From "Bear" Miller

Wanted Immediately Heretics and Jesters to Put the Fun Back Into Teaching!

Education is too vital to be taken so seriously. Let's regain the importance of the joy of learning.

Patch Adams once said,

Remember, fun is infectious. You are in charge of your own face!" Laugh more! If you are going to skate on thin ice – tap dance! You need style! Rock the boat – have some fun! The future belongs to other risk takers, the weird and the slightly crazy. It doesn't pay to be too sane. We need to rediscover some of the hope, energy, excitement, and fun in learning. Teaching at its best is a joyful, passionate, creative, often uncharted adventure.

Each class will have a direction and identity of its own. I've had the privilege to visit many creative classes over the years and I have felt the magic! Creative teachers are driven by a necessity to help their new dancers in whatever way they need. Such teachers are driven by curiosity and challenge; they enjoy taking calculated risks. They see teaching as fun! They are turned onto teaching! As Pink Floyd would say, "They don't need no thought control."

It is bout doing things well – getting into something in depth, not skimming the surface. It's about personal excellence – achieving one's personal best – continually improving. Real learners are lost in their thoughts; they are caught up in the "flow" – work then becomes fun. Challenge and effort are part of the game. Fun does not mean easy. We need friendly environments for hard work, but that work must be based on something that has captured the learner's attention.

Teaching is reaching for our dreams, not the definition nightmare that restricts us. Learning is fun when you reach out and do something you didn't think you could do. Teaching is fun when you help someone achieve beyond their expectations. Remember this is dancing, not just going through the movements. A dance – moving to music, and being successful!!!

Teachers need to forget about the curriculum and reinvent the art and craft of teaching. Teachers who plan neat things with their students inspire learning. They integrate and teach for connections; they keep in mind the dispositions they want students to gain, not fiddly content details. Not only the definition, but how it feels. We should be 'future proofing' our students with positive attitudes.

We need to value those teachers who still retain their creative spirt. They are the real heroes. Let's learn from them! We can all remember such classrooms - what will our students

remember? When on the road, visit other classes; see what is going on. Pick up ideas and thoughts from others. Imagine an entire world of such people teaching square dancing – that's my dream. Fun, but weird exciting – like herding cats! We all know these teachers, but we often choose to ignore them – they can't be serious! But the future will depend on these boat rockers those who challenge the status quo – real leaders! We need real leadership, not management. If our leadership was this exciting, just how many dancers we would have and how much fun they would generate.

We need to instill in our students that learning is remaining childlike (not childish). It's like being a perpetual three old – always curious, always exploring. Art Costa states that we are most intelligent before we reach school! Just think how smart folks are before they enter our square dance classes. Imagine a class of perpetual three year olds – but in adult bodies. They need to be always asking questions. Encourage this!

We are n a new environment. We need a 21st century mindset to thrive in such a crazy, everchanging world. Don't plan so much. Be flexible and adjust to the strengths and weaknesses of your class on a particular night. Be prepared for anything. Remember – it's what you do when things don't go according to plan that marks out the future wines! Learn to enjoy uncertainty. It can be fun!

Being by articulating your dreams and sharing them with other callers, current dancers, and new class members that you come into contact with. Tell them what you see square dancing as now, and what it can be. What do they want for the future of the activity? Then, start to live your shared dreams.

Start to control your own destiny or someone else will – it may be too late for some of us! Future leadership will be the art of "keeping the heard roughly west" and valuing the mavericks! Start to develop your class as an environment of happiness. People love to be happy! Make your class inviting and warm. Square dancing's future will depend on your students' repertoire of talents and their attitude towards dancing.

Bring Square Dancing to the Pubic

The American Callers' Association in its attempt to be of service to all callers, dancers, and square dance associations provided current, timely, and effective information on new dancer recruitment from 2000 to 2017. ACA really appreciates the positive comments, encouragement to continue, and contributions from dancers, square dance association[s] and callers all over the country and from abroad to continue these initiatives. ACA will continue to provide information that will help the square dance community recruit, retain and retrieve square dancers as well as encourage the dancers to speak out on the cumbersome dance programs.

