CALLERLAB Viewpoints

New Dancer Coordinator

After the club President, the New Dancer Coordinator (NDC) is the next most important officer of a square dance club. They must coordinate between the club President and the club instructor many necessary duties to achieve success. Without new dancers, clubs are destined to fail. New dancers are the lifeblood of our activity. New dancers usually have friends nobody has ever contacted to join the square dance activity. They are often highly motivated and willing to encourage others to join something they find new and exciting. The main objective of the NDC is to provide the best fun-filled learning experience possible. The NDC must also work year round to energize the club to recruit prospective new dancers, not just one month prior to a new dancer session. The task is very rewarding when everything comes together and you are able to achieve club growth. To that avail, below is a list of some of the responsibilities every NDC should strive to achieve.

New Dancer Coordinator (NDC) List of Responsibilities:

- 1. Recruitment must be done year round by members. Material needs to be updated and available at all times to facilitate recruitment such as club business cards, new dancer information post cards, and publicity flyers for any new dancer sessions. Other unique promotional materials could also be used such as pens, wooden nickels, and magnets.
- 2. Plan ahead with the club President and the instructor when a new dancer session is to be held and for how long a period. Most successful clubs offer more than one new dancer session per year, use multi-cycle or condensed teach methods, or a combination of both depending on hall availability and instructors. The facility must be secured in advance by one of the parties involved; and where possible, the set-up should be properly documented.
- 3. Use existing club members as angels to produce a schedule where there will be three available couples present at each session to fill the odd square. It is possible angels are not needed to

even the sets per session, but that is not usually known until the session starts due to unforeseen circumstances.

- 4. Throughout the year, contact information of prospective new dancers should be collected by members and organized in a database to send reminders or other information regarding the starting dates and times set for open house dance parties and/or the next new dancer session.
- 5. Often an open house dance party is used as an introduction before a new dancer session begins. This event needs to be well planned and highly advertised by as many means as possible. Publications, community newspapers, classified ads all help, but the most effective means still is one-on-one recruitment of friends.
- 6. Temporary name tags should be made available for everyone needing one in order to recognize individuals to encourage conversations.
- 7. A profile sheet should be available for guests to fill out requesting contact information such as address, phone numbers, and e-mail, along with a few other brief questions such: how they heard of the new dancer session, if they mind being contacted for future events; and any other clubs or hobbies they wish to share. Knowing the latter can help make connections between members with similar interests, and discloses skills that could have future use.
- 8. A welcome letter should be developed and made available for all the new dancers. It should contain all the information they need to know regarding the upcoming new dancer session. Session times, number of sessions, dress considerations, the NDC contact information, goals and objectives, and any other necessary elements they are going to need to know should be provided in this letter. The "do's and do not's" information, along with a brief history and list of calls that are to be taught should also be available, but not necessarily provided until they have officially joined the new dancer sessions. This material should also be reviewed, updated, and maintained for future use.
- 9. Once the sessions start, the NDC should arrive early to assure the room is set up according to the instructor's needs, and to make preparations for the new dancers. Water, mints, and other supplies might also be needed.
- 10. An attendance spreadsheet should be developed to track a trend that may become a problem. Occasionally new dancers have scheduled work trips or vacations that should be blocked off on the attendance sheet. Knowing this information ahead of time can assist the NDC to find replacement angels for the missing dancers to keep the squares even. Coordinate with the instructor if a make-up workshop session can be offered one half hour prior to the start time for anyone missing more than one session at a time.
- 11. Having a club roster available is helpful in case there is a last minute need for an extra angel due to an emergency or illness. Having a roster of new dancers can also be an asset to the group.
- 12. Sending out an encouraging weekly email reminder listing the new calls taught helps tremendously. Having this information along with a link to "Taminations and Saddle Brook Squares" will provide the dancers a place to review the material between sessions. Basic/Mainstream handbooks, instructional DVDs, web references, practice dance material, and other publications should be made known to the new dancers for them to review.
- 13. Coordinate with the club and instructor the times the new dancer group could attend special events that would offer dance tips geared to the proficiency of the new dancer, possibly at the

start of the event. This helps with the transitioning between class and club as new dancers get to know more club dancers.

