

YOUTH GROUP



Give To Square Dancing (and Get A Tax Deduction)

Did you know there is a way to make charitable contributions to square dancing AND get a tax write-off for it? The CALLERLAB Foundation for the Preservation and Promotion of Square Dancing is a nonprofit corporation dedicated to preserving the heritage of the square dance activity. The Foundation was established in 1990 by CALLERLAB, The International Association of Square Dance Callers, as a way to safeguard the history and to promote the growth of square dancing.

The Foundation is a legal entity through which money is raised to carry out the specified goals of the organization. It is registered with the Internal Revenue Service as a 501(C)(3) corporation, and donations to the Foundation are tax deductible

The mission of the Foundation is to "preserve and promote square dancing through the preservation of the heritage of square dancing, the establishment and enhancement of a positive perception of square dancing, and education regarding the benefits of square dancing to the general public."

Goals of the foundation are to "develop and maintain a national advertising campaign to promote square dancing, develop and encourage educational programs directed toward the mission of the Foundation, and provide funding through grants and loans to support the mission of the Foundation. A major goal is to promote the wholesome nature of the activity.

The Foundation has already accomplished much in support of its goals, such as; (1) published and distributed almost one million brochures to promote square dancing, (2) produced and distributed over 4000 promotional

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video tapes containing TV public service announcements to be used in recruiting new dancers, (3) provided a grant to the New England Foundation for the preservation of square dancing. (4) provided square dancing educational materials to the Czech Republic, (5) funded an educational exchange between master dancer instructors in the Peoples Republic of China, and square dance leaders in the united States, and (6) in funding a variety of projects all aimed at promoting square dancing.

The Foundation has numerous future projects under consideration but funding is needed to make them a reality.

During the recent CALLERLAB convention in Dallas, Texas CALLERLAB members donated over \$10,000 to the Foundation by participating in a fund raising project featuring a special promotional recording of "God Bless The USA". This is a tremendous start in which all participants can be very proud.

Individuals, square dance clubs, dancer organizations, and caller associations may wish to consider making a tax deductible donation for this ongoing promotion and preservation of square dancing. Many businesses and corporations provide matching donations to help increase the value of your contribution. Checks may be made payable to the CALLERLAB Foundation.

A sample codicil for last will and testaments for those who would like to bequeath money to the Foundation has been developed and is effective in all 50 states and Canada.

It is a farce that so many criminals go free on such trivial excuses. The victim suffered a quick and life lasting sentence to pain and suffering. Why should the criminal not suffer the same fate?

I would like to see the new century bring us a new national goal, maybe even a world goal that all mankind could be part of. A dream that all of us could be a part of. A space station on the moon or a journey to Mars would certainly be exciting.

Linda and I want to thank everyone for their cards, prayers, words of encouragement and concerns. Linda, as is natural, was deeply grieved with the loss of her father. The very day we arrived in Pensacola, Florida to bury her father, our daughter, Kerri, was hit by a hit and run driver. I did not tell Linda until we were on our way back to Melbourne as there was nothing we could do and I did not think she needed more hurt at that moment. We returned to Melbourne to learn that it was very fortunate that Kerri survived the hit and run. Her right leg is totally shattered with quite a bit of bone missing. Her left leg had five bad breaks in it. Her left shoulder was torn out of the socket and broke from the socket. Her pelvis is broken and her bladder was torn. She had numerous cuts and abrasions. On the 18th of December we learned that they will again operate on the right leg on the 21st December. The orthopedic surgeon has told us it will be at least two years before Kerri will be walking again. I am sure this will result in life changes not only for Kerri but Linda and me.

While this has been a real challenge for Linda and me, we have a young lady that dances with many clubs around Brevard who has been a real inspiration to us. That lady is Adriana Suykerbuyk. She has had more medical problems than most families have in a lifetime and she is always in such good spirits and always so positive. She is a joy to be around and makes our problems seem so small. We thank you and Franz, Adriana.

We have a new free 10 week class starting on January 18th. We have a few thousand flyers to pass out. We did pass out about 1500 at the Melbourne Parade of Lights from THE BARN float. We have had three squares call and "pre register" for the class. Please feel free to tell anyone that you would like to get into square dancing about these lessons. We have been offering these free lessons for a year now and Linda and I are thinking about taking a vacation after these classes and the conclusion of the State Convention.

Thank you all for your support this last year.

The Story of Hanukkah


Both Jewish and non-Jewish families can commemorate this holiday, which celebrates a miracle that took place in one of the darkest hours in Jewish history.

The word Hanukkah means "dedication" in Hebrew. And the miracle it dedicates occurred in 168 B.C., when Syrian soldiers came to Jerusalem and desecrated the Jewish temple. For three years, the Jews fought back, led by Judas Maccabaeus, one of the most famous heroes in Jewish history. Finally, the Jews emerged victorious, and drove the Syrians from Palestine.

