### 2022 Florida State Convention

## LIGHTHOUSE #5 SANIBEL ISLAND LIGHT

Sanibel Island Light is located on the eastern end of the small 12-mile-long island across the mainland of Florida's Gulf coast from Punta Rassa. It is now connected to the mainland by a causeway bridge built in the 1960's.

As early as 1833, the residents of Sanibel petitioned for a lighthouse to be built but Congress took no action at that time. And again, in 1856, the Lighthouse Board requested a lighthouse be built, again. Congress took no action. Then in 1877 a group of government workers surveyed the eastern end of the island. This time these government workers "reserved" a section of the land for the lighthouse project – but – again, no action. It was not until after the Civil War that yet another petition was submitted to Congress stating that a lighthouse would cause a big increase in trade and that boaters and travelers would be able to visit the island more easily. Finally, in 1883 Congress appropriated \$50,000 for the project, and the lighthouse was finally started in February 1884. It was lit for the first time in August of 1884.

The lighthouse is built 112 feet above sea level using an iron skeleton-type tower. It has a focal plane of 98 feet. There is an external spiral staircase that the lighthouse keeper had to climb to service the lamps when needed. There were no provisions made for the keeper to live inside the structure; however, a small home was built beside the lighthouse for his needs.

There have been two recorded big hurricanes that struck the lighthouse, but fortunately, there was minimal damage either time. The first recorded one was in 1944, where it is said that several residents and the keeper clung to the outside spiral staircase after the keepers' home was destroyed – all did survive. The second hurricane recorded was Charley in 2004. The predicted forecasted storm surge of 13 feet never materialized, so nothing was lost.

The State Convention is still being planned for Friday and Saturday, February 19 & 20, at the Daytona Beach Convention Center. Several great different money-making ideas are planned. Of course, there is the usual souvenir shirt, red, with the convention lighthouse logo. Then there will be the two 5-foot-tall wooden Lighthouses to be raffled off. Pictures and tickets will be distributed to each area soon along with more raffle tickets for the beautiful handmade quilt

featuring 10 of "Florida's Fabulous Lighthouses." "Florida's Fabulous Lighthouses" is the title of the coffee-table book where I have taken excerpts for these articles; there are some for sale also.

### LIGHTHOUSE #6 EGMONT KEY LIGHT

Egmont Key is a small island in the Tampa Bay area. It is known that Spain ruled the Florida area longer than the United States had been a country, but it soon gave way to British rule. It was under British rule that the Key was named. It was named after the Earl of Egmont, Lord of the Admiralty, and a very prominent man in Brittan, John Perceval.

At the time the first lighthouse was being built (1848) a Colonel Robert E. Lee was making a survey of the southern bay coast and recommended some defensive works be built. That was when the first Lighthouse was put on the Key. It lasted less than six months because a hurricane washed over it with huge 15-foot waves. Needless to say, that was referred to as the GREAT HURRICAN of 1848. Even though it was rebuilt, there were many more valiant storms that took its toll on the structure second tower, so it was dismantled in 1857. A second tower was built and lighted in 1858, this time it was constructed with 3-foot-thick brick walls and stood 90 feet tall.

Before the second lighthouse was built, the Seminole Indians were being forced to migrate to Oklahoma, but they were relocated on Egmont Key for a while. Their chief, Billy Bowlegs, was offered \$200,000 to move his tribe westward voluntarily. He refused and led an attack in Big Cypress instead, which started the Third Seminole War. It was this incident that eventually led to the Indians now infamous "Trail of Tears."

It was during the Civil War that the "light" was removed from the top of the lighthouse by the Confederates mostly to frustrate the Union Navy's efforts to blockade Tampa Bay. Early in the Civil War, Confederate blockade-runners used the island as a base. Later it was captured (in July 1861) by the Union forces who used it as a base for attacks on the Confederate ships and other hostile positions in the Tampa area.

Egmont Key is steeped in so much early American history; it would be tough to give it justice. The Spanish-American War, Second & Third Seminole Wars,

Civil War, and even World War 1 and World War 2 are all etched in Egmont Keys History. There are many books at your local library that would be worthwhile researching and enjoying. For a lot of this information here, I found in "Florida's Fabulous Lighthouses" book, which you can order from Carol Douget, Convention Chairman. ## LIGHTHOUSE #7 CAPE FLORIDA LIGHTHOUSE

Even though the Florida State Convention is POSTPONED, the chairmen, Carol & Richard Douget, have asked that I continued writing about the Lighthouses around the State of Florida just to keep the momentum going and keep the interest about what is planned around this theme – LIGHTING THE WAY TO FRIENDSHIP AND FUN.