Our "VIEWPOINT" this month predicates its base on clubs who would like to offer square dance lessons for new dancers, but were unable to attract new dancers. There is only one theme for this idea: "Place Your Club into the Public Arena". The commitment from the club members and caller is to use the entire October through December months to get the club dancing in public even if regularly scheduled club dances are cancelled to get the club into the public. ACA contends that clubs need to get out in front of the public.

Here are a few suggestions. Remember we need club commitment which can have a positive effect on your recruiting efforts.

- 1. Create a New Dancer focused club and stick with it all of the fall of 2017.
- 2. Partner with other groups like the Sh[r]iners and Elks.
- 3. Contact Churches in the area and offer to have a fun night in their facility,
- 4. Contact Colleges and Universities and offer to sponsor a fun night dance on their campuses. Note: Junior Colleges are often very accommodating.
- 5. Contact Home School organizations and offer to sponsor a fun night dance at a location of their choice.
- 6. Contact rodeo associations in your areas and offer to have a fun tie at the rodeo.
- 7. Contact health organizations and hospitals to sponsor a fun activity in their locations.
- 8. Contact shopping malls and offer to work with them to offer fun activities.
- 9. Schedule fun nights and prepare paper club badges in plastic badge holders.
- 10. Contact radio and television stations and ask for their marketing assistance.
- 11. Spend the entire fall season getting out in front of the public.
- 12. Reverse the idea that Square Dancing is the best kept secret in or out of the limelight.

Here are some rules:

- 1. Use the entire fall season to work this focus on meeting the public.
- 2. You will get turned down, but do not stop.
- 3. Ask for referrals from every organization contacted regardless of their result.
- 4. Keep your focus on meeting the public as the primary event and factor in your club.

5. Have a table to display posters and provide information on square dancing.

Frustrated New Dancers

In our activity – modern western square dancing – we require students go through a course of study to be proficient enough to join in. Unlike contra or line dancing, our entry level programs run for the majority of the calendar year in a format of cumulative learning. This means that new material is added to each class, making the number of calls grow with each class. If the entry level is Basics then you are expected to have 73 calls in your knowledge base, 92 if Mainstream is entry level and if Plus is entry level the numbers jumps to 121 calls. Let's be frank, it's not easy to become a square dancer.

Learning all this material may have moments of frustration where the dancer(s) are not "getting it" or the caller may not be able to communicate effectively or perhaps nothing is going right on a particular night. This frustration can go a way as the new material is mastered the caller finds a way to "get with the program" or a night of great dancing dimmed the memory of the not-sogreat night. One type of frustration seems to be experienced repeatedly – it is what happens when the square breaks down.

First of all, we all agree every square breaks down sometime. Dancers may get frustrated, callers may get frustrated. New dancers, those folks who have recently graduated from square dance lessons, suffer from the complication that they BELIEVE when a square breaks down, it is their fault. Every caller will agree, squares with new dancers will break down because of experienced dancers making a mistake. It is not caused by the new dancer, but you will not convince them otherwise. Their belief is supported by an "experienced" dancer scowling at them. Unfortunately, more than one sad story has come from a new dancer being told by an

"experienced" dancer that they should not be there. While little can be done to fix people with bad manners exhibiting uncouth behavior. Actions can be taken to help the new dancer – especially when they are in class. Here is how our classes are taught.

