From the Loft



At a meeting of the Planning Board on April 29th, the location of the new Beltway was voted on. It is the recommendation of the South Brevard Transportation Study Committee that the new road curve north from Palm Bay Road, pass under the Florida Power and Light high voltage lines and proceed west along the power lines.

That's not to say some people won't be affected -- a house on Minton Road will go under the wrecking ball as Palm Bay Road curves up to run along power lines to the proposed Beltway. "We would rather displace one home than tens of others," said County Commissioner Helen Voltz, who heads the committee. This week's decision on where to send Palm Bay Road ended months of speculation that included raucous public meetings as residents fought to save their communities. They were all successful. The plan was approved in part because Norpak Corp., which owns just about everything in the triangle formed by Palm Bay Road, Minton Road and Interstate 95, has land for a road and is willing to "cooperate" with the county, said Bob Kamm of the Metropolitan Planning Organization. Norpak wants the road because it will promote commercial development in West Melbourne.

For those not familiar with the the area, this means that the gray house along Minton Road, in front of THE BARN is the house that will be torn down. In my conversation with Commissioner Voltz, I was told that THE BARN would also be torn down. I guess I don't have to say that I will not be building anymore buildings on the property! When this happens is anyone's guess. My best estimate is 5 to 10 years. We all know that a lot can happen in 5 years so there is not too much to get excited about right now.

I attended a meeting on May 11th and again the Power Line Road was discussed. It will be five years or more before anything happens and then it is a distinct possibility that the plans will change. We will do what we can to see that THE BARN remains a place for square, round and line dancers to enjoy themselves. We had too many square dancers put a lot of work into THE BARN to let it go without doing all we can to keep it.

Our greatest sadness comes from the possibility that Memorial Hall will be torn down. A lot of work went into building Memorial Hall and it means a lot to a lot of people. We will do all we can to preserve Memorial Hall.

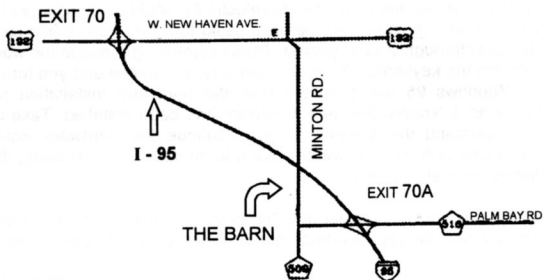

COMPUTERS

This month we will cover "SETTINGS" as selected from the "START" icon.

The three main selections from the "SETTINGS" icon are: 1) CONTROL PANEL, 2) PRINTERS and 3) TASKBAR.

CONTROL PANEL

The control panel allows you to change the computer's settings. To get to "control panel" click the "start" button (icon), point to "settings" and double click the "control panel". When we say click, we mean to place the arrow with the mouse on the icon and press the left mouse button. (By the way, you can change the mouse buttons for left hand operation here in the control panel.) If a "double click" is required, you must use the left mouse button twice - quickly - without moving the mouse pointer at all! I have seen many new users who do not click twice without moving the mouse and say "nothing happens". Practice clicking without moving the mouse and practice clicking twice - quickly.

Items listed on the "control panel" are many. Some you will never use. If you want to add new hardware or software, this is the place to go. You will notice that you have the option to "add new hardware" and "add/remove software". Today most all hardware is "plug and play" configured. That means that Windows 95 can detect and correctly install this hardware. It will assure that there are no address or interrupt conflicts. Many times the hardware vendor will supply an installation software package with the hardware. If this is the case, you will select "have disk" as an option when you are installing the hardware. Remember to follow directions on the package to add your new hardware. ALWAYS shut the computer "off" and remove the power cable "BEFORE" starting to install the hardware. In Florida static electricity is not the problem it is in dryer locations but you must be careful that you do not have static electricity destroy your hardware. At a computer show I once had 4 systems lined up with joysticks attached so people could use the system. As customers walked down the hall they built up static electricity in their bodies. As they touched the computer this electricity would be discharged through the computer. I "lost" 4 computers before I could turn them off. Static electricity can easily travel through your keyboard. Touch something metal at the work area before touching the keyboard. Once the hardware is installed and you turn on the computer, Windows 95 will generally start the hardware installation process automatically as it "knows" that new hardware has been installed. Take time to read and understand the screens as you continue the hardware installation process. You can do it and you will receive a lot of satisfaction knowing that you accomplished the task yourself.

Software installation is even easier than hardware installation. Most new software comes on CD and simply inserting this CD into your CD player will cause

NATURAL ALTERNATIVES TO OVER THE COUNTER AND PRESCRIPTION DRUGS

The Citricidal Story

The development of the compound called Citricidal (tm) has taken place over the past 20 years. Citricidal was originally developed by a German physicist as an antiparasitic. Since the mid-1980's, our Production Team has worked closely with the originator of this compound, and has now perfected the manufacturing process, opened our own facilities, and pioneered the use of this product beyond it's original application.

Citricidal is synthesized from the polyphenolic compounds found in grapefruit seed and pulp. Numerous chemical reactions are involved, including distillation, catalytic conversion, and ammoniation. The active component of Citricidal is a quaternary ammonium chloride (a diphenol hydroxybenzene reacted with ammonium chloride) similar to benzethonium chloride when analyzed in accordance with USP XXII/NF XVII.