The Cape Florida Lighthouse is located at the southern end of Key Biscayne. It was built in 1812 to protect shipping in the straits of Florida. The first time the lighthouse was built, it was 65 feet tall with wooden stairs. In December of 1825, the lighthouse was lit for the very first time.

In 1835 a major hurricane struck the island, damaging the lighthouse and destroying the keeper's house. The lighthouse keeper, Captain Dubose, moved his family to Key West for safety. Assistant lighthouse keeper, John Thompson, remained to guard the light along with an African American handyman named Aaron Carter. In 1836, the already much-damaged lighthouse was attacked by a fierce band of Seminole Indians. The two men did manage to flee into the lighthouse while being shot at; both were wounded. The Indians kept firing into the structure, which ignited the kerosene oil stored at the bottom. The fire forced both the wounded and burning men up onto the lighthouses platform that ran around the light. Carter eventually died of his wounds. The Indians, after looting and burning the other buildings, left the next morning believing both men were dead. Thompson survived but had no way to get down from the tower since the stairs were burned away. A United States Navy schooner, the Motto, heard the explosion of a gun powder keg during the attack and, over the next few days, could rescue Thompson. After this siege, the Cape Florida Light remained extinguished from 1836 to 1846.

The tower and keeper's quarters were ordered rebuilt in 1846. It remains the oldest standing structure in Miami-Dade County. The lighthouse was re-lit in 1847. But in 1855, it was renovated again, and 95 more feet were added to its height.

In 1861 the lighthouse was attacked again, but this time by Confederate sympathizers after Florida seceded from the Union, it remained dark for the rest of that war. In 1866 service was finally restored only to be discontinued, again, in 1878 when it was determined the light was not strong enough to warn ships away from the offshore reefs, its focal was only 100 feet, so that same year, 1878, a lighthouse was built on Fowry Rocks Reef, only 7 miles further south and was lit. The Fowry Rocks Reef has a focal of 15 nautical miles and is still operational to this day.

## **CALLERLAB Viewpoints**

### **Staying Connected**

As we slowly move in the direction of getting back to dancing, we know that it may be difficult to start a new class and bring new people into an activity with such close physical contact. The one thing we still can do is to stay connected with our brand-new dancers who started last year but were unable to finish their new dancer program. We can also connect with those who were part of our group in the recent past but have drifted away for some reason.

I hope you've been able to keep your club or dance group connected by any of the Zoom type online formats or by a "traditional phone tree." If you haven't, you've been missing an incredible opportunity to keep your club and your new dancers together. The "traditional phone tree" that clubs have used for many years is still a winner.

Members of your board or leaders in the club volunteer to divide up the phone numbers of all the members, friends, new dancers, and anyone affiliated with your club and periodically calls them. So many in our groups have been alone or have had minimal outside contact in the times we've experienced this year. Calling and touching base with them yields some great, lengthy conversations that are often fun and rewarding for both parties.

If your group is not using this tool, get it organized, and start calling. Sharing stories and time with individuals and couples in your group is a real key to keeping everyone connected. Those that are good social facilitators in your "phone tree" will even be able to connect those that are in their "tree" by sharing like stories and encouraging others to call each other. Social connections between our dancers and even former dancers are what sets us ahead of so many other recreational activities, and supporting those connections will tremendously help our activity bounce back from these times of isolation.

For those that have a little more computer experience, online forums like Zoom have been a terrific way to connect socially and dance too. These online video platforms have been available for years, but most of us haven't had the need or knowledge to use them. The COVID crisis has changed that.

Many of us found for the first time that we could connect with others with an email link. We could download an app and/or get into the "meeting" with our cell phones, computer tablets, laptops, or desktops. Some of us had never even used our computer cameras and microphones and didn't realize we had them.

There is a little bit of a learning curve and a few icons to find, check and adjust, but there is always someone on the "call" to coach us through the snags we may be having. Many of us remember what it was like to be new to dancing. When you are new to a Zoom platform, it invites others to be like "angels" and help you navigate the very few things that can cause issues.

