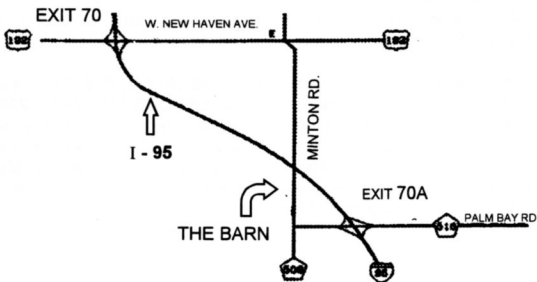

NATURAL ALTERNATIVES TO OVER THE COUNTER AND PRESCRIPTION DRUGS

Colloidal Silver

The Rediscovery of a Super Antibiotic?

Colloidal silver appears to be a powerful, natural antibiotic and preventative against infections. Acting as a catalyst, it reportedly disables the enzyme that one-celled bacteria, viruses and fungi need for their oxygen metabolism. They suffocate without corresponding harm occurring to human enzymes or parts of the human body chemistry. The result is the destruction of disease-causing organisms in the body and in the food.

Early Research

Colloidal silver was in common use until 1938. Many remember their grandparents putting silver dollars in milk to prolong its freshness at room temperature.

At the turn of the century, scientists had discovered that the body's most important fluids are colloidal in nature; suspended ultra-fine particles. Blood, for example, carries nutrition and oxygen to the body cells. This led to studies with colloidal silver. Prior to 1938, colloidal silver was used by physicians as a mainstream antibiotic treatment and was considered quite "high-tech." Production methods, however were costly. The pharmaceutical industry moved in, causing colloidal research to be set aside in favor of fast working, more toxic and potentially dangerous drugs. The Food and Drug Administration today classifies colloidal silver as a pre 1938 drug. A letter from the FDA dated 9/13/91 states: "These products may continue to be marketed . . . as long as they are advertised and labeled for the same use as in 1938 and as long as they are manufactured in the original manner." Some of the manufacturing methods used before 1938 are still used today. An electro-colloidal process, which is known to be the best method, is used.

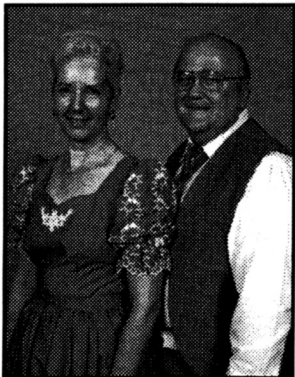
Contemporary Studies

While studying regeneration of limbs, spinal cords and organs in the late 1970s, Robert O. Becker, M.D., author of *The Body Electric*, discovered that silver ions promote bone growth and kill surrounding bacteria. The March 1978 issue of *Science Digest*, in an article, "Our Mightiest Germ Fighter," reported: "Thanks to eye-opening research, silver is emerging as a wonder of modern medicine. An antibiotic kills perhaps a half-dozen different disease organisms, but silver kills some 650. Resistant strains fail to

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WHY SUPPORT A CLUB??

We wrote this article last year about this same time. We were reviewing some of our past articles and this one struck us as one which is important enough to repeat. We have always believed that the club structure is the most important in square dancing. Without clubs and willing workers it would be difficult for our activity to continue.

The basic foundation of square dancing is "the club". Every area of the world we have visited, lived in, or heard about has this basic foundation. Clubs come in many different shapes and sizes, but they all serve the same purpose. That purpose is to provide a place for square dancers to gather and enjoy this activity. Hopefully this place will be friendly, pleasant, and comfortable.

able.

There are two primary types of clubs. The first and most abundant is the "Board run" club, the second is the "caller/cuer run" club. The board run club is governed by volunteers who have agreed to give their time to the activity. The activity is fortunate indeed to have these people. Without them many clubs would not survive. In fact there are many, many stories about clubs which have been successful, but could not find anyone to serve as officers. Unfortunately, many times this results in the club "folding".

The job of running a club is challenging and can be quite frustrating, especially if there are numerous complaints about insignificant details. It is our opinion that most of us will have at least one thing which "bugs" us. If this thing is not harmful, hurtful, illegal, nor immoral perhaps we could examine our complaint before voicing it to the club officers. This is not to say we should suffer in silence if something does "bug" us. It seems appropriate, though, to trust the officers we have elected (and who volunteered) to do the right thing for the club. It also seems appropriate to voice our complaints to the club leadership and not to other members. This will allow the leadership to investigate the complaint, take appropriate action, or bring the

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develop. Moreover, silver is virtually non-toxic. "The article ended with a quote by Dr. Harry Margraf, a biochemist and pioneering silver researcher who worked with the late Carl Moyer, M.D., chairman of Washington University's Department of Surgery in the 1970s: "Silver is the best all-around germ fighter we have."