- When a square breaks downs, keep moving in small steps towards facing lines of four.
 Lines of four are dancers with the boy on the right and girl on the left in every couple
 and lines facing side walls. The same thing you would have if every static square did the
 call, "Heads Lead Right...Circle To A Line". We acknowledge there are other methods
 available, but this is a tried method that works quickly every time.
- When the square breaks down use hand signals to indicate to others to get in lines. This assumes dancers have been taught what to do when squares break down. While we advocate "no talking", sometimes simply calling out "LINES" is necessary.
- Watch the squares that are not broken and when they are in liens of four like you re, then join back in. A good caller will watch the floor and encourage broken squares to get in lines, then say something like, "Everybody has Lines..." This is how good callers get all squares back dancing.
- Give dancers time to practice breaking down. It is important to know that mistakes are a natural part of dancing and the caller should say to the dancers "I', going to try to break you down so you can practice recovering". It is said in a jovial fashion and meant to let the dancers have fun while learning how to be a better dancer. Break the squares down a few times like this and let dancers get their squares in lines of four then resume dancing. Callers need to treat this process like they would teach a new call, so dancers will get used [to] it.

Learning how to break down may not lessen the incidents of breaking down but it goes a long way towards reducing the frustration from this experience. In this author's experience, dancers who have been taught "how to break down" are still actively dancing many years later. The frustration level of these dancers is much less their contemporaries who are perpetually wandering around in broken squares. If every call started teaching dancers how to break down, would it keep dancers from leaving square dancing? Maybe. Isn't it worth keeping even one dancer just by a simple each?

What's Right With Square Dancing (cont.)

Keynote Address by Eric Henerlau Presented at the 66th National Square Dance Convention, Cincinnati, Ohio

How can we get more people into square dancing? This is the question we've been asking ourselves for a long time. We know there is no silver bullet; if there were, we would have discovered it by now and the halls would be overflowing. We do know that marketing, promotion, recruitment, and retention take effort, and that our results will be directly proportional to the effort applied. However, even the best efforts can yield poor results if we are not communicating effectively. Achieving better results starts with an understanding of who we are and what we are willing to change in order to adapt. Here are my suggestions to start the process:

- Decide what you are going to offer. What are you offering to people? Fun or long-term commitment to an unknown activity? Basic, Mainstream, or Plus destinations? Social community or academic lessons? If what you're offering isn't working, consider changing it. People who don't square dance are not keen on making a long-term commitment to an activity they don't know if they will enjoy. Connect with people on a social level. Build relationships around fun, and then include square dancing as part of the relationship.
- Target your audience age group. People generally socialize with other people who are less than five years older or younger than they are. If you want to bring in younger dancers, target your marketing efforts to people who are five years younger than the average age of your club. If the club's average age is 70, don't try to recruit 30 or 40 year olds they won't be interested. As an activity, we've been aging up over several decades. Aging down will be a gradual process for any existing clubs. I will take effort and focus. In some cases, entirely new clubs may need to be formed with a younger demographic.
- Fox on your club's personality and strengths? Who are you as a club? Are you mostly working-age adults or retirees? Singles or couples? Do you all attend the same church? Are you traditionalists or casual in your approach to dancing? Does your club do only square dancing or also include other social activities? The culture of a group tends to indicate the type of people it will attract. If you want to attract a different demographic, have the club discuss the changes needed in its culture. Different groups will attract different kinds of people.
- Find ways to be more inclusive. Does your club welcome singles? People of different skin colors or religions? People with different sexual orientation? Just like other activities, many square dance clubs have unspoken cultural attitudes that set the social norms for the club. These attitudes can be helpful when recruiting people who fit the same norms as your group but they can also be a barrier to others who would like to participate but don't feel like they fit in. Look for areas in your club's culture that may