My first exposure was a link my wife found on Facebook. A caller named Mike Dusoe from Maine was having a "Virtual 2-Couple Dance" with his club, and the notice said there might be a few spots open for others to join. Lisa and I decided to try.

When the time came, we clicked on the link, and after a couple of minutes of clicking on some icons, we clicked into a computer screen with about 20 other small screens. Mike had enough spots for others to join, and we found that other west coast dancers we knew were also linked in, and it was fun to see them. We also saw other callers and their partners attending from all over the United States and even a couple of dancers from Germany.

Mike explained that we would be dancing in two couple squares, and if we were a couple attending, like my wife and I, we would be dancing with an invisible couple or "Phantom couple." If you were attending as a single dancer, you would also have a "phantom partner" as well as a "p9hantom couple" opposite you.

Challenge square dancers are used to dancing with "phantoms," but to most dancers dancing Basic through the Advanced Programs, this is a whole new ball game.

The first session, we dance only patter alls, but we had a blast, and it was fun just to see other dancers and people we knew. It was also fun dancing with my wife, and even though we made some mistakes, we laughed and had a great time. The session lasted a little more than an hour, but that was plenty, and it planted a seed with me.

There was another couple from my club there, and we talked by phone about putting a session together for our club. After a few phone calls to our president and others in the club, we decided to schedule a session.

At around the same time, Jeremy Butler, a caller from Virginia, contacted me about being part of a caller training group using the Zoom format. He had already contacted Tony Oxendine, Ted Lizotte, Jack Pladdys, and Ken Ritucci about it, and we several times to organize and plan the training sessions. Jeremy titled the sessions, Corona Learning Assistance Seminar Series or C.L.A.S.S., and those recorded caller seminars are excellent caller education tools and are replayed at your convenience at <a href="https://www.gsicallerschool.com">www.gsicallerschool.com</a>. Look for the CLASS Videos tab. Thanks, Jeremy, for a great idea!

Being part of the C.L.A.S.S. effort helped with my training in the Zoom format. After further mentoring and help from Mike Dusoe, Paul Cote, and Ted Lizotte, I learned how to connect calling sound equipment into another separate laptop computer my wife owned; I was ready for my first session.

We invited everyone from our club and our new dancers too. Word got out to other clubs in the area, and we had almost a hundred screens going. I had decided to use my headset microphone and dance with my wife while calling so that my timing and flow would be as good as it could be.

I started the session as if we were beginning to dance the first night. We did very basic figures, the first tip, and everyone seemed like they were catching on well. The entire session lasted a little more than an hour, and I increased the difficulty a little each tip.

I made a big error in judgement and regret it to this day. I was able to do a good intro tip, but by the second and third "tip," I quickly made it too difficult for my new dancers. They had danced the calls before, but dancing with a "phantom couple" is a very different way to dance. In my effort to provide something for everyone, I made it too difficult for the new dancers and even some of my experienced club members.

Most of my dancers laughed a lot, but since that first fateful "Zoom Dance and Social Gather," I have learned ways to cue and call differently. We continue to hold "Dances and Social Gatherings" once a week for my new dancers and once a month for our club. We have even mentored other clubs and callers in the process, as we were unselfishly mentored. There is even a Facebook group called Virtual Square Dances that lists many dances throughout the week. Check it out!

We just received a notice from the Community Center where our cub dances will not be open until January of 2021. If you have the same circumstances, seriously consider asking for help, and start organizing Zoom events with your

group. You'll have a wonderful time. You socially connect, entertain, and safely provide dance and social gathering for your club or dance group.

Staying connected will make it easier for everyone to return when it is safe again. Step up and provide that leadership to organize these events. You won't regret it, and your dancers will appreciate it more than you know.

### SQUARE DANCING VIDEOS ON THE INTERNET

Interesting fact. At the Opening Ceremonies of the 1988 Winter Olympics in Calgary, Alberta, Canada, 960 square dancers from 24 local square dance clubs danced for five minutes in the stadium where the ceremonies were held. The callers were Wilf Wiladal and Ron Refvik, and they called Plus.