- 14. Plan and coordinate any graduation ceremonies to be held with all the parties involved. Diplomas need to be filled out and signed. If games are to be played, it is best to do so with the entire room of dancers (not just as an initiation of new dancers) as this could be deemed a form of humiliation. New dancers have been through enough just to learn the calls; no need to stress them out by watching them perform under high duress being blind folded and made to walk on potato chips. Be sure to take a group photograph for all to remember!
- 15. The NDC must help new dancers with the transition between the new dancer sessions and the club dances. Provide them information they might need to know such as membership dues, badges, club shirts, workshop times; and if utilized, how the dancer rotations system works. Regional and State organizational information could also be provided along with a list of area clubs and special events.
- 16. One important item is a final evaluation of how well things worked. What was the retention ratio of graduating new dancers per everyone that started the course? Could anything have been done differently to achieve a higher rate of success? Would you recommend adding or changing anything on this list of responsibilities? These details should be kept for future reference correlating any trends and should be shared with the instructor.
- 17. Training a successor is encouraged so having folks help along the way provides others the opportunity to learn some of the duties of a NDC, while creating a list of prospective candidates for the position in the future.

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The Enemy Within

As I travel around calling for such wonderful clubs and dancers, I can't help but think that we, as an activity, called Square Dancing, have many similarities, but we do have differences in our square dances throughout the country.

There are parts of the country that would never do this before a dance, and that is perfectly fine. It's not a requirement. Our activity is made up of all kinds of people, with all kinds of different ethnic and religious backgrounds. That's what makes our activity what it is, an activity for anyone and everyone.

Certain parts of the country pertaining to specific programs of dance have their own beliefs or customs. Depending on what program you dance, you will see what is important to that specific group. Many people do not like the traditional square dance attire, and that's perfectly fine. So, for those who might be offended to even hear that certain parts of the country actually pray before a dance, there are others on the other side that might be offended by how dancers and, yes, callers as well, actually dress nowadays for dances. Some believe that the dress code (do we still have one?) has swing too far the other way. Dirty jeans, cut off shorts, t-shirts, etc., have become the norm in some places. Many people just don't care about these issues, they just want to dance. That's great, but it also reflects the attitude our society now portrays when we allow rules and regulations to become looser and loser.

To each their own. The bottom line is each group is dancing, and in the end, many believe that is all that matter. For those of you who think that our activity does not parallel our society in many ways, you simply aren't taking a good look around.

This is an election year in our country, so political issues are in our faces every day. Politics is not only subjective, but as personal as you can get. There are politics in our activity as well. You always hear people say there should be Term Limits for our elected office officials, well, it might be a good idea for term limits for those in power within our activity. Yes, I am talking about callers as well. Believe it or not ladies and gentlemen, there are certain individuals who have Narcissistic tendencies to stay in power of running group and clubs around the country. They run them the way they, and only they, feel it should be run.

Our activity reflects society very much so, as we have dedicated; people with a heart of gold, who love the activity and work very hard to improve upon it. But, there are also others, just like the real word, who have their own personal, selfish agendas and do not care who they hurt to get their way. Our activity is made up of all different "classes" if you will. The arrogant, supercilious people ultimately are very pernicious in the way they view and treat the activity. They are the "know-alls" who feel they are better than the rest, and that they feel privileged because they surround themselves with like-minded people, so it is difficult for them to see otherwise. This includes callers as well as dancers.

For those of you who think we live in the land of milk and honey, within our society, and square dancing is part of our society, think again. It is sad that it is this way, but it's true. Just that no one likes to talk about the injustice dancers and callers do to dancers and callers all over the country. (I will not speak for the world.)

Subjects like these are difficult to discuss, because the first thing people say is that it is "sour grapes" for those who mention such topics. I disagree, we just need to get our head out of the sand and being to speak out and recognize not only the good, but also the bad, which these types of politics are causing to bring our activity down.