How It Works

The presence of colloidal silver near a virus, fungus, bacterium or any other single celled pathogen disables its oxygen metabolism enzyme, its chemical lung, so to say. Within a few minutes, the pathogen suffocates and dies, and is cleared out of the body by the immune, lymphatic and elimination systems. Unlike pharmaceutical antibiotics which destroy beneficial enzymes, colloidal silver leaves these tissue-cell enzymes intact, as they are radically different from the enzymes of primitive single-celled life. Thus colloidal silver is absolutely safe for humans, reptiles, plants and all multi-celled living matter.

Product Quality

Many brands of colloidal silver are inferior. The highest grade is produced by the electro-colloidal / non-chemical method where the silver particles and water have been colloided, i.e., dispersed within and bound to each other by an electric current. The super-fine silver particles are suspended indefinitely in demineralized water. The ideal color of colloidal silver is a golden yellow. Darker colors indicate larger silver particles which tend to collect at the bottom of the container and are not true colloids. If a product contains a stabilizer or lists trace elements other than silver, or if it needs to be shaken, it is inferior. If a product requires refrigeration, some other ingredient is present that could spoil. The container and dropper must be glass, as plastic cannot preserve the silver in liquid suspension for any length of time. Some brands are actually unsafe. High concentrations of silver do not kill disease germs more effectively than the safe range of 3 to 5 parts per million (ppm).

Ingesting Colloidal Silver

Taken orally, the silver solution is absorbed from the mouth into the blood stream, then transported quickly to the body cells. Swishing the solution under the tongue briefly before swallowing ensures fast absorption. In three to four days the silver will have accumulated in the tissues sufficiently for benefits to begin. Since colloidal silver is eliminated by the kidneys, lymph system and bowel after three weeks, a regular daily intake is recommended as a protection against dangerous pathogens. In cases of minor burns, an accumulation of colloidal silver can hasten healing, reducing scar tissue and infection. The lives of millions of people susceptible to chronic low-grade infections can

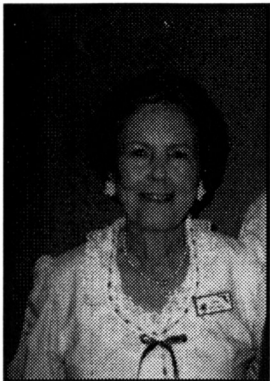

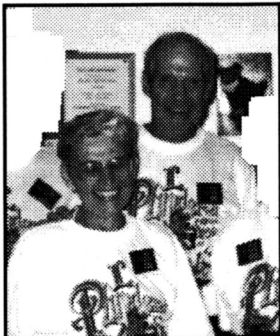

be enhanced by this powerful preventative health measure.

Chronic or Serious Conditions

FROM THE BARN KITCHEN

Pat 's Key Lime Pie

Ingredients:

One each 9 inch pastry shell (prepared shell or prepared Graham Cracker shell)

Four large eggs (separated)

One 14 ounce can Eagle Brand sweetened condensed milk

1/2 cup Key Lime Juice

1/2 teaspoon of Cream of Tartar

1/2 cup of sugar



Directions:

- Preheat oven to 350 degrees In a medium mixing bowl, beat the egg yolks; stir in sweetened condensed milk and key lime juice.
- In a small mixing bowl, beat the egg whites with cream of tartar until peaks form. Gradually add sugar, beating until stiff but not dry. · Fold 1/4th of the meringue into the pie filling. Pour into prepared pastry shell.
- Spread remaining meringue on top of pie sealing it carefully to the edge of the shell.
- Bake 12 to 15 minutes or until golden brown. Cool and chill thoroughly.
- Use Refrigerate leftovers.

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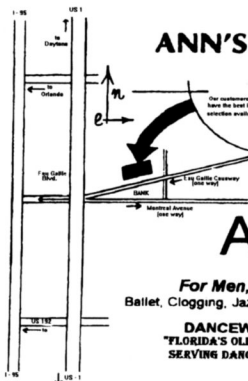

COMPUTERS

It is nearing Christmas and many will be considering buying computers as a gift, either for yourself, your significant other or a relative. This month we will discuss what kind and size system may be best for you.