Included were Kaleidoscope Squares, created by Gloria Roth from Nova Scotia. One of the announcers on television, Peter Jennings, was a former caller, and he gave a brief example of calling.

All of this is available on the Internet. If you Google the above information, it will come up. But the video is blocked on Google. To see the video, there is a link on Google to YouTube, or you can go directly to YouTube. It is well worth seeing.

By the way, he full Opening Ceremonies and Closing Ceremonies of the 1988 Winter Olympics are available on the Internet and are way impressive.

Square dancing on the Internet. Many exciting items are available for viewing on YouTube. Click on YouTube and then type in the name of a particular club in the Search Box. You may find that someone has put dances for that club online

You can also see numerous callers calling for a variety of clubs. The more popular the caller, the more likely it is that he/she will be online. Google the caller's name and/or go o YouTube and type in the caller's name in the Search Box.

You can also see many callers giving panel discussions at various Callerlab Conventions. The best way to see this is to go to YouTube, then in the Search Box, type I the name of the caller followed by a dash followed by the words Callerlab Convention panels.

Note: If you go to YouTube and type in the caller's name, you may be referred to that caller's lectures at CALLERLAB and not to that caller's dances. If that happens and you want to see that caller calling a square dance, start over and type the caller's name followed by the words calling square dances.

Virtual square dances. With most square dance clubs being temporarily closed, many callers have been calling online. The calling is for one couple to dance at home, and covers every Callerlab program. Often this involves working with one phantom couple, and the directions for doing so are quite easy,

If you Google virtual square dancing, you will see a wide range of options to experience this.

## Re-establishing the Cohesiveness of your Club

Do you feel that your club is no longer as cohesive as it used to be six or seven months ago before we had to shut down all of our dances? Some clubs had such a cohesive group, they went out to eat together, traveled together, and planned their vacations around their trips to the National and State convention. I know that 30 or 40 years ago, my home club, Buttons & Bows of Lakeland, was so tight we were like extended family, and in some cases, we were the only family they had. And I have to point out Suncoast Squares in St. Pete as a good example.

In Buttons & Bows, we had a core group of people who took lessons together and became good friends. The few that are still alive are still close friends. As you know, Buttons & Bows was known for their special events, and back in the day, you had to be a member to attend the events. We had a lot of events at each other's houses. We had a box dinner, bonfire, and hayride at one of our members' ranch one time. I had a luau at my home, with a covered dish and grilled meat, and we also had an outdoor talent show! Another time we had a progressive dinner. Different couples took one course of the meal and fixed it at their house. We had a motorhome and some vans to transport everyone. We started with appetizers at one home, then salads at the next home, all the way through the meal to dessert. When we chartered busses, we would have two full 45-seat busses of Buttons & Bows members!

We used to get together once a month for lunch to celebrate birthdays that month. Everyone took a turn making the arrangements. We started as just women participating, but the guys felt left out, so we started including them. When we danced in Mulberry, we went to the Mulberry Restaurant for dinner or breakfast after every dance. When we went to the Knothead Konvention in Tampa, someone would block a section of a floor for Buttons & Bows so that we were all together. Everyone left their doors to their rooms open, and everyone just walked in and out. We ate together and shopped together all weekend in between the dancing.

At Orlando Singles, whenever anyone had a birthday or anniversary, they were called to the front of the room and given a card signed by everyone. We all sang Happy Birthday or Happy Anniversary, and then everyone went up to give them a yellowrock. I always wondered how many of them only received that one card and all those yellowrocks for their birthday?

Even though Suncoast Squares hasn't danced since March or April, they have been in contact with each other every week with Zoom, and sometimes more than once a week. They have themes for each night, and they dress up in costume for the call. They have dinners at each other's houses, celebrate birthdays at different homes, or meet at a restaurant. They go to concerts when a member is in the show. One time a couple had dinner at their house. They lived on the water, and everyone was invited to bring their boats. They have a Trivia Night planned for one of their calls. Each person is asked to give three facts about themselves, one false and two fake. They have had several Carona Alona Scavenger Hunts. A few times, a member has invited everyone to their house for a pool party called The Great Splash. Their latest thing is to dance with hula hoops, and they're going to do it at a park. How much interest do you think that will generate? They travel together to dance conventions, but a group will get together and go to Europe, the Far East, etc. When they have their Annual Fly-in, homes are opened to the out-of-town guests, so they don't have to stay in hotels, and they include a few meals in their registration fee.