Where are our principals anymore? What do you believe in? Praying before a dance? Great, I am all for it. Certain rights within an activity fix all people, especially in our activity? Great, I am all for it. Reciting the Pledge of Allegiance before a dance, great. I am all for it. As much as our country should stand for Liberty, so should our activity. Do we have to compromise our principles and beliefs to cater to a group of individuals who don't really have the best interests of our activity in their hearts? Have we become so selfish and greedy that we don't see the square dance forest through society's trees?

Why discuss this at all? Why can't we just all get along? Well, believe it or not, we don't all get along in square dancing. Like politicians, we all may have the best interest of our activity in our hearts, but our actions don't always reflect that. While everyone admits recruiting more dancers into the activity (and of course that is critical) is important, there are other issues that are secretly destroying the fiber of our activity. It's square dance politics. I have heard from many dancers and callers throughout the years who "Have had enough of politics in our activity_ and they either leave the activity or never take on a leadership role again. This is sad and it is wrong. But, like the political worlds in which we live in, it is the truth. It's all about control, and there are many people (dancers and callers) who love and crave control within our activity and will stop at nothing to get it. In my opinion, these are pernicious people who are ultimately destroying the activity.

What can be done? Well, going around dancing day and night and pretending this is not happening won't solve the problem. What it takes is for people to stand up for the principles of what our activity is based on and confront these individuals. But, unfortunately, many will not because either they are afraid to offend someone (funny those in power never worry about offending anyone) or they just look the other way and maybe the issues will go away. Most callers won't say anything because they are afraid it will hurt their future work.

Right now, some of you reading this will just pass it off as a conspiracy theory. Wake up everyone! This is a great activity, and I am happy to see that there can be prayer before a dance, or a pledge to our flag. Living in our great country gives us the freedom to do and speak as we want, within limits. So, the next time you see injustice in our activity, speak up, don't look the other way. How are we to correct that which is wrong if we pretend it doesn't exist?

Did you know there are callers who will not get booked by certain groups/clubs because of something they may have posted on social media? We have come that far. What does one person's political or religious feelings have to do with that person entertaining at a dance for the evening? Nothing, that what. But what is interesting is that some of these same people/clubs/groups/etc. have no problem going on social media and spouting off about their personal feelings with what's happening in the world. There's a name for this this, it's called "hypocrisy" and denying someone the opportunity to be considered to call for a club should not be tied into any individual's personal views of the world.

It's called the First Amendment, and everyone has the right to speak their mind. I do agree, however, no one should be able to use social media to push their personal beliefs on other people, that, to me is wrong. Supporting what you believe in and trying to shove it in people's faces are two different things. It has even gone as far as individuals stating on social media that if anyone does not support "their candidate": then they will no longer be friends with them. Really? Has it come to this? Play "my way" or don't play at all! We are heading in the wrong direction.

We cannot say that "politics or religion" should not play a part in square dancing, because it does. As mentioned earlier in this article, certain clubs pray together before dances, etc. and politics plays a big part when certain individuals decide they know what's best for the rest of the club/area and try to rule with an iron fist.

People have a right to their opinion, and opinions should not be smothered or people "punished" because of them. If we cannot express ourselves freely, even in square dancing, then what's the alternative? Try living in a country where you would not have the freedom to do so. If more people in the activity were as passionate about square dance politics as they are government politics, articles like this would not have to be written.

If you have seen or been involved with (either as victim or perpetrator) then you have witnessed square dance politics at its worse:

- 1. Club President/officials who stay in office for what seems like forever (yes, I know, no one else will take the job, etc.) and they rule with an iron fist. It's either their way or the highway.
- 2. People responsible for booking callers are closed minded, personally don't like certain callers, so the whole club should not have the opportunity to dance to that caller (or cuer) because of one individual's feelings.
- 3. Callers who go behind another caller back to get work from a club or try to "steal" the club from the other caller.
- 4. Club members stifling newer members who bring up different ideas in ways to help the club.
- 5. People who run Festivals, and have been in charge for many years, doing things their way and only their way. Building up such a presence that everyone is "afraid" to confront them.
- 6. Calles talking friendly to other caller's faces and then twisting a knife in their back when they are not looking.
- 7. Callers belittling dances from the stage, and then getting booked back again (especially at festivals) by the same people they belittle. Remember, callers should treat dancers with respect from the stage, but for those who simply don't care, and book these individuals over and over again, well then you get what you deserve.