When they were ready to rededicate the temple, they discovered, to their horror, that the perpetual lamp Used for the purification rite had only the tiniest bit of oil ... just enough to keep it burning for one day! Instead, the lamp burned for eight entire days, enough time to prepare more oil.

Hanukkah lasts for eight nights to honor this miracle. Each night another candle is lit on the menorah, a candelabra holding eight candles and the "shammash," the worker candle used to light all the others.

On the eighth night, a fully lighted menorah shines in the window a symbol of faith and hope for all to see.



WORD STUDY OF THE WORD A MAN CALLED VERNON

As we enter the new millennium I had decided to revisit the topic of evolution again. However, my wife's father died right after Thanksgiving and I am now moved to write an article on his life and our hope. This was a good man whom I would have loved to present his eulogy and its wonderful message that is so needed in our present world.

Vernon Archer was born in 1915. He moved to Pleasant Grove, a small town in North West Florida near Pensacola. The house in which he was raised still stands just outside of the Pensacola Naval Air Station at which he worked all his life. He was known and respected as an honest and fair man. He was a deacon in the Pleasant Grove Baptist Church. He was the father to two daughters and two sons.

Vernon's last words on this earth were "I am OK". He was ready to depart this world and enter into God's Kingdom. He was a God fearing man who constantly lived his life that he would be an example to others. He never spoke ill of another person and he did not listen to stories about others. He was content to let God use him to witness to others. He did so by the living of Godly principles and not through words. "I am OK".

Vernon was a fisherman. He taught his sons to fish and to throw a cast net. He also taught my son, Kenny, to use a cast net. Using a cast net is an art that must be practiced constantly if you desire to catch fish. One really important thing about cast net fishing is that it requires stealth. A noisy, boisterous person will never catch fish. Even the shadow you cast has a direct bearing on catching fish. When you throw a cast net you must throw it so that it unfurls into a perfect circle. The cast must also be a level cast so that the net strikes the water all at the same time. If one part strikes before the other, the fish will rush to the part that has not yet hit the water and they will escape the net. A life that is used to "be fishers of men" must also be a like the net.

A noisy person will not catch fish. The fish will hear him and flee. We all know people that are loud and tell a good story. They will always tell you what you should do but their lives are like a boisterous person using a cast net. They will not be able to catch fish. Vernon was a very quite person that could approach the fish. His life was such that his life did not cast a shadow that would scare the "fish" away. Our lives can reflect the light or it can cast a shadow. Telling everyone you meet how righteous you are will certainly cast a shadow that will result in your net being empty. I used to watch

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Vernon fish with a cast net. He was ever so quite. He would make sure the sun was in his face so he did not cast a shadow and would bend over his 6 foot frame to make as little for the fish to see as possible. Ever so slowly he would approach the fish. His movements reminded me of a heron approaching its target. Vernon would then unfurl a near perfect circle as the net would spread out on the water. All weights of the net hitting together so that the net would sink together to ensnare the maximum number of fish. It was like watching a ballet with all aspects of the cast being in perfect harmony.

The retrieval of the net was no less important than the approach and cast of the net. No haste was used here. A steady and slow pull on the rope would be used to retrieve the net. The long rope would be coiled across his shoulder and ever so gently his hand would finally be placed on the center of the net and the net be retrieved. As the net was finally brought up out of the water the fish would be placed in is creel. Vernon was a real expert at fishing. He also taught others how to fish. My son, Kenny, was taught to cast net as were Vernon's two sons, Maruice and Ellis. His life was a good life and we are all certain that God said to him, "Well done my good and faithful servant, enter ye into the Kingdom of Heaven. You have been faithful over a few things and I will make you master over many."

Vernon had suffered for over 10 years with leukemia. He never complained through the many blood transfusions and the chemotherapy that he underwent for those many years. His wife, Lucille, suffered a major stroke over two years ago and Vernon dedicated his life to caring for her every need during the last years of his life. Lucille could not talk and Vernon got really good at understanding what she was trying to tell him. This in itself was a wonderful testimony to Vernon's life as a servant to others.

Vernon's life was a full and exciting life. He raised four children and was a grandfather 9 times. He and Lucille traveled extensively after Vernon retired from working at the Pensacola Naval Air Station in Pensacola.

Linda and I will miss Vernon. He will be sorely missed by his children living in Pensacola and his loss will be especially acute to his wife of 65 years.

In the world in which we live it is wonderful to know there are lives still being lived where God is glorified and a witness for His teachings is so wonderfully exemplified. Those who knew Vernon are fortunate to have know such a man of God.

We will miss you Vernon and know someday that we will all be united again in God's Kingdom.

