their second son, Christopher John.

While at Wright-Patterson, Mr. Myers was a major contributor to the design and development of several major computer systems. Although updated to current technology, many of these systems are still in use today.

His awards include 2 Air Force Meritorious Civilian Service Awards, AFLC Civilian of the Year (Comptroller) Award, Silver Zero Defects award and many Superior performance citations.

In 1969, close friend Jack Watts introduced Mr. Myers to the world of square dancing. At this time, he started studying how to be a square dance caller. Soon, square dancing would become the second love of his life. Over the next 30 years, the couple would create and maintain countless friendships all over the country. No matter where he was, he would always take the time to help anybody who didn't understand the calls.

After retirement from Civil Service in 1988, the couple would return to Daphne, AL (see quote from 1961). He then continued to make new friends in the square dance community as well as the fishing community. Fishing for Speckled Trout

would become his third love. He would fish everyday, regardless of the weather unless the wind was too strong. He would say of these times, "The wind blew us off the water!" He was always willing to take anybody fishing and show them the ropes.

The United States Marine Corp has always been in his heart and he celebrated the Marine Corp Birthday religiously. Maybe now he can show Chesty Puller how to catch speckled trout.

Chuck is preceded in death by his father, Charles Joseph; his mother, Lola Marguerite and his son, Clyde Joseph.

He is survived by loving wife, Barbara of Pensacola, FL; son, Christopher and his wife Susan of Cantonment, FL.; sister, Charita and her husband Gary of Topeka, KS; brother, Brandon and his wife Beth of Auburn, KS; daughter-in-law, Kaye of Daphne, AL. and grandchildren, Courtney, Matthew, Cameron and Ryan; as well as 4 great grandchildren

A Celebration of Life ceremony will be held Thursday, March 5, 2015, 12:00 P.M. (Noon) at Harper-Morris Memorial Chapel, 2276 Airport Blvd, Pensacola, FL 32504. Final resting will be at Barrancas National Cemetery aboard NAS Pensacola.

CALLERLAB Viewpoints

It's all about fun! It's really been all about fun for many, many years. We get exercise, experience some of the best social interaction possible, and the joy to moving to music, all at the same time. When we really get down to the "nitty gritty", it's all about the fun of this "team dancing" activity.

We don't need to master any fancy footwork or execute dance maneuvers that require special head, shoulder, or arm positions. As long as we move forward (somewhat in step with the music) and we don't interfere with others – it works! We dance as a team of eight, and with just a little cooperation and some friendly interaction in a sporting-like mindset, we succeed and have a ton of fun.

Now it seems that part of the human condition is at times, adversarial. Sometimes we have a tendency to complain, to look more often at what's not right with things, instead of counting our blessings and enjoying what's right and positive. Sometimes the politics of our clubs, associations, and organizations have actually caused our participants to quit dancing entirely. The responsibilities of being a caller, cuer, or dance leader have often been so overwhelming and stressful, that one's life becomes too busy and frantic. We've seen some of our dancers and leaders decrease their involvement (or drop out of the activity entirely) just to maintain some balance and sanity in their lives. In this way, our activity faces the same challenges that every other organized group in society deals with. Approaching our participation with the right kind of balance and attitude can enhance the fun that occurs naturally with our unique dance.

There are big differences in size, anatomy, and "dance fit" of all our dancers. This could be annoying to some, but most of us have really learned to enjoy and have fun with these differences. Some of us just fit together better when we swing, do arm turns, promenade and dace the calls, but the enjoyment of being considerate and succeeding as a member of the "team" just adds to the fun we have.

How many times have you looked around a hall of dancers and noticed the diversity of the people attending the event? There are people of all walks of life, people of many different vocations, and so many different cultures and personalities. Many of us wouldn't have much in common if it wasn't for our dance, and most of us wouldn't be interacting with each other if it weren't for square dancing. Our dance gives us a big opportunity to have a great tie with a very diverse group of people. I imagine that this one thing has caused some new dancers to drop out (by feeling intimidated or uncomfortable); yet with the right attitude, it can be another unique characteristic of our dance that just adds to the fun.

In ever club, at every dance, and at every festival or jamboree, there are dancers of differing abilities. There are new dancers, dancers that are very experienced, and dancers, that due to age and physical changes, have varying abilities to dance successfully. Sometimes dancers in our square have danced to a caller many times and some have never danced to that same caller. Some dancers can be nervous and others confident and poised. Some would look at this diversity as challenging or unpleasant, but the majority of us have learned otherwise.

Most of us realize that we are a team, and the success of all of us makes all of us succeed. We've learned that helping each other can not only be gratifying, but can be a major part of the fun. We also know that sometimes, we too "draw a blank" and need a little guidance. This can be one of the biggest joys of our dance when it all comes together and our square succeeds because, or in spite of us. Again, with the right attitude, it's fun!