Shufflin' Squares in Lake Wales has been having Zoom meetings every week too. They talk for a bit, and they practice phantom dancing. What is phantom dancing? You have a person or couple, and the other couple is "phantom." You are dancing by yourself, but you have to know where the other people would be and pretend to dance with them. Everybody on the call gets up and does the calls right there in their kitchen, den, whatever. They are getting to keep in practice with their dancing and talk to other people.

Space Trackers in Melbourne was having Friendship Dinners once a month before the pandemic. It started as a brown bag meal while decorating for Christmas; then it became a once a month dinner for members. Each month a group of people is in charge, and they do all the cooking. After a while, they started inviting visitors because they always had a lot of leftovers. They have anywhere from 18-27 people at these dinners each month.

Does anyone see the recurring theme with all of these? Just about all of these events weren't at a dance, they weren't at a theme park, they are held in a quiet place where everyone could sit down and enjoy a meal with their family. In some cases, they met someone new; in other cases, they updated everyone

on children, grandchildren, weddings, etc. Sometimes, it was just a general conversation. They saw both of my daughters grow up, I either met or knew about most of their children, what careers they retired from, their hobbies, and in some cases, I could tell about their golf game! LOL. Again, I always wondered if any of these people lived and ate alone. Did they miss having that big Thanksgiving dinner every year with the whole family sitting around the table? They were just like Thanksgiving dinners.

With not being able to hold dances and not seeing each other for approximately seven months, what's happening to our dance family? What are you doing to keep your club together? Have you been keeping in touch with everyone, especially those that live alone and are confined to their homes? Are they ok? Is anybody sick? Are you still remembering birthdays and anniversaries during this time? These are the things that keep a family together. Are people not going to return to dances because they have been forgotten over the past seven months?

## **Strawberry Square Social Dancing**

We will be dancing at Strawberry Square every Saturday in August. Until further notice, the maximum number of people at all dances is 46, and reservations are required. Make your reservations by calling me, replying to emails, and letting me know which dances you will be attending. We are now getting several people from Zephyrhills, so the music will be a lot of country-western dancing.

From 6:00 p.m. to 6:30 p.m., there will be ballroom music for ballroom dancers. The ballroom music will be quick step, west coast swing, Viennese waltz, night club two-step, and Argentine Tango. This is temporary due to not being able to have dance lessons.

Face masks might be available for sale at \$3.00 each.

What we will be doing to promote safety:

- 1. We will only use every other table. The tables that we will not use will have a couple of chairs on top of them.
- 2. Strawberry Square will provide hand sanitizer. There will be 2 locations for the hand sanitizer. One location will be the desk where you pay; the other is the counter where the water was located.
- 3. Water and ice will not be available at this time, so bring your own.
- 4. I have bought an FDA approved no-touch temperature scanner to scan everyone.
- 5. Dance lessons at this time will be no-touch by the dance instructor.

These dances will be social dancing, where we have a 3,000 square foot floating wood floor to dance on. Social dancing includes slow dances, waltzes, line dances, cha-cha and rumbas, two-step and country slow, swing, freestyle, and some Latin dances. Ballroom dancers can dance to most of this music also. Singles and younger generation people are welcome. Come dance to the music by DJ Ken Miller. This event is now posted on Facebook (friend me on Facebook) and in the Nextdoor app.

The complementary dance lessons are suspended for the present, from 6 p.m. to 6:30 p.m. Beginners to advanced, basic fundamentals of social dancing to advanced social dancing.

The fee for the dance and dance lessons is \$6.00.

### **2021 Florida State Convention**

## **All Things Considered**

### Identifying Head or Side Girls During a Tip

The following question was received from a caller: "How do you know the designation for a girl if she is not with her original partner or her original opposite?"

For example, if a side girl is with a head boy, is she still a side girl, or is she now a head girl?

The "rule" is that at Mainstream and Plus, the girl always assumes the identity of the boy who is her partner. So from a static square, after the ladies Chain 3/4, the caller can now say "Sides Flutterwheel," and those at the side position will do the call. The original head girl is now a side girl.