- make new dancers feel less welcome and discuss what you can do to change these areas.
- Don't be everything to everyone! A respected business leader once said, "If you're everything to everyone, you're nothing to anyone. "This holds just as true for square dancing as it does for business. We all like to say that square dancing is for everyone regardless of age or ability. It's a great thing that so many people can participate in this activity, but when we talk about square dancing and offering it to the public, we need to narrow our focus to our target audience. Understand whom you are trying to attract. A person who hears that square dancing is for anyone, and anyone can square dance, it is the same person who thinks "I'm not just anyone. I have special qualities and interests, so this is not for me". Instead, consider focusing on a demographic that is in sync with your group:
 - People who want a social activity
 - People who want exercise
 - o People who are interested in trying something unusual and different
 - People who like puzzles and games
 - People who like to travel
 - People who are single or whose partner don't dance
- Even though you are focusing on your target audience, avoid exclusionary practices that would turn away a potential dancer that is not part of your target. For example, if you are primarily a couples-oriented club and a single dancer shows up for lessons, have a plan to accommodate that person. That person may be the next enthusiast in the group who contributes to the activity. Find a place for everyone who expresses an interest.
- Rethink Plus or even Mainstream as a destination for new dancers. Last year Jerry Story gave an impassioned address about the problems with pushing people through too many calls too quickly. He advocated the Club 50 program and other similar programs. Some areas of the country are experimenting with the 12-week condensed teaching order and other smaller lists. Both the Basic and Mainstream programs have plenty of variety in their calls, and a skilled caller can use these programs to make an entertaining dance for everyone. He or she can make the choreography simple and easy or complex and challenging without using extra calls. Consider a destination program that is shorter and easier to learn, allowing new dancers to reach a level of proficiency more quickly.
- Shift the focus from calls to people. We tend to emphasize learning a bunch of calls to get through the list or program, just so we can learn the next set of calls on the next list, etc. Instead, your club could make its top priority meeting, socializing, and having fun. When the people are more important than the calls, groups thrive. New dancers feel more welcome and are more likely to retain. Experienced dancers enjoy dancing with new people as much as being entertained or challenged by the caller.
- Redefine success. What is success in square dance lessons? What makes a beginner class worthwhile? How long must a new dancer continue dancing for you to consider the class a success? Some people believe that if the new dancers don't stay square dancing for life then the class was no successful. What if a dancer learns to dance and continues dancing for a year or two and then leaves? Is that not a form of success? Are

we expecting too much from people who don't stay involved for a long period? While some people join the activity and do stay for a long time, others will enjoy dancing for a while, and then move on. If you consider that recruiting effort to be a failure because the person isn't still dancing, then the club's morale will be compromised. Alternatively, if you consider the class a success because there was a period of tie when the people were in a square, then you can build on those efforts and tailor your program around those dancers. We all know that many dancers who stop dancing come back again at a later date. When this happens, be sure to keep that person on a follow up list for future classes or dances.

- Talk about what's good about square dancing. Have a real discussion in your club.
 Underscore your strengths. What is it about your club that makes people want to return
 each week, each month, each year? People come for a reason, because square dancing
 fulfills something in their lives. Have your club members articulate those reasons. It will
 get them excited and inspire them to share with others who are not square dancing yet.
- Develop community service outreach. While square dancing is fun in itself, the people involved in the club an also make a difference in their local community. Probably some are already volunteering time or money to local non-profits. Is there a way to connect the club or local dancers with a non-profit or charity? Can you organize the club to contribute time or money to a charity and get some visibility for square dancing? Not only will your club feel good about what they are doing, but non-dancers can bond with club members on a different level. The more connections you can make with the public, the easier your class marketing efforts will be.
- Initiate cooperative marketing with clubs in your area. It takes a lot of effort for one club working independently to recruit new dancers. Instead of going it alone, talk to other local groups who want to grow. Working together, each club can leverage the others' skills, resources, and labor to attract people into dancing. The visibility of square dancing will increase exponentially. These efforts can be coordinated through your local association or federation. If your governing organization is not interested in a coordinated marketing effort (or other factors make doing so ineffective), then create an informal group of clubs who want to make a different. Form small teams from each club who are willing to meet periodically to share ideas and work on joint projects.
- Experiment with different marketing techniques. There are many ways to advertise for your classes: flyers, postcards, newspapers, lawn signs, placemats, community outreach events, and Internet ads, just to name a few. Try as many as the club has energy and money to support. Track our return on investment, but don't give up on any one method if you don't see immediate results. What doesn't work this time may work well next time.
- Think big, think new. Do you remember the children's book The Little Engine That Could? The mantra that kept that engine going up the hill was "I think I can! I think I can!" The Little Engine took on the challenge of climbing the hill, and instead of letting limitations stop her, she persevered with focus and commitment until she was successful. The Little Engine thought BIG and NEW. How can your club think bigger or in a new way? What outrageous ideas can you come up with for building your club? When

you embark on a new project, believe what you're doing will work. Commit to your plans fully. The quickest way to failure s not having faith in your efforts. That subconscious message of "not believing' will undermine your work and almost certainly guarantee disappointment. Instead, commit and put the energy into your plans without hesitation.

