I don't know about you, but I'm

ready for the dance season to start! When your whole world revolves around square dancing and there are no dances to go to, what are you supposed to do?

We were shocked this week by the passing of Caller Tim Marriner due to a massive heart attack on August 29th. He had just returned from a dance in

Canada. A GoFundMe page was established to help Donna with the funeral expenses. The goal is \$20,000; as of this writing (September 1<sup>st</sup>) square dancers have done it again. We have raised \$21,280!

We also lost Caller Al Brundage on August 30<sup>th</sup>. He was 96 years old and lived in south Florida. As of this writing, funeral details have not been received.

By the time you read this article, it will be time for the snowbirds to start returning to Florida and the seasonal clubs will be starting up. Hopefully there will be numerous new dancer dances (classes) starting up too! It's not too early to start advertising and recruiting for the Fall. I hope that the experienced dancers will see the benefit of participating in these classes. Your assistance will not only encourage the new dancers but you might be surprised to find out some things have changed since you learned to dance. As you probably know many calls move from list to list, so when you were learning there might be calls that were on the Advance list that you didn't learn but now they are on the Plus list. Definitions are also revised; you don't normally see any communications about these changes so you should participate in new dancer sessions so you can find about them.

Several of the large dances in Florida are changing their dates this dance season. Grand Square International's Daytona Beach Ball will be September 9 – 10 this year; it has been in October for several years. GSI's Florida Space Coast Fiesta (formerly Winter Festival) will be

February 3 - 4, 2017 and will be held in Titusville instead of Lakeland; in the past, it has been the end of January. The  $63^{rd}$  Florida State Convention that has been on Memorial Day Weekend for longer than I have danced, which is 35+ years, will be March 24 - 25, 2017.

After the dance season gets started, there will be two association weekends in November. The West Coast Association's 42<sup>nd</sup> Annual Fall Fun Fest will be November 11th – 12th in Bartow. Tom Miller and Jack Lewis will be calling and Susan Snider will be cueing. Ribbons are \$18 per person in advance for the entire weekend; \$20 at the door. The following weekend the Northeast Association will have their annual Fall Festival "A Bountiful Barn Dance" November 18th – 19th. Ted Kennedy will be calling and Sandy Sturgis will be cueing. Ribbons are \$15 per person in advance for the entire weekend; \$20 at the door. If you want to come for just one night, the cost is \$10 per person. You can find flyers for these dances www.floridasquaredance.com at or www.dancergram.com.

The Florida Callers Association will be holding their annual clinic in Lakeland October  $14^{th} - 15^{th}$ . Betsy Gotta is the scheduled clinician. You do not have to be a member of the FCA to attend this clinic. As part of this weekend, there will be a dance at Strawberry Square in Plant



# CALLERLAB VIEWPOINTS

We've all go so much to be thankful for and this is the month to stop and count our blessings. Sure, there are challenges that each of us face on a daily, weekly, monthly, and even yearly basis, and some of those challenges can be major. Yet in the big

scheme of things, if we've got our health and we are still able to get out on the dance floor and share the joy of moving to music with others, we truly do have something to be thankful for.

Long ago, Henry Ford realized that his factory workers could really enjoy a dance activity for the exercise, fun, health benefits, and the social value that it could bring to them. He knew that the majority of his workers came home, did their chores, went to sleep and came back to work the next day, week in and week out. He wanted an activity that his workers could enjoy with each other, without regard to their hierarchy in the work place. If he was successful, he could not only make his workers lives more enjoyable, and improve the relationships of his employees, he could even make them healthier and more productive.

He also knew that those who could teach and call American Square and Round dance were slowly becoming more and more difficult to find and that many of the written information of the dances of that time were in danger of being lost or forgotten. His book, Good Morning America, was a great step in documenting collecting, and organizing some of the dances of that day and before. He built a wonderful dance hall, found a dance teacher/master to come to Michigan and began to hold these dances on a regular basis. He did succeed with all the benefits mentioned above, and this began the resurgence of American Square and Round dancing in the United States. These dances also included contras, mixers and other traditional dances.

Some of the above points may sound familiar. We've got millions of people around the world that work a long day, come home, do their chores and go back to work the next day. Today, we can add television, computers, phones and other competing recreations to the equation, but there are still many people who would benefit from the fun, exercise and social capital (as we call it), that our dance activity brings its participants. This activity also allows people from all walks of life to come together equally and enjoy moving to music. I can't think of any other recreation where so many people form so many different backgrounds, who otherwise have nothing else in common, can have so much fun together.

We also have another similar parallel to Henry Ford's tome. Those who teach, call, and cue in our activity are becoming more difficult to find. Many callers, cuers, and prompters have retired in the last 15 years. It's estimated that we have only one-third the number we had in 1985. There are many areas in the North American continent and around the world where the nearest caller or cuer may live 50 to 200 or more miles away. Getting someone who lives close enough to teach a class, and call or cue a dance can be a big challenge or might be impossible.