As stated above, this "Bill of Rights" was approved by our entire membership. We encourage ALL callers and square dancers alike to help put the FUN and FRIENDLINESS back into Square Dancing!

Bill's and Otis's Most Excellent Adventure

There were MANY that said Bill and I would only last two days.

We were at the summit of Springer Mountain and we could look a long ways down. This was our second day. The wind on the mountain was something else. It was as if old man winter was walking to and fro hurling gusts with first his left hand, then right and thnn both hands. The tent would shake and you were sure if you were not in it, it would certainly blow off the mountain. Then there would be a quiet period and the sequence would start all over again. The amazing thing to me was the regularity of the pattern to the wind. I am sure you could set your watch by it.

The first shelter was only 2 tenths of a mile away and Bill and I decided to go there for breakfast as there was water nearby and there was a table to sit at while we ate. It would be the first (and last) place we had to sit since we started our journey. We got up on our second day and had oatmeal and coffee for breakfast. It was the best oatmeal and coffee either of us has ever had. I was the cook on the trip. Bill carried the "stove" and water purifier system. We met another hiker there who was finishing his hike. He said the shelter was full of mice (which is why Bill and I staved on Springer mountain). They would crawl all over you while you tried to sleep. We had a nice chat with Jim and he told us our backpacks were way to heavy. They should not be over 25 pounds and ours were over 50! We had bug spray that we didn't need (to cold for bugs) and lots of trail mix (very heavy). Both of these items were soon out of our packs and on the shelter floor. We did get Jim to take some. Our food sack alone (each or them) weighed more than Jim's total backpack weighed! We had way too much stuff. When I go again I will have a 25 pound backpack.

Well, off we went down the mountain. I am not sure which is harder, going down or up. I guess up as we were soon out of breath. Going down was really hard on the legs and toes. We had good shoes and two pair of socks on but the toes would still take a beating going down the trail. I still have one that is black! We went down and up. I was in the lead and Bill said, "Otis, I've been thinking, Where is the car?" I thought "Bill

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is going to tell me a joke". So I said, "I don't know, you tell me". Bill said "no, how did we get here"? I said "your son brought us. You remember the 'road' we came up don't you?" Well he said he didn't and I became a lot worried! So I told Bill exactly how we got where we were and where his van was. This is only our third day on the trail and I am really worried about Bill. We met a lot of day hikers on the trail around Springer Mountain and Bill and I were the oldest folks out there. We were also the ones in the worst shape to be doing what we were doing. We kept forging ahead and Bill asked me what year it was. I am plenty worried now and glad that I have the cell phone along. I was sure hoping that it would work in these mountains.

Along about 3:30 we came to a blue trail. A blue trail takes you to a shelter or water or to a neat camping area. This trail went down the mountain to a waterfall. It was absolutely beautiful. I went down to see how far it was off the trail and then went back up and got Bill. The falls were about 2 tenth of

We set up camp and had a great meal and some delicious coffee I can not imagine that a meal will ever taste that good again. Bill and I said we had beat the expectations that others had for us. This was third our night on the trail. I was very wor-

ried about Bill and decided that

if he was not OK in the morning we were going to get picked up – if my cell phone would work. I was able to call Linda and tell her what we were doing, where we were and had her call Pat. I also left messages at Bill's son, Russ', house so he would know where we were and where we planned to be the next day.

As Bill and I walked we could not help but notice how clean the trail was. Not a wrapper or any trace that hikers had traveled the trail. As we camped and fixed our meals we even took the grounds from the coffee

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bags with us. As we crossed the US Forestry Roads, we would see all the beer bottles and trash left by people who came in their autos to camp or ride their dirt bikes. We remarked to each other that they had a easy way to get their trash out and chose not to, while we had to carry every item on our backs. Made us wonder what people think about.

We hiked on to Cooper's Gap and set up camp on the 4th night. It was a beautiful day as our whole trip was really blessed with perfect weather. We could not imagine trying this in the summer as we were hot climbing the mountains in the cool of the fall. Trying to do this when the temperatures are in the 90's would have not been enjoyable at all. We were blessed with cool weather and the trip was really great. The climbs were a lot steeper than we could have imagined and going down the mountains was as hard as going up. We were a lot more out of shape than we thought and the going was very slow. We both think we quit a little early and should have just rested a day or two. We had way too many supplies and way too much excess clothes and supplies with us. When we go again we will carry half of what we carried on our first trip.

or planes to enter the quiet of the forest. We learned that people can occupy the earth without polluting it with trash. We met people that were friendly. We met hikers that were finishing their hiking of the AT and told us what a wonderful view of life they now had. Bill and I came back better friends than when we left, and we had already known each other for 30 years.

Bill and I want to do this again.