- Think strategically. Where do you see the club in the future? Not just for your tenure in the activity, but beyond into the next generation of dancers? Do you have a goal for the club and its growth? Be willing to adapt to the 21st century world for square dancing. Create a vision of your club at milestones in the future, 2018, 2020, and 2025. Make plans; think about what's possible even if it seems impossible. Enroll other dancers in looking ahead.
- ALWAYS look ahead and avoid dwelling on the past. It doesn't do any good to talk about how many squares there used to be at dances, ho many dances were held, how big the beginner classes used to be, and the like. All this is just negative thinking. NO ONE likes to hear that yesterday was better than today. We all want to believe that today is great and that tomorrow will be even better. Suggesting anything different, whether or not its true, is a sure-fire way to discourage someone new to square dancing. That person will think he or she missed the glory days and start to take a dim view ON the current state of affairs. His or her dancing career may be shortened after all, why learn an activity you perceive as dying? Instead, keep the focus on how great you can build on what you have: classes, activities, and fun. Inspire people to look forward to good times n the club, regardless of how many people are dancing.
- Recruit and support the next generation of callers. The activity cannot survive unless there are new callers coming up the ranks. Encourage every young dancer to call a tip or singing call. Create an environment that would foster the calling "bug" in someone. Encourage that person to go to an accredited callers school. Give him or her opportunities to call and teach. Enable those new callers by fully supporting their efforts. These people will be the leaders of tomorrow. Help cultivate them now!
- Support motivated club leaders. These people may or may not be on the board, but they
 are "movers and shakers," people who are inspirational, have energy, and get things
 done. If they have an idea that would benefit the club, give them what they need to run
 with it. Let them lead the rest of the club in something new. Even if you're not feeling
 like a leader, support the people in your group who have the energy and let them do the
 job.'

Bugs Bunny Was A Square Dance Caller

To see Bugs Bunny calling a square dance, go to this site: youtube?QuaojjCV1Tk. It is a cartoon slightly less than three minutes long.

But the background to this cartoon is the real story here. A square dancer, Chuck Jones, did the cartoon. He animated and directed numerous cartoons for Warner Brothers, including the characters of Bugs Bunny, Elmer Fudd, Daffy Duck, and Porky Pig. He also invented the Roadruner, Wile E. Coyote, and Pepe Le Pew.

Chuck Jones and his wife, Dorothy, were square dancers in the Los Angeles area from 1949 into the 1960s and belonged to the Rip 'n' Snort Square Dance Club (that's the name f a call, of which they were presidents for many years. The club lost its constitution, so there was no way to get them out of office. They were good friends with square dance pioneered Bob Osgood.


Chuck Jones heavily promoted square dancing in the 1950s. He did the cover for a square dance festival in 1951 showing Bugs Bunny holding a microphone on top of a bucking horse. He wrote square dance columns for Sets In Order magazine, and also gave lectures about his animation work at various square dance festivals.

In 2002, TV guide did a survey to determine the top cartoon characters of all time. Seven of the top 50 belonged to Chuck Jones. Another time, a poll of 1,000 animators named the 50 greatest cartoons, and four of the top five were from Chuck Jones.

So any time you are watching one of these classic cartoons with your friends, you can tell them that a square dancer was responsible.

Note: Information in this article was taken from the book entitled As I Saw It, compiled and edited by Paul Moore. It descries the life and career of Bob Osgood, one of the founding fathers of Modern Western Square Dancing. There is also a full chapter devoted to Cuck Jones.