Residues of pesticides, fungicides and preservatives have always been a concern with regards to our product. The use of these compounds is common in the agricultural and botanical industries in the United States as well as abroad. In addition, the extraction processes involved in botanicals would not necessarily remove these compounds. We recently had two samples of Citricidal tested for the presence of triclosan as well as an antimicrobial activity test using one of the samples (see United States Testing Company Report No. 405993, dated 9/8/95). The results showed no trace of triclosan, while displaying very strong antimicrobial activity. In an attempt to further improve the product, we have been able to secure a source of grapefruit seed and pulp from Certified Organically Grown grapefruits. Unfortunately, this material is in limited supply, thus limiting the amount of Citricidal available from this certified organic source.

To further show the safety of Citricidal, an Acute Oral Toxicity Study was performed (see Northview Pacific Labs Report No. X5E015G, dated 7/6/95). Results showed that Citricidal is considered non-toxic by oral

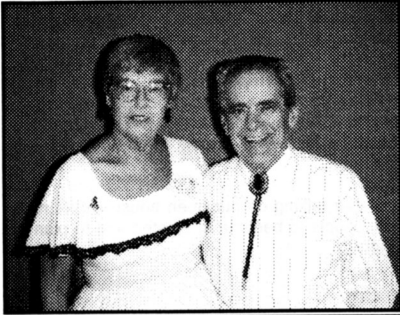

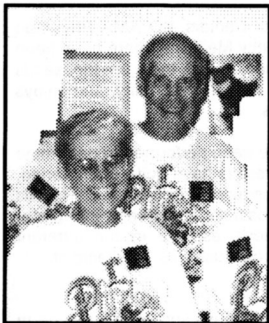

Windows 95 to start the install process. Hopefully you will understand a little about drives and folders before you start the installation process. Most software will "tell you" where it will store the software. You can take charge and decide where this software will be stored. Making and naming a meaningful folder will greatly aid you in controlling your computer environment. Take your time and carefully read each screen before proceeding to the next screen. As a quick review remember, your hard drive is like a big filing cabinet. I divide mine into separate "drawers" and then the drawers into "folders". Just as you would not mix your phone bill with your recipes, you should not mix your documents with your games. Take time to organize your files. The system will run faster and you will know where things are. It is MUCH easier to add software than to remove it. Try to resist trying every software package that you get your hands on. Remember, the best way to get a virus (wipes out your hard drive), is to use software you got from somebody else.

The "display" icon on the control panel allows you to set up your display and the display control card. Your system is probably set correctly for the video control card. You can change the resolution of your display, the colors displayed on your desktop and the screen saver using this icon. Remember, if you mess it up it is not easy to correct when you won't be able to "see" what is on your screen. Go easy and read each screen option carefully. Restarting your computer in SAFE MODE will always allow you to "correct" mistakes - if you have written down the settings BEFORE you make changes!!

To start your computer in "safe mode", perform the following steps:

- 1) Restart your computer by clicking the Start button
- 2) Clicking Shut Down
- 3) Restart The Computer by selecting the "restart" option
- 4) When you see the message "Starting Windows 95," press F8

In safe mode, Windows uses default settings (VGA monitor, no network, Microsoft mouse driver, and the minimum device drivers required to start Windows). You will not have access to CD-ROM drives, printers, or other devices.

You may use the "MODEM" icon on the control panel to check your modem for correct operation.

Double click the MODEM icon. Select the Port your modem is connected to and then select "diagnostics" and then "more information". This also gives you information on the highest baud rate you can connect at.

FROM THE BARN KITCHEN

WARM BLUEBERRY PUFF

- 2 large eggs
- 1/2 cup plus 2 tablespoons powdered sugar, divided
- 1/2 cup all-purpose flour
- 1 1/2 cups milk
- 2 tablespoons butter, melted
- 2 cups fresh blueberries
- 1 cup whipping cream
- 2 tablespoons brandy (optional)

Preheat oven to 450°F. Butter a 9-inch pie plate or baking dish. In a medium size bowl, beat eggs on medium speed until frothy. Gradually beat in 1/4 cup of the powdered sugar and the flour. Mixture will be quite stiff. Pour in milk, melted butter, and mix until well blended. Pour batter into prepared baking dish. Bake at 450°F for 20 to 25 minutes, until well-puffed and golden brown.

While puff bakes, rinse blueberries, pat dry. In a chilled bowl, beat cream on low speed until thick, beat in 3 tablespoons powdered sugar and the brandy.

Remove puff from oven. Immediately top with blueberries, sprinkle on remaining 1/4 cup powdered sugar, top with whipped cream, serve at once.

Serves 4 - 6.

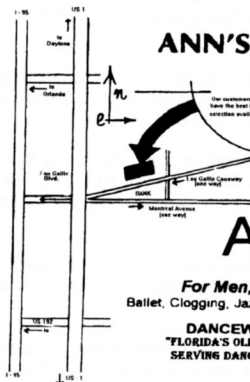

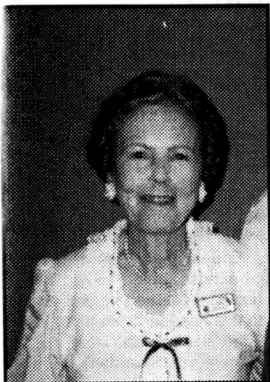