Buying a computer can be fun. IF you know what it is you want. This will involve a little planning. First, do you want a computer? This is probably determined by what you think you can do with a computer. Most people do not NEED a computer. They don't need a lot of things but these things are what makes life interesting and challenging. It might not be a very exciting, or rewarding, life if we only had what we really needed. So, if we have decided that a computer would make you a little happier, give us a rewarding challenge, make our life a little easier, or give us something to do, then we are ready to decide what kind of computer we want or need.

Today's computers are very powerful and can store a lot of information and data. They are also relatively inexpensive. They can occupy much of your time and can be used by all ages for all reasons. Stan Crowhurst, 95 years young, recently purchased a computer and is enjoying the experience very much.

Let's look at the components you will be specifying on your system.

PROCESSOR. There are a lot of different processors from which you can select. The first thing you need to decide is which manufacturer's processor you want in your system. Until recently the only real choice was an Intel processor. Now you can safely put the AMD processor in your selection matrix. The Cryex processor is the other major contender but it has not yet received the good reviews that the AMD processor has when compared head to head with Intel. My personal choice is to buy Intel.

MEMORY. With the certain arrival of voice controlled computers, we need to have at least 64 meg of memory. New, intelligent software needs lots of memory. It is better to get it when we buy the computer rather than try to add it in later. It is also one of the inexpensive upgrades we may want.

DISPLAY. You will be spending a lot of time in front of the screen. Get a good .28 or .26 monitor. The lower the number the clearer the picture. I have a 17 inch display and would like a 21 inch. It is like a TV, the bigger the screen the better. Make sure you have adequate room to set up such a large screen. Get a least a 15 inch unit.

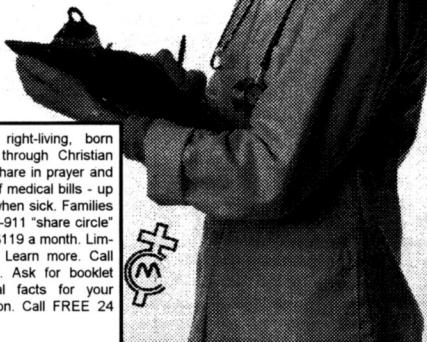
HARD DRIVE. I am still amazed that when I was in the business in 1979

and early 80's that the largest hard drive was 10 megabyte and users would ask, "what will you ever do with so much storage space?" Now you need over 100 meg to install one software package. I think now we see that even more space will be needed in the future. Today, a good system will have at least 6.4 gigabyte. In other words, it would have taken 64,000 10 megabyte drives to equal what we recommend as the MINIMUM hard drive storage today.

CD ROM. Every new system today comes with a CD ROM. It plays your music CD's and it is used to install software application packages you buy. A CD ROM holds 640 Meg of "stuff". The new DVD drives hold a LOT more and can play movies on your computer. There is coming soon the double sided – double density DVD that will hold over 15 Gig of "stuff". There are also CD's that are "re-writeable". This allows you to store information on a very reliable media. It is fast and not expensive on the write once media. I have purchased this media at ten cents a piece.

REMOVABLE STORAGE. Many system come with a ZIP Drive or other removable storage unit such as the Imation or Syquest units. They are very useful in doing backups and for sharing data with others. I have both the Imation and Syquest unit in my system.

OTHER "STUFF". You will need a mouse and keyboard to operate your system. A printer is also a necessity along with a MODEM so that you can get on the Internet.

MODEM. A v.90 MODEM operating at 56 K should be your only choice now.

COLOR PRINTER. An ink jet printer or a laser printer are the choices today. If you are really going to have fun, get a color printer. I like the Lexmark and the Epson units. These both receive high marks in the media.

SURGE PROTECTION AND BACKUP. The power will go out on you one day when you are operating your system. You will lose all the information that had not been saved to your storage media. A UPS will prevent this and also protect your equipment from voltage spikes. Go for at least a GOOD quality surge protector. It is much cheaper than replacing your modem or motherboard.

I personally think if you are not taking your system to another location (like being a snowbird) that signing up with a local ISP is much cheaper and gives better service, than signing up with AOL, MSN or the like. We have an ISP that will be presenting a course at THE BARN on Nov. 21st and will do so from time to time. Much information can be gained by attending one of these sessions.

I hope you enjoy your system as much as I do and have a very Merry Christmas.