An important part of the success of growing and maintaining our activity in the future will be based on recruiting and training new callers and cuers. The CALLERLAB Convention has educational seminars that have been recorded and made available to callers and dance leaders around the world. Handouts from all those sessions are also available from the website and Home Office. Members can now get a complete set of MP3s of each recorded session from an entire Convention for only \$25.

Our Caller-Coach Accreditation program has expanded and CALLERLAB, Grand Square Inc., the Music Producers Committee, and others have partial and full scholarship programs to caller schools. Grand Square Inc. has funded caller schools with free tuition to promote and improve square dancing by educating new and seasoned callers for many years now. One of GSI's largest free caller schools occurs just prior to each National Convention in June, and educational sessions continue at the Convention itself. Efforts like these are really starting to turn the numbers around, but we still have a long way to go.

There are several very easy things we all can do to help encourage our existing and upcoming callers and cuers. Clubs and dancers can encourage and compliment your own callers and cuers during and after a dance or festival. Kind words go a long way to make someone feel good about their efforts and can even provide the incentive for some to make additional efforts to improve and update their skills and repertoire. Applauding your caller and cuer at the end of each tip and even an occasional standing ovation, if warranted, to have your caller and cuer do "one

more song" is an enormous boost in one's self worth. Those who call and cue overseas see this on a regular basis. It's a wonderful feeling to know that the dancers like what you do and are enjoying it enough, to have you do an additional song or two. Constructive criticism, if done properly from the right source, can also help a caller and cuer. Many of us actively seek that feedback from callers and other dancers that hear us teach and entertain.

Gifts to your caller and cuer for special occasions are also very much appreciated and can add to their continuing education. Subscriptions to dance publications, scholarship-like gifts to caller schools and seminars, partial and/or full payments for attending CALLERLAB, ROUNDALAB, CONTRALAB, a national convention, or reginal festival can also be a great incentive for callers and cuers to learn, continue their education, and improve their skills. Gift certificates for new music are also a wonderful gift.

Callers, cuers and prompters can also help. Encouraging dancers to learn to call and cue can sometimes be all that is necessary for someone to start. Mentoring newer callers and cuers is also an important part of growing our activity. It takes a long time a a lot of effort and practice for someone to learn to call and cue. Purchasing equipment, records, etc., is also no easy or inexpensive task. Any help we can give each other in this area can go a long way.

CALLERLAB, ROUNDALAB, and CONTRALAB all have good educational information available from their Home Offices and websites. Joining a national or regional organization can be very beneficial in learning and continuing the education process that is so necessary to successful calling cueing, and prompting.

We do have so much to be thankful for. In the coming years it will be so important for us to show our appreciation for each other, encourage and be tolerant of our newer leaders, and support our existing leaders for their efforts. That kindness will go a long way in growing a truly wonderful activity and spreading the joy of dancing to our every improving library of music.

### A Simple Tip To Help Dancers

So many times we've seen the callers who are singing along while the dancers are doing the Promenade Home, then call out "Sides Face, Grand Square" but the dancers are still 4 - 6 beats (steps) away from home. Some dancers will abruptly stop short and attempt the call even though it can't be done; some will get to home position and begin the call but the callers is 4 - 6 beats ahead of them. The dancers may cut short the Grand Square in an attempt to catch up with the caller crying out "Allemande Left and Weave the Ring". Others never catch up. The bottom line is the dancers are out-of-sync with the music because of the caller. You may be the caller who has found himself in this situation many times and don't know what to do. Let's address it.

Prior to the call Promenade there was a string of calls that probably started at Home Position moving the dancers toward the Swing and Promenade. One of the most common sequences used in singing calls today is HEADS SQUARE TRHU – DO SO DO – SWING THRU – BOYS RUN – BEND THE LINE – RIGHT & LEFT THRU – FLUTTERWHEEL = SLIDE THRU – SWING & PROMENADE. Using the CALLERLAB Timing Chart, which details how many beats each call should take to execute, this sequence of calls should take 68 beats. The problem is our square dance music stanza is 64 beats so this figure will cause the dancers to fall 4 beats or 4 steps behind every time it's called. Fix it. Omit the call DO SA DO. By dropping that call you have given the dancers 6 more beats which would allow them enough time to keep up.

How about the popular sequence of HEADS SQUARE THRU – DO SO ADO – SWING THRU – SPIN THE TOP - RIGHT & LEFT THU – SQUARE THRU THREE – SWING & PROMENADE? It times to 64 beats, which pairs perfectly with 64 beats of music in the stanza designated for the figure, so why aren't some dancers able to dance a perfectly timed figure? Because perfection doesn't allow for sticky floors, bad sound, dancer mistakes, physically impaired dancers or callers who don't start calling ahead of beat number one. Think about the last comment. If the caller says "well now those Heads Square Thru." Then the dancers are 3 beats behind. It took 3 beats for the caller to say the words "well now those. What if the caller was waiting for people to finish the last sequence? Fix it. Omit the call DO SA DO. By dropping that call you have given the dancers 6 more beats which would allow them enough time to keep up.