I could go on and on, there are more. I am sure you know of many other kinds of scenarios. You get the idea. If you have never been involved in situations like this, that's great, but too many people have and it has caused great pain within the activity that many people do not know bout. Our beloved activity has enough issues to deal with, we do not need internal strife that causes permanent damage.

I think it's time we take a good look at what is happening within our activity and try to make it right. We don't just lose dancers because it takes too long to learn to dance, or that the program is too long, or that there is poor teaching etc., we lose dancers because of competition, and if we are not willing to fix these "ills" within our activity, then we will continue to lose good dancers and callers because of our lack of convictions. No situation is perfect, but our activity can be better if we only make the effort to speak up when we see an injustice.

For all groups of dancers, singles, couple clubs, gay, straight, whatever the demographic makeup of the situation, we should always remember that someone's opinions do not make them an enemy of anyone. It's how an individual interprets something that can make for an unpleasant situation. We should also always be respectful of everyone club or dancing demographics as well. Most dancers and callers are really good people, we can agree to disagree, but no one should be punished because of their freedom to say what they believe or who they dance with.

Who died and left everyone boss? We're all in this together, but that is not to say that calling out injustices is wrong. In fact, it is needed for checks and balances within our activity. No one individual is going to change a bad situation, but together being respectful and tolerant of each other can go a long way toward righting a wrong.

Which way are we headed?

Voice Notes

There are times when many of us are called upon to speak in front of a group, perhaps at a meeting or getting up at a dance to make announcements. Sometimes we have the benefit of an amplified microphone while other times it is our voice in a room. Square dance callers are often in these situations from calling on the mic or walking out onto the dance floor to teach without a mic. For anyone who speaks in public, here are some tips to improve your effectiveness.

 Before you speak, don't eat. This is especially difficult at square dances where refreshment tables seem irresistible, however dairy products, wheat products, sugar, and soda tend to create excessive mucus product while snack foods may leave behind remnants to irritate your throat. Additionally, lots of cold drinks will cause your throat to contract and stiffen. For square dance callers, the refreshment table should be a "no go zone", not only because the food will cause excess mucus and irritation, but it can also cause weight gain. Especially for callers who call many dances in a week.

- 2. Stay hydrated. Water not only hydrates but also converts food and body fat into energy. Callers would be wise to keep a large bottle of water at room temperature on your table (away from your computer) and drink from it every tip, before and after.
- 3. Learn to speak to the back of the room. As you are about to give your public talk, focus on the people furthest from you in the room. By directing your attention to them, your voice will project across the room, thus allowing everyone between you and the furthest point to hear you. If you are not holding the attention of the people furthest from you, then you are speaking loud enough or clear enough or in a concise manner. Callers and cuers should e directing their calls to dancers at the back of the hall. This is especially important when there are many dancers present. Who hasn't witnessed the caller, cuer, or dancer that can't be heard in spite of increasing microphone volume to the point of squealing? No amount of amplification will correct failure to project your voice.

Special note to callers. If there is only a square or two, then find a person sitting at the back of the call and "call" to them. This simple act will help your calling voice come through clearly.by contrast, projecting your voice is almost impossible for the "sight caller" who is watching only the square in front of them. Because they haven't got a clue as to what to call next or how to resolve the square, they are calling to one square only. Any and all other squares are outside of the "sight caller's" focus so their needs probably are not met. It is obvious that the caller who projects their voice is the caller with better control of their choreographic skills.

4. Master the art of enunciation. Here is a simple task, as you are reading aloud, mentally picture your words coming from your mouth, moving forward so it seems your voice leaves you from the tip of your nose and lips. Breath in through your nose and make sure your mouth is opening enough to allow your lips to create words with punch. Enunciation and projection go hand-in-hand and are easy to practice at home by yourself, or have a listener across the room from you tell you when you fall back into old habits. Again, increasing the volume without properly enunciating will only make unintelligible words louder.

Square dance callers have unique demands and the following tips are offered to help with these challenges.