Likewise, after the ladies Chain 3/4, if the caller says: "Promenade, don't slow down, Heads Wheel Around," it is the head boy and the girl who is with him (who previously was a side girl).

This rule has been in effect for over 50 years.

It becomes trickier from other setups. For example, after ladies Chain <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> and the caller establishes standard lines facing out, let's say the caller wishes to have two couples Wheel Around to form two-faced lines. If the caller says, "Heads Wheel Around," it would automatically be each head boy and the girl with him.

But this puts more pressure on the girl because this more of an involved situation. So to have less pressure on the girl, it might be better for the caller to say: "Head boy and the girl with you – Wheel Around." It is not a rule that the caller needs to say this; it is just a suggestion, hopefully, to make for less confusion.

But the rule makes a change. At Advanced and Challenge, the original rule no longer applies. Now everyone, including the girl, keeps his or her original identity throughout the tip, no matter whom a person has as a partner.

This rule change is not written anywhere, but it is the way these programs have always operated.

So at Advanced and Challenge, if the side girl is with a head boy, the caller must always say: "Head boy and the girl with you...". This applies everywhere, including a square set, from a Promenade, and all other situations where the caller wishes to designate two particular couples. If the caller knows that each boy has his original partner or opposite, then the caller can just say Heads or Sides.

As a result, if a caller is sight calling at Advanced or Challenge and is not sure who has whom, the caller should say: "Head boy and the girl with you..." as insurance, everyone will operate smoothly.

If a caller who calls a lot of Advanced and Challenge is calling a Mainstream or Plus dance, that caller may say, "Side boy and the girl with you..." from a square set or a Promenade. The caller is so used to saying this that it just comes out automatically. It does not hurt anything and may make it clearer for some.

## REVIVING SQUARE DANCING IN THE WAKE OF COVID-19

FOR IMMEDIATE RELEASE (JULY 2020)

Guidelines for CALLERLAB Members (June 2020)

Dancers and callers love square dancing and miss the fellowship, social engagement, and shared community that the COVID-19 pandemic took away from us. We now need to regroup and start planning on how to positively move forward following this extended period of isolation. To this end, CALLERLAB wishes to provide its Members with the following guidelines to use as we approach reopening square dancing.

### **Staying Connected:**

Before restrictions are lifted, CALLERLAB Members can collaborate and share ideas for keeping the square dance community connected and interactive. Many CALLERLAB Members are using creative approaches for engaging dancers and staying in touch with them. This includes:

- 1. Zoom meetings so club members can check in with each other.
- 2. Virtual dances, one-couple, and two-couple online dancing events.
- 3. Sharing videos of square dancing.
- 4. Sharing square dance word searches, crosswords, and other puzzles.
- 5. Checking in with dancers to let them know we will get through this and dance again.

Callers can brainstorm many other ideas in their individual areas.

### **Conditions for Resuming Square Dancing:**

CALLERLAB recognizes that local guidelines will dictate how reopening will actually take place in various locations. In some places, reopening may occur relatively soon, while in others, the easing of restrictions will take place much more slowly. As we plan to reopen square dancing, we must respect local guidelines and requirements. Therefore:

- 1. First and foremost, be aware that your personal health and well-being and that of your dancers are of the utmost importance.
- 2. Carefully follow all federal, state/provincial, and local government regulations that are in place in your immediate area.
- 3. Communicate and cooperate with local square dance groups and organizations regarding plans.
- 4. Above all, use good judgment and common sense.

### Strategic Plan for Returning to Dancing:

CALLERLAB is providing the following guidelines for Members to use in developing a local strategic plan to get dancing up and running quickly. Callers should work with regional associations and clubs in understanding how and when their area is opening up and use that information to plan and prepare for the resumption of square dancing.

This will include:

### 1. Startup Planning:

- a. Communicate with dancers regarding the startup calendar, including times and dates.
- b. Ensure that halls are available and ready to accept dancers.
- c. Coordinate all aspects of the required physical distancing requirements for your location.

### 2. Hygiene Considerations:

- a. CALLERLAB Members are encouraged to work with their local clubs to put recommended local hygienic practices into place. This includes honoring local government guidelines and those developed by regional and national square dance organizations, such as the USDA.
- b. Hygienic guidelines are readily available from many square dance organizations, and may include:
  - i. Sign in and payment procedures.
  - ii. Wearing protective gear such as masks or shields.