In fact the call DO SA DO, aside from its historic value, plays one important role in modern square dancing as it is a terrific call when there is a change of body direction from one call to another. An example of this change and the value of DO SA DO can be seen in the sequence: CIRCLE LEFT – ALLEMANDE LEFT – DO SA DO – BOYS STAR LEFT. Without the DO SA DO, the flow of Allemande to boys Star Left would be awful. In singing call figures, the DO SA DO is often used as a filler and is probably not necessary. For example:


- 1. Each call sequence HEADS SQUARE THRU SWING THRU offers perfect flow. Adding the call DO SA DO is like adding the word "like" or "basically" to your conversations. It's not necessary and in most cases ruins the flow of what you are saying.
- 2. A singing call in this month's review uses the sequences HEADS SQUARE THRU DO SA DO = TOUCH A QUARTER SCOOT BACK BOYS RUN RIGHT & LEFT THRU DIXIE STYLE TO A WAVE -= BOYS CROSS FOLD SWING. The figure is well timed, but if the dancers are falling behind then removing DO SA DO would help them keep in time with the music. Coming from a SQUARE THRU most calls that start with a Right Hand, TOUCH A QUARTER, RIGHT & LEFT THRU, BOX THE GNAT, SPIN THE TOP, etc. tend to flow better WITHOUT a DO SA DO.
- 3. The call sequence HEADS SQUARE THRU DO SA DO STAR THRU offers nice flow. Removing the DO SA DO would make the Girls use their Left Hand twice in a row and that is the mark of a poor caller. So the call DO SA DO is necessary before the STAR THRU, but is NOT necessary if the calls were HEADS SQUARE THRU – SLIDE THRU. The latter helps dancers keep in time with the music and offers much better body flow.

On a personal note, a few years back, I was dancing at a convention and after a few hours felt pain in my right hip. As I thought about this ache, I realized how many times "DO SA DO TO A SWING THRU" HAD BEEN CALLED THAT DAY. This combination had me walking forward to the right, backing up to the left then abruptly pivoting forward on my right hip. That combination is a "DO SA DON"I".

In closing, a well-timed dance figure delivered by a caller giving the dancers the first beat o music while the dancers are able to move in time with the musical phrase, should be everyone's goal, but for those times when perfection is out-of-reach, fix it. Examine your dance sequences to determine when the call DO SA DO is needed and delete the filler to help your dancers stay in time with the music and dance longer into the night. 

Alfred G. Brundage, 96, a nationally recognized square dance caller of Miami and formerly of Port St. Lucie, Fla., and Connecticut, died August. 30, 2016 in Miami of natural causes.

Brundage, the partner of Norma Peak of Miami since 1997, was predeceased by Beatrice Miles Brundage, his wife of 31 years, and his grandson, Frederick Griswold Schalich.

He is survived by two children, Barry Wolcott Brundage of London, and Mary Lou Brundage Schalich of Monroe, Conn.; three stepchildren,

William F. Miles of Annapolis, Md., Barbara Brooks of Rockport, Maine, and Patricia Silvia of Milford, Conn.; a brother, Robert M. Brundage of Albuquerque, N.M.; nine grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.

Born Nov. 4, 1919 in Hartford, Conn., Brundage was the son of the late Harold A. and Mable Gene Griswold Brundage. He grew up in Danbury, Conn., and graduated from Danbury High School and the University of Maine, where he studied agriculture. However, it was Brundage's boyhood fascination with square dancing, discovered peeking into the windows at Danbury's now-defunct Hawthorne's Tavern, which would direct his career path.

Brundage, his mother, brother and several neighbors formed the 4H Club's first-ever music club, the King Street Pioneers, that helped introduce square dance music to the region. Brundage initially played trumpet for the band before filling in for the group's outgoing square dance caller and discovering his life's passion.

As square dancing grew in popularity, Brundage and the King Street Pioneers went from passing the hat after dances in a former chicken coop to becoming a sought-after attraction for local community groups and churches.

In the 1930s, Brundage began teaching square dancing at state 4H conferences in Stores College, Conn., now the University of Connecticut. He opened his first dance barn in 1948 in Stepney, Conn., where he taught his first caller school, also one of the first in the Northeastern United States.

Brundage received broad recognition for his contributions to square

dancing. He was a sought-after attraction among community groups and churches, and a regular featured performer at the Danbury State Fair. He was admitted to the National Square Dance Hall of Fame in 1975 and in 1993, to the New England Square Dancing Hall of Fame. In addition, the Square Dance Foundation of New England presented him its highest award for distinguished service, the Yankee Clipper Award, in 2003.

In addition to calling square dances and teaching callers in Connecticut, and after 1978, in Florida, Brundage established a strong dance tourism program. Over the course of 50 years, he and his late wife led thousands of dancers to sightseeing and dance exchanges in 35 countries. Among Brundage's career highlights were the opportunities to call square dances on the Great Wall of China, at the Taj Mahal in India, and on the grounds of the Parthenon in Greece, the Pyramids in Egypt and at Nairobi National Park in Kenya.

As he shared his love of square dancing and travel, Brundage developed deep, lasting friendships around the world. He lived his life based on a creed he called the "3 Cs," striving never to complain, criticize or condemn.