- 5. Use the best microphone you can afford for your calling. Take a couple of microphones to a dance and record the dance. Listen to determine which mic keeps your voice warm and crisp. Is your calling sibilant? There are mics designed to cut sibilance (hissing "s"). finally, keep your microphone to yourself. You should have an extra mic (inexpensive mics are sold in packs) for other people to use during announcements or guest tips.
- 6. Nasal lavage. Research it. Many callers cannot perform without it and most swear by it.
- 7. Continue to learn more about the topic of your voice. There have been many great CALLERLAB convention sessions recorded and made available to anyone who asks. Dr. Anden Hopkin's presentations are terrific and highly recommended. Contact the CALLERLAB home office for this information.

Breaking Records

A Few Good Pointers On Introducing Square Dancing To Young People

After speaking to a group of callers on "how to get into the schools to teach square dancing" a few specifically inquired about the "letter of introduction" to send.

Firstly, a few were surprised, or at least "looked" surprised when I mentioned that 'The schools probably won't call to book a caller, because most callers aren't listed in the yellow pages, and the novice are not familiar with caller and cuer databases. It is the caller who needs to be roactive and pick up the phone and write the letters.

Secondly, when sending the letters of introduction, some callers make the mistake of only sending the schools one letter. As well as sending the letter to the principal (who usually never sees it), send that same letter to the librarian, the gym teacher, the music teacher, the art teacher, the drama teacher, the history teacher, the math teacher...do you get my drill? Someone is bound to notice and take interest. That person will become your cheerleader, and they will pitch the idea to the principal, hopefully.

Thirdly, schools love to see written or typed credentials and certifications. CALLERS!!! Make a copy of your diploma from Caller's School, make copies of your Callerlab, ACA, ASCAP & BMI licenses. If you are a Callerlab Accredited Coach, by all means, put your letter on Callerlab Stationary, or a piece of paper with the Callerlab logo on it. My letterhead not only has those logos on it, but also Silver Sounds Recording Artist. Remember, you are not conceited, you are convinced! You are convinced you are the best person to teach these students how to square dance, and you have to convince the teachers, principals and sometimes even the school board.

There are many reasons why more schools, teachers and principals are hiring square dance callers to come into their schools to teach the kids square, circle and line dancing. Oh, and the home schoolers and their parents are catching on as well. Callers in the schools are much more interesting and entertaining than listening to records, tapes or CDs. When typing your intro letter to the schools, include this list or something similar.

The other question that I get quite frequently, on the 'callers in the schools' topic is "how to charge the schools". Here are my answer(s), based on the inquiries and scenarios I have received in emails and snail mail over the years.

Some callers donate their time and talent and volunteer in the schools. My advice here is to see if you can get a free hall out of this deal. If the callers come in and contributes their calling to the school, several times a year...swap, barter and trade and see if your club can dance in that school's gym or cafeteria.

Some callers take a square of dancers in with them, and ask for a donation to their club(s). I must put my two cents in here. I never take a square of angels in with me when I am teaching in the schools. I really only remember one time when I did and it was 20 years ago, when one of the grandparents of the school students square dance. The kids were in 1st and 2nd grade, and fortunately, they all loved the square wear costumes. The little ones loved all of the grandparents dancing with them. I don't believe the seniors would have been as much of a "hit" in the upper grades.

Some callers charge the schools, and that is perfectly fine. I have seen some schools get an Arts Grant or approved money or even an extra budget for extracurricular activities like square dancing. If this is the case, instead of a one-time deal, callers can actually write up a curriculum and a short-term goal for the school students. (By the way, schools love it when you create a syllabus.) An example:

- Caller will teach the entire basic program in 4-6 weeks.
- Students will learn CALLERLAB Basics 1051 (Starting with the call Circle Left and ending with the call Ferris Wheel).
- Caller meets with grades 5th-8th every Monday for a month and a half, 40 minute sessions.
- At the end of the course, students will perform a square dance for students, facility, administration and families.
- Certificates will be issued.

I hope this list of subjects and attributes as well as this curriculum helps out with your preparation for getting into the schools to teach square dancing. I want to shout out an extra "THANK YOU" to you for wanting to preserve as well as promote our activity by shedding a positive presentation to our youth, who as we all know, are the future of square dancing.