People all over the world are, and have been, enjoying square dancing for many years now. We have some serious issues to resolve to preserve our dance form for future generations. Yet the inherent fun of the dance, the natural joy of moving to music, and the ability of most of us to embrace and have fun with the diversity of our participants, makes this dance activity one of the best recreations around.

Let's rise to the occasion and look to the future. We may have to help our activity evolve faster than it has over the years, because we all know the world and our daily lives are changing at an incredible pace. Each generation is very different from the one before it, and what was popular with one generation is quickly old-fashioned with the next.

We might even have to change the name, the costume, the programs, the halls we dance in, and the amount we charge for each event to more successfully move forward. We are currently updating the way we market our dance and communication with each other through the use of social media, but one thing is for sure, it's worth the effort to preserve an activity that has so many social and health benefits for so many different age groups; and most of all, because it's so much fun!

Square Dance Styling Part II

Last month we began the discussion of Square Dance Styling, not so much about WHAT we dance, as it is HOW we dance. It has been said, and wisely, that anyone, if he has the time, can learn any number of calls, whether one hundred or one thousand, but it takes a dedicated dancer to be able to executive very movement with skill and ability. No matter how simple the call appears, take enough time to do it correctly. We should further add – take enough time to teach it correctly.

This month we look at HANDHOLDS IN OCEAN WAVES. Really nothing more than two-handed stars, palm-to-palm, fingers facing towards the ceiling. The thumb is in a "neutral" position. This means the thumb may rest on the back of another's hand, but should not apply pressure. While regional differences exist in ocean waves (i.e.: hands down, forearms, etc.), the ONE

WRONG WAY IS THE THUM GRABBER. This grip, similar to an arm wrestling hold, has great potential to harm other dancers. The thumb grabber also breaks squares because dancers are not able to release or shake the other dancer loose to complete a call.

All dancers are encouraged to teach a thumb grabber, how to properly hold hands in the ocean wave. In many cases, taking their wrist and removing their and from your thumb then replacing the handhold with a proper palm-to-palm placement have accomplished this.

Important in ocean waves is that dancers stand with shoulders relaxed (avoid the shrug) and elbows down, at their side. When elbows come up, there is again a potential to harm other dancers. A visiting dancer told me of a recent incident where a man's elbow came up and struck her in the face with such force as to break her glasses. Poor dancing habits like "flying elbows" also lead to broken squares because dancers are reaching where they shouldn't (other ocean waves, etc. Dancers may help this poor soul by sampling taking a free hand and ushing the offending dancer's elbow down.

WE MUST ALL BE PREPARED TO TEACH PROPER SQUARE DANCE STYLING. Callers, especially, must make styling part of the definition when they teach a call by showing while explaining the important points of how we dance. Teaching should be brief and t the point, however when we see a problem or one is reported to us, we have an obligation to re-introduce these styling fundamentals right away.

How To Look Good When You Swing Your Partner

Swing Your Partner is usually taught the first night of beginners' class, and although dancers hear it regularly in singing calls, very little effort is made to explain the call well. As a result, in looking out over a floor of dancers, one sees a wide variety of Swings, most of which are two people staggering around. One of the prettiest calls that exists has been reduced to shambles.

In discussing this call with dancers, I am amazed at how many people have never heard how to do a correct Swing. Here's how to do it.

First, we need to recognize that there are two types of footwork which can be used in a Swing. The WALK AROUND SWING involves short walking or shuffling steps around a central point. This is best used by people who have a physical impairment, or by those who do not want to expend the physical energy necessary for a good looking Swing.

The BUZZ STEP SWING has the right foot remaining in place, and turning with most of the weight on the ball of the right foot of each dancer, as the left foot lifts and pushes off in a series of quick steps. The BUZZ STEP SWING can be done in a mild fashion, or it can be done with great motion and beauty.

HOW TO DO A BEAUTIFUL SWING:

- (1) Use the BUZZ STEP SWING.
- (2) Both dancers must LEAN BACK from the waist. This is vital, because this lowers the center of gravity of the couple, thereby improving stability. Dancers must REALLY lean back, not just make a token effort. Note: The woman must trust that the man will not drop her. The man's right hand is on the woman's back at the waist, and she must really lean back into of his hand. If the man does not have the physical arm strength to support the woman, then the Swing described here should not be attempted.
- (3) The man controls the speed of the Swing by how fast he pushes off with his left foot. The faster he pushes off, the faster the Swing. Great speed can be established quickly, and it is this speed combined with the leaning back that makes the Swing look beautiful.

- (4) While doing the Swing, look directly into your partner's eyes, or at least t their forehead. This is important because it will keep you from getting dizzy. Do NOT look out at the walls flying by, because this will make your dizzy.
- (5) In the singing call, when the caller says "Swing and Promenade" you do not have time to do this elegant type of Swing, because people are walking toward you for the Promenade. Save this elegant Swing for when you get to home position. This Swing is excellent to do at the very end of the singing call at home position.

SUMMARY: If you do this type of Swing, people will be impressed. Remember the key points: lean back at the waste, go fast, and look into your partner's eyes.