- iii. Cleansing hands by appropriate washing or using certified antivirus sanitizers.
- iv. Not sharing food.
- v. Using personal beverage containers.
- vi. Respecting local physical distancing guidelines to the greatest degree possible given the nature of the activity.
- vii. Other protective options.
- c. Everyone involved needs to collaborate to make appropriate hygienic practices a priority.

### 3. Caller Considerations:

As we return to calling, callers may:

- a. Elect to wear protective hygienic gear based on local guidelines and regulations. If wearing a mask makes it difficult to be heard or understood, set up the hall to allow significantly extra physical distancing from any dancers while calling.
- b. Consider not sharing the stage and personally making all announcements unless a club officer has a separate microphone and can physically distance on stage.
- c. Elect to carry their own antivirus hand sanitizer while calling.
- d. Consider using a shorter program or modified choreography to support dancers in being successful and having fun as they come up to speed following this long break from dancing.
- e. Consult with club leaders or dancers regarding limiting dancer mixing and contact by assigning squares for the evening or using variations such as two-couple choreography.
- f. Focus on high energy, successful, and fun dancing.
- g. When the time comes where new folks feel comfortable trying the activity, consider aiming for a shorter entry list. Some possible options are the Community Dance Program, part or all of the Basic Program, or Social Square Dancing (SSD).
- h. Remember that our primary goals include promoting social interaction, enjoying dancing together, and ensuring that dancers are successful and come away with smiles on their faces.

### 4. Fiscal Considerations:

- a. Dancers may be physically stressed from decreases in income due to Covid-19.
- b. Local restrictions on the number of people who may gather in a specified space might spread the cost-base over fewer participants.
- c. There may be significant changes in hall rental fees as locations try to make up for lost revenue and increased cleaning costs.

As we navigate these uncharted times, it is more important than ever to share our ideas, stories, and experiences to help us successfully address the challenges we face. Callers and dancers are urged to share their stories via the CALLERLAB Square Dance KnowledgeBase. These guidelines were written in June 2020. As the reopening process evolves, there may be a need for modifications or additions. They are a starting point for Members of CALLERLAB to use as they work with clubs and dancers in developing local plans allowing us to "Square Up" once more.

## Give to Square Dancing and Take a Tax Deduction

A group of dancers was discussing charitable contributions and what groups they give to during the year, such as the United Way, Salvation Army, and churches. Someone made the comment that they wished they could make a charitable contribution to the square dance activity and get a tax write-off, but that there was no way to do this.

YES, THERE IS! The CALLERLAB Foundation for the Preservation and Promotion of Square Dancing is a non-profit corporation dedicated to preserving the heritage of the square dance activity. The Foundation was established in 1990 as a way to safeguard the history of square dancing and to promote its growth.

The Foundation is the legal entity through which money is raised to carry out the specified goals of the organization. It is registered with the Internal Revenue Service as a 501(C)(3) corporation, and donations to the Foundation are tax-deductible.

The mission of the Foundation is to "preserve and promote square dancing through the preservation of the heritage of square dancing, the establishment and enhancement of a positive perception of square dancing, and education regarding the benefits of square dancing to the general public."

Goals of the Foundation are to "develop and maintain a national advertising campaign to promote square dancing, develop and encourage educational programs directed toward the mission of the Foundation, and provide funding through grants and loans to support the mission of the Foundation. A major goal is to promote the wholesome nature of the activity."

The Foundation has already accomplished much in support of its goals, such as (1) publishing and distributing one million brochures to promote square dancing, (2) producing and distributing over 4,000 promotional videotapes containing television public service announcements to be used in recruiting new dancers, (3) providing a grant to the New England Foundation for the preservation of square dancing, (4) providing square dancing educational materials to the Czech Republic, (5) funding an education exchange between master dance instructors from the People's Republic of China and square dance leaders in the United States, and (60 funding a variety of projects all aimed at promoting square dancing.

The Foundation has numerous future projects under consideration, but funding is needed to make them a reality.

A sample codicil for last will and testaments for those who would like to bequeath money to the Foundation has been developed and is effective in all 50 states and Canada.

Individuals, square dance clubs, dancer organizations, and caller associations may wish to consider making a donation for this ongoing preservation of square dancing.
